




SWEETHEART BREAKFAST A BIG SUCCESS

Addison Travels

In February 2012, Alice Addison completed two items on her bucket list by traveling with the UCSB Gaucho Getaways Alumni Travel Program to the Galapagos Islands of Ecuador and Machu Picchu (Peru). An awesome experience each in its own right, combining the two countries took Alice from the 12,000' heights of Cusco, Peru and the 11,000' heights of Quito, Ecuador to locations around the Equator. In Ecuador she saw icy glaciers on the volcanoes at the equator and "origin of species" creatures, like black iguanas and blue-footed boobies in the heat of the Galapagos Islands at sea level. She snorkeled with colorful fish and sea tortoises. The ecological preserve protects these island species, so it's as if the Garden of Eden of Genesis (2:8) exists before your very eyes.

Culturally and linguistically, Alice used her Spanish, even learning a few new words in Ecuadorian and Peruvian Spanish. A Mexican owl is "tecolote" but in Peruvian Spanish it's "buho". She also began to learn Quechua from various natives in Peru. "Allianchu?" means 'How are you?' and "Osulpaiki" means 'Thank You'.

Historically and architecturally, she explored the pre-Inca, Inca, and Spanish conquistador-Catholic influence, which predominates in Ecuador and especially in Peru. Cusco was the Inca capital and a Spanish colonial stronghold. It was fascinating to see the religious art work of the Cusco school in the churches. The Last Supper had a guinea pig on a plate and corn beer in glasses! The Spaniards never made it to Machu Picchu though, so it remains as the Incas left it. "In the Beginning God created the heavens and the earth." (Gen1:1)

Easter Island

Rapa Nui is the current Polynesian name of a South Pacific island where Dutch explorer Jacob Roggeveen landed in 1722. He'd bee searching for a place named "Davis Island" or "David's Island" but found this instead. Ar riving on Easter Sunday, he called it Paasers, which is Dutch for Easter.

DIETARY SUPPLEMENTS: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The majority of adults in the United States take one or more dietary supplements either every day or occasionally. Today's dietary supplements include vitamins, minerals, herbals and botanicals, amino acids, enzymes, and many other products. Dietary supplements come in a variety of forms: traditional tablets, capsules, and powders, as well as drinks and energy bars. Popular supplements include vitamins D and E; minerals like calcium and iron; herbs such as Echinacea and garlic; and specialty products like glucosamine, probiotics, and fish oils.

If you don't eat a nutritious variety of foods, some supplements might help you get adequate amounts of essential nutrients. However, supplements can't take the place of the variety of foods that are important to a healthy diet. Scientific evidence shows that some dietary supplements are beneficial for overall health and for managing some health conditions. For example, calcium and vitamin D are important for keeping bones strong and reducing bone loss; folic acid decreases the risk of certain birth defects; and omega-3 fatty acids from fish oils might help some people with heart disease. Other supplements need more study to determine their value.

Many supplements contain active ingredients that can have strong effects in the body. Always be alert to the possibility of unexpected side effects, especially when taking a new product. Supplements are most likely to cause side effects or harm when people take them instead of prescribed medicines or when people take many supplements in combination.

Don't decide to take dietary supplements to treat a health condition that you have diagnosed yourself, without consulting a health care provider. Don't take supplements in place of, or in combination with, prescribed medications without your health care provider's approval. Check with your health care provider about the supplements you take if you are scheduled to have any type of surgical procedure. The term "natural" doesn't always mean safe. A supplement's safety depends on many things, such as its chemical makeup, how it works in the body, how it is prepared, and the dose used. Certain herbs (for example, comfrey and kava) can harm the liver.

Before taking a dietary supplement, ask yourself these questions:

- ightarrow What are the potential health benefits of this dietary supplement product?
- ightarrow Does this product have any safety risks?
- ightarrow What is the proper dose to take? How, when, and for how long should I take it?

Let your health care providers (including doctors, pharmacists, and dietitians) know which dietary supplements you're taking so that you can discuss what's best for your overall health. Your health care provider can help you determine which supplements, if any, might be valuable for you. Keep a record of the supplements you take in one place, just as you should be doing for all of your medicines. Note the specific product name, the dose you take, how often you take it, and the reason why you use each one. You can also bring the products you use with you when you see your health care provider

- As you have seen by now, Criswell Hall's floor has been stripped and waxed with 5 coats of wax. Thanks to Alice Addison, Harry Egan, Bernie Hawkins, Mike Johnson, Val McClure, Bud Johnson, and Bill Weitkamp for such a beautiful job.
- New keys for the two sheds outside have been made. They will be kept with the other keys.
- The Board is looking into a solar heating system mounted on the roof. It was pointed out that some companies will install and let you rent it from them. More to follow.
- I believe the latest count for round tables. Stands at 6. We need 4 more. If you would like to buy one for the Church, the cost is \$100. Let me know.

Qualifying applicants must have full-time work load at a college, university or technical school and must be (or have been) an active member of our church.


Health Care Issues and **Options Study**

The image of a doorframe marked with blood comes from the Old Testament Passover account, when the Israelites prepared to flee slavery in Egypt. God directed them to slaughter lambs for a final meal and paint their doorposts with the blood. God sent the Angel of Death to kill the firstborn sons of Egypt, but the blood on the Israelites' doorposts served as a signal that the Destroyer should "pass over" those homes. Likewise, the blood of Jesus - who is the Lamb of God - saves us from eternal death.

Where Was I?

Our young son often asks where he was when something significant happened before he was born. "Where was I when you two got married?" "Where was I when Nana died?" And even "Where was I before I was inside your body?"

My response is always "You were in God's heart." God said as much to Jeremiah: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you" (Jeremiah 1:5, NRSV).

A Good Friday spiritual asks plaintively, "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" Clearly none of us were present when Jesus died. Yet as we worship on Good Friday, we place ourselves at the cross, where Jesus bore our sins.

"Where was I," we might ask our heavenly Father, "when they crucified Jesus?" I'm confident that God's tender answer is "You were in my heart." Indeed, only because of our place there did Jesus go willingly to the cross – and rise to assure us of everlasting
