Dear Church Family and Friends, Here is some more information about this new ministry which we introduced on Sunday, April 27.

Messy Church is...

- Messy Church is a form of church for children and adults that involves creativity, celebration and hospitality.
- It's primarily for people who don't already belong to another form of church.
- It meets at a time (and sometimes in a place) that suits people who don't already belong to church.
- It typically includes a welcome, a long creative time to explore the biblical theme through getting messy; a short celebration time involving story, prayer, song, games and similar; and a sit-down meal together at tables. All elements are for, and should include, people of all ages, adults and children.
- It's all-ages—and FUN.
- It's a church for people at all stages of their faith journey and of any age - a congregation that is as valuable and worthy of investment as any of your other congregations.
- It models and promotes good ways of growing as a family: a nuclear family, an extended family, and a global and local church family.
- Its aim is to introduce Jesus, to give an opportunity to encounter him and to grow closer to him.

Messy Church isn't...

- just for children It's much easier to aim a Messy Church at one particular age group, but do stop and reflect on whether the nonverbal messages that this sends are what you want to say about God. If your Messy Church's teaching, activities and food are all aimed just at the under-11s, think what message you're giving both children and adults: church is only relevant/fun/meaningful/ interested in you until you're 12? God is for babies? No, Messy Church needs to be constantly creative in its thinking about how to involve very different people: young and old, families and single people, male and female, academic and practical, poor and rich.
- a club The whole of Messy Church is about worshipping God, having fellowship, exploring faith matters. It welcomes everyone, involves

everyone, values everyone, is always there for the outsider. It's a church.

• a way of getting people to come to church on Sunday -

There are examples of people starting in Messy Church and deciding to join Sunday church as well but these are the exception rather than the rule. If people wanted to go to established church, they would be going by now. Messy Church is interdependent with established church, but will usually operate as a separate congregation or church.

- just for church families Anyone already belonging to church should be thinking about serving on the leadership team of Messy Church, however old or young they are, and helping others come to know Jesus.
- just for families All are welcome: single, widowed, childless, divorced. Church is inclusive, not exclusive.
- a quick fix Growing disciples takes time. Messy Church has only been going a few years anywhere. It usually only meets once a month. Growth will probably be slow.
- an easy option It takes money, time, prayer, commitment and energy from the church and leadership team.
- a drain on church resources Yes, it will take money and time, effort and gifted people to run it, but it will give back in return a group of people who are fired up for mission, empowered by using their God-given gifts. It will spark off ideas and inspiration about what church is all about and will renew vision. It will grow goodwill in the neighborhood towards the church and, most importantly, provide the opportunity to do effective mission in your own community.
- set in stone We're learning all the time. As the network of Messy Churches grows and develops, so the best ways of delivering Messy Church will develop and grow. UMC of AG has deliberately chosen to have a 'noncontrolling', 'hands-off' approach in the way it promotes Messy Church in the hope that this will give God space to grow his church as he wants to, and that it will give everyone encouragement to experiment and innovate.




Women in Mission (A short history of United Methodist Women)

The Woman's Missionary Jubilee of 1910-11 marked the 50th anniversary of the founding of the first major women's missionary society. Across the country, local women gathered for missionary teas, pageants, and luncheons to hear jubilee speeches by a traveling team of female mission leaders. They celebrated the achievements of what was then the largest women's movement in America – women organized for world mission. The Jubilee participants included 3 million dues-paying members of more than 40 denominational women's societies. These women's mission societies held regular circle meetings, raised money for missions, published their own magazines about missionary work among women and children around the world and sent female missionaries out. These first women's groups were the forerunners of today's United Methodist Women.

When American laywomen organized to form mission societies in the 1800's they were deliberately following in the footsteps of Mary Magdalene, Tabitha, early deaconesses and other persistent women of faith. In 1869, despite opposition from male leaders who predicted they would fail, Methodist women in New England formed the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. Since women were then not permitted to raise funds at regular church events, they depended on five-cent membership dues and life memberships. Not only did they succeed in sending their own missionaries and in supporting indigenous "Bible women" evangelists, their self-published mission magazine immediately turned a profit.

At the time of the 1910 Jubilee celebrations, Baptist mission leader Helen Barrett Montgomery considered the Methodist women's mission groups to be the strongest in all the denominations. They had sent more missionaries than any other women's society in the United States, had founded the first women's college in Asia – the Isabella Thoburn College in Lucknow India and what became the largest women's college in Asia – Ewha Women's University in Korea. They were the first female medical missionaries in India and China. They opposed foot binding and female infanticide in China. They exposed sex trafficking in brothels in lumber camps in Wisconsin. They founded kindergartens and social service centers in cities around the world. They witnessed to Christ and brought people to the Christian faith in Asia, Africa and the Americas. *(To be continued)*

Treasurer's Report: March 30, 2014

We are 3/4 of the way through our fiscal year which ends June 30. Overall we are doing OK. Stewardship is about 97% of plan, or about \$6K under plan. Expenses are also running under plan, with most teams and committees continuing to keep expenses below budget. Overall we have a year-to-date deficit of \$4.8K, which is slightly worse than the \$3.2 deficit we were expecting at this time. Thus far we have not had to tap the Endowment fund for a loan.

I am praying for generous Easter offering and continued generous giving by the congregation for the rest of the fiscal year.

We will be starting our 2014-2015 Fiscal pledge drive and budgeting in May. I ask that you consider giving generously to continue the many important missions of the Church.





1. NATIVE AMERICAN SUNDAY

This special offering comes on May 4, the first Sunday in May, I hope you have thought about how you will participate in this special offering. The special day reminds United Methodists of the gifts and contributions of Native Americans to our society. The offering supports Native American outreach within U.S. annual conferences and provides seminary scholarships for Native Americans.



2. NO MORE MALARIA

Zimbabwe is empowering communities to fight malaria. Against the backdrop of the green hills of Manicaland province, three villages of Ward 22 gathered recently to receive mosquito repellent to protect their loved ones from the current outbreak of malaria. They are above the malaria threshold set by the Ministry of Health. The anti-malaria lotion, MosLotion, provided by UMCOR is coupled with insecticide-treated bed nets to help families protect themselves both indoors and outdoors. Trustee Tidbits

Tom Egan, chair

• Our financials are a little over budget. We are trying to move some expenses to other accounts to Christian Ed, Church Office, Staff Salaries, etc. Our Parsonage Fund moved from\$143,780 to \$149,826. Not bad.

- The Board has decided to eliminate enough seats in the bus so that a person with a valid drivers license can drive the bus. Keep in mind that driving that bus is no piece of cake. The front windshield needs to be replaced, new oil and all filters, and test driven.
- We again want to look at installing solar panels. This would be at no cost to the Church.
- The water bills are still too high. We have discussed watering 5 days a week for 5 minutes at a time.
- Bernie has taken the lead in mapping all circuit breaker panels (5) and identifying what each switch controls. Almost done. What a great job. Much thanks.
- As if I needed more projects, I have given me one. I want NICE hand rails on both sides of the Altar that leads up to the stage. Then I want a nice rope set (rope plus stands) set between the steps and the altar, both sides. Then, I would like to replace the kneeling rails for communion. No, I won't give a completion date and yes, I have discussed this with Pastor David.
- The question was brought up, " do we have a water backup system that prevents waste water from backing into the clean water system." No.
- The water system outside the kitchen through the patio and Children's Center is on its own system. The sewage in this area is pumped to a holding tank and then pumped to the sewer line on Bennett Street.
- In the kitchen to the office, that piece of land is level to Bennett Street so waste goes straight to the sewer line. Back water can't mix with the waste that is being pumped to Bennett Street.
- Although we have had no instances of waste water mixing with fresh water, there is no back flow in the line that goes straight to the sewer line on Bennett Street.
