It was that night, that Jesus had His Last Supper. After dinner they shared in the first communion, and went out to the Mount of Olives to pray. It was there that Jesus was betrayed with a kiss. This is the night we remember when we honor Maundy Thursday.

Dear Friends,

Last month I shared at the end of my Shepherd's notes we need to keep in front of us and turn our focus to the primary goal of our church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Here is some more about how we can/do this in our local church.

Discipleship is a road map for mission and ministry. One such way is to identify the ministries in which we nurture children, youth and adults in Christian faith; to describe/identify outreach opportunities for our congregation to respond to the local and global community; and to develop/include strategies for our witness to the love and grace of God. This is a simple way for us to develop a strategic plan, by analyzing and classifying the various ministries of our congregation. Let's take a look briefly at ministries of nurture, outreach, and witness.

Nurture Ministries include worship, Sunday school and other small groups and other settings for spiritual formation. These ministries assist people of all ages in developing and deepening their relationship with God. Ways this can happen: Opportunities to grow and mature as disciples of Jesus Christ; Provide a supportive, caring community for people to face a variety of daily opportunities and challenges. These ministries may zero primarily on the Scriptures, worship, prayer, or other aspects of the Christian faith, or they may be topical dealing with issues of daily life, such as grief, addiction, divorce or parenting.

<u>**Outreach Ministries**</u> are involved in responding to the needs of others. You will recall when Jesus was asked what the greatest commandment was, he replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your soul, and with all your mind, and all your strength." He went on to say, "The second is this, You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Nurture ministries help us love God. Outreach ministries help us love others. They are faith in action.

Witness Ministries provide a way for sharing the good news of Jesus Christ to a world broken and hurting. These ministries zero in enabling people to the active presence of God in their lives and develop ways of talking about their experience of God. Including, but not limited to, assisting people to listen to the stories of others who need to hear a word of encouragement, hope, love and grace. These ministries may include evangelism, lay servant ministries, and communication through website, newsletter, and bulletin.






Easter Lilies have traditionally been a part of the celebration of Easter. For many, the beautiful trumpetshaped white flowers symbolize purity, virtue, innocence, hope and life - the spiritual essence of Easter.

Often called the "white-robed apostles of hope," lilies were supposedly found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's agony. Tradition has it that the beautiful white lilies sprung up where drops of Christ's sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow and deep distress. Churches continue this tradition at Easter time by banking their altars and surrounding their crosses with masses of Easter Lilies, to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and hope of life everlasting.

You are invited to order a lily by completing the order forms found in the Sunday Bulletin or by calling the church office. By ordering a lily you will have two opportunities to give: 1) You can make a dedication to a loved one and take home the flower to enjoy, or 2) With your dedication, you can donate your flower to a church family member who is homebound or in a carefacility. 

Good Reasons For Attending Christian Retreats by Susan Coho, Adult Christian Ed. Director

We have a hundred reasons why we shouldn't go to Christian retreats. Some years the voices win out, and we stay home. Later, when we hear the glowing reports from others about how wonderful it was, we feel a pang of regret, but it doesn't last long. "Oh well," we say, "maybe next year." Other times we make the extra effort, and we're the ones sharing happy stories and telling how glad we are that we attended.

Why Go To A Christian Retreat?

- 1) Because it's hard to hear God's voice above the noise of everyday life. When is the last time you sat quietly before God without a To Do list, or family members pressing in on all sides? If you can't remember, you need to attend a retreat. "To retreat" means to leave our normally occupied positions and go to a place of safety, quiet, and seclusion. By going to a retreat, we physically remove ourselves from life's distractions, the call of chores, and the demands of people in order to make space for God. If you think you're less spiritual because you struggle to hear from God in your day to day life, be encouraged. Even Jesus recognized the value and need to get away. "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house, and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed" (Mark 1:35). Jesus retreated.
- 2) Because we need each other. Faith is contagious. Just like a virulent virus, it passes from person to person through close contact. Today's busy world allows little time for people to share faith stories, pray together, or meditate on biblical messages given. As we consider and apply God's Word together, we learn from each other's varied backgrounds, experiences, and insights. The better we understand God, the stronger our faith becomes. Then we can strengthen others. Hearing other people's testimo-



nies about God's faithfulness helps us realize that God will also take care of us. Hebrews 10:25 spotlights the value of mutual encouragement and warns us not to neglect corporate worship: "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another."

- **3)** Because meeting together spurs us on to "love and good deeds" (Hebrews 10:24). "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds." The Greek word for "spur on" is parox-usmus, which means to stir someone up. It has negative connotations, such as stirring up disagreement, but in this Hebrews passage, it underscores the fact that meeting together as believers helps us love and serve God and each other better.
- 4) Standing side by side, together in Christ, and worshipping, praying, and learning about our precious Savior makes us stronger. In joining a group that is singing praise songs to God, we experience a taste of what Heaven's going to be like when we're gathered around His throne. When sitting with other Christians, opening God's Word, the insights gained as we study together, adds weight and credence to biblical truth. When praying together, we share a common bond; we know we are not alone. Heavy burdens are lifted as we take them to our God. For these reasons, a Christian retreat can rejuvenate one spiritually, emotionally, and physically. People often state that they return home feeling refreshed, strengthened, inspired, and closer to the Lord and their sisters in Christ. Many people have said they never regretted attending a retreat, but have regretted not attending one. If you've never attended a retreat, or you haven't in a while, why not plan to attend one of the FUMCAG retreats offered this year? You'll be glad you did.

Do you want to get-a-way? Consider these upcoming opportunities.

COMMunications COMMITtee

When the Church Council had their brainstorming meeting last month, several raised concerns around how we communicate with the congregation and the community. It is the job of the Communications Committee to help you all know how I believe there are several ways the WE CAN ALL be part of the solution.

First, when you *receive* your newsletter, note the <u>deadline</u> on the calendar for the next issue. This has been a very large issue for the church office. It puts the proofing, printing, mailing, as well as, the distribution to you the congregation at a great disadvantage.

Secondly, please plan ahead if you have information you want to share with the congregation or community in the next issue. The office receives our information in a variety of ways....email, hard copy-typed or hand written, faxed, or by mail. Any issues/articles not from the publicity, chairs or committees of this church will need to be reviewed by the Communications Committee for approval.

If we make an effort to be timely in getting the information to the office, then it can be included for sharing with the congregation and community. Also by being timely, the newsletter can be formatted sooner giving the Communications Committee opportunity to proof more adequately. By waiting until the last minute, we are in jeopardy of major items being excluded from the newsletter. We are certain that this will make the process go more smoothly. If you are going to be delayed, please let the office know so space can be allowed—this does mean that items cannot be accepted after the proofing has been done.

Remember that we do have an **online calendar that is updated weekly** with all event forms that are turned into the office and as items come from the Trustees approval. Please be sure to check your events regularly to be sure something was not missed or is incorrect. So that is all to say, NO Event Form, means NO Trustee approval, which then means the office has NO information, all resulting in NO event on the calendar.

Timeliness is important for the weekly bulletin as well. Be sure your dates are on the church calendar so they can be included. You are free to write a short blurb and e-mail it to the office. If the office doesn't have the correct information, it makes it difficult to have them in print for us. Please do not assume that the office has your event information.

MOST IMPORTANT...is for all of us to read the publications so we aren't saying, "I didn't know anything about - 'whatever it is.'" We want to be good stewards of our resources and time. SO please make the work that people put into ALL publications a usable resource for you.

Then prayerfully consider being a part of the Communications Committee and help with this part of our ministry.


gently working to update the library booking catalog, tagging and making more room for incoming books. Any books not taken are being donated to the AAUW book sale.

GOD'S STEADFAST LOVE..IN ACTION

1) NATIVE AMERICAN SUNDAY

Since this special offering comes on May 4, the first Sunday in May, I wanted to give you a heads up for those who like to plan ahead. The special day reminds United Methodists of the gifts and contributions of Native Americans to our society. The offering supports Native American outreach within U.S. annual conferences and provides seminary scholarships for Native Americans.

2) LENTEN DISCIPLINE

How are you doing with your Lenten Disciplines? I hope you are finding this a meaningful time to examine your life and to draw closer to God. Lent is a season to prepare our hearts for celebrating Easter. Through the centuries, common Lenten disciplines have included:

- Fasting: Denying oneself food and other habits or restricting the amount consumed.
- Abstinence: Denying oneself specific types of food/other habits during Lent.

From MARCH 4, 2014

- Per the budget we stand at 109%. Of the areas we are over budget, I can control only one of them. At the end of January we lost \$1,200 on our Parsonage Fund. We stood at \$143,780. But, at the end of February we gained \$6,000 and stand at \$149,826.
- A couple of weeks ago ,People's Kitchen gave out clothes to the needy. A lot of people came but we still have a lot of clothes. So, they will do it again.
- Security is not lost but close to it. I will probably mention this each month until all realize that security falls on each and everyone of us.
- Ted Sloan said that in the last 2 or 3 years, LED lights have come a long way. They are even over 100 watts. He will get me a price and availability for the 6 in the sanctuary and then I'll see if our budget can handle this.
- The bus is insured with tags, and about to be inspected engine wise. We have discussed taking out 4 or 5 seats so it will carry only 15 passengers. That way anyone with a valid drivers license can drive the bus. Stay tuned.
- It will take 1 or 2 more months to see if the reduction in water usage has affected our water bill.
