

Hello Again Church Family,

For this issue I would like to share more about what it is to make disciples. I came across an article on A Theology of Discipleship that I would like to share with you from the GBOD (General Book of Discipleship) website. Enjoy!

## A Theology of Discipleship

Theology is not just about God. It is also about us. We live out of our understanding of who we are in relationship to God, to one another, and to the world. The Christian faith is grounded in the love and grace of God, experienced through Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit. The Christian life is our response to God's love and grace.

The church calls our response to God Christian discipleship. Discipleship focuses on actively following in the footsteps of Jesus. As Christian disciples, we are not passive spectators but energetic participants in God's activity in the world. Because of what God has done for us, we offer our lives back to God. We order our lives in ways that embody Christ's ministry in our families, workplaces, communities, and the world.

#### Loving God

When Jesus was asked what the most important commandment was, his response was: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment" (Matt. 22:37-38. See Matt. 22:34-40; Mark 12:28-34; and Luke 10:25-28.)

Discipleship is about loving God....It is more than an acknowledgement of God's existence or a statement of belief regarding God. It is total devotion, head-over-heals-in-love-with adoration. It is the deep desire to know God, to be one with God, and to worship God.

There are a variety of ways that we can develop our knowledge of and love of God. These include

- Prayer
- Bible study
- Worship
- Fasting
- Conversation with other Christians

John Wesley, founder of the Methodist movement, called these practices means of grace. They are means for developing our relationship with God and for experiencing God's presence in our lives. These practices help us spend time with God, a significant factor in loving God.

#### **Loving Neighbor**

Jesus responded to questions about the most important commandment by quoting the Hebrew Scripture's admonition to love God with our whole being. (See Deut. 6:4-9 as well as gospel passages listed in the above section.) Then immediately he broadened the meaning of this admonition: "The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:31). These verses about loving God and loving neighbor as ourselves are known as the Great Commandment. Again and again, the Bible teaches us that loving God and loving neighbor are two sides of the same coin. We cannot do one without the other. Check out some of these passages for a glimpse at how prevalent this understanding of Christian discipleship is:

- Matthew 5:43-48
- Matthew 25:31-46
- Luke 10:25-37
- John 15:12-17
- Romans 12:9-18
- 1 Corinthians 13
- 1 John 4:19-21

From these passages and others we can draw several conclusions about what it means to love our neighbors. First of all, loving our neighbors means responding to specific needs—hunger, illness, imprisonment, loneliness, and so forth. Love is more than a feeling; it is behavior. It is practical and concrete.

Secondly, our neighbors include many people. Within the context of the Christian community, our neighbors are our brothers and sisters in Christ. Neighbors may also refer to the contemporary understanding of those who live near us. However, from a biblical perspective, neighbors often include people whom we might not normally consider:

- strangers;
- prisoners;
- people who mistreat us (who are our enemies);
- people from other cultural and ethnic backgrounds;
- people from different religious traditions;
- people who irritate us and push the boundaries of our patience.

Therefore, loving our neighbors requires attention and sacrifice. We have to pay attention to what is happening around us in order to see our neighbors and to recognize their needs. We must also consider their needs to be as important as our own in order to live faithfully. Loving neighbor is more than random acts of kindness. It takes time, energy, and commitment. It is a lifestyle carefully cultivated in response to God.

Finally, these passages emphasize that loving our neighbors is not optional; it is mandatory. It is what Christians do and what Christians are. Our lives are a testimony to our love—our love for God and our love for neighbor.



#### New Study for the Season of Advent

<u>When God Comes Down</u> explores the meaning of the incarnation...God with us in human flesh. It looks at the stories of the primary biblical characters in the birth stories through whose lives the miracle of incarnation happened.

The study looks at the stories of the primary biblical characters in the birth stories through whose lives the miracle of incarnation happened: Zechariah, Elizabeth, Joseph, Mary, and Jesus. Harnish also looks at a traditional character in nativity plays, one who is not mentioned in the Bible, the innkeeper.

Often our Advent/Christmas journey is focused on us – our memories, feelings, relationships and experiences. This study puts the focus on God's action in Jesus Christ. It encourages participants to think more deeply in terms of the biblical, theological, and spiritual meaning of the Nativity and to apply it to their own lives.


#### Live with Gratitude

#### What would happen if we let thankfulness change our lives??

Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice... Then Jesus said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well." Luke 17:15, 19

On Thanksgiving, we traditionally acknowledge the good things in life. We count our blessings and remember that God has taken care of us for another year. Families and friends and congregations gather together and celebrate with especially abundant meals as we kick-off the holiday season.

For many, this is a very happy and meaningful time during which we are reminded of so many reasons to be grateful. It is also an opportunity to ponder the powerful potential of living each and every day of the year as transformed people centered in a spirit of gratitude. We learn something about this from the Gospel story of the 10 lepers (Luke 17:11019). As we read the passage it is clear that all 10 lepers are healed and rejoice because of the miracle. One of the 10 is so overwhelmed with gratitude for this incredible and inexplicable healing. ... He just couldn't continue on with his life as it had been before he contracted the disease. So, he paused. He separated himself from the small band of healed people, and he alone chose a different path. He ran back, fell at Jesus' feet and proclaimed praise to God saving, "Thank you! Thank you!". This action prompts Jesus to declare, "Your faith has made you well. "Most of us know the joy of physical, emotional or spiritual healing after a devastating chapter in our lives. We are certainly grateful. But what would it be like if we turned around and chose to live life differently? How might our faith be invigorated if we embraced a daily life of gratitude in which ever encounter and every interaction was blanketed in thanksgiving? We can choose to live a life in constant appreciation of the goodness that surrounds us. Perhaps a life centered in gratitude is a life that is lived in the fullness of Jesus' proclamation, "Your faith has made you well."

•Due to a tough financial September, the Parsonage Fund lost a little under \$2,000. We now stand at a little over \$138,000.

- Utilities still hurt our budget! The water bill is our biggest problem at the moment.
- Since our copy machine lease in the office will be up for renewal, we are getting two different quotes on different machines from two different venders hoping to re-negotiate our cost. A representative from Select Business Solutions attended a recent Trustees Committee meeting. One machine we own outright and is over 10 years old—which we still pay maintenance on. The other is leased and that is up in April. After discussion, the office will only need one machine. Our current vender is also putting together a quote for the church office to review on October 25. Stay tuned!
- There are 5 new shelves in the storage room above the kitchen. This should help store financial data and keep them off the floor.
- Pastor David and Tom Egan have new credit cards through the church for large purchases.
- The legs of the pews have been repaired. There is a weak spot on the legs and so repairing them will be ongoing.
- The cost of making the bus legal is too much for our budget, Pastor David will be checking if the UMC in Arizona would like a bus.
- Recently the east side door was repaired. This
  has been three times recently. It does not open
  easily and a heavy shove or a hard boot will help
  but in doing so, all four screws holding the bottom assembly come out and thus making the
  door unlock-able. Please have more patience
  when opening the door. We will need time to
  reassemble the bottom of the door and holes
  filled. The door is part of the house of the Lord,
  please respect it.
