Spiritual Living

What's the bedrock of life for Christians? Is it Bible reading? Church participation? Prayer? Is it a belief that Jesus is God's Son?

The foundation of Christian living is faith in Christ. Faith is the central loyalty that gives purpose and direction to our lives. Christian faith is grounding our lives in the living God as revealed especially in Jesus the Christ.

This faith does not happen overnight. It's a journey. From birth to death we're growing in faith. There are ups and downs — and sometimes long flat stretches where we seem to be stalled in our journey. But little by little, most of us deepen our relationship with God.

In part, this growth in faith is a gift. Through our participation in the community of faith, through our openness to God's love, we receive this marvelous treasure. But faith is also a choice we make, an often difficult decision to put God and God's reign first in our lives, no matter what the cost.

We cannot say that some people are "ahead" in the journey of faith and others "behind." Faith is not something we possess by degrees. The journey is complex, different for each traveler and involving at least four intertwined pathways:

Trusting

First and foremost, faith is trusting. To be a person of faith is to rely on God, to know that "the Lord is my shepherd" (Psalm 23). It's to rest confidently in the power and care of the living, loving Lord who's revealed in the Bible and in our own experience. Faith is to give ourselves to the movement of God's Spirit in our lives and in our times, not knowing where it will lead. ...

Believing

Faith is also believing in someone. In the Apostle's Creed, for example, we say, "I believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth." This is not the same as saying, "I believe that God the Father Almighty exists." Rather, we're confessing our confidence in God, our devoted loyalty, and our allegiance. Such belief may involve going beyond what we're sure of and taking a "leap of faith."

Following

There's more to faith than trusting and believing. Faith is more active, a matter of doing as well as being. So Jesus said to his first disciples, "Follow me." To be faithful is to follow Jesus the Christ. It is to be one of his disciples, seeking to understand his will and his way — and to do it. Such discipleship is not an easy matter. Jesus said, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:24-25)....

Hoping

Christian faith is also a matter of hoping, of leaning into the future that God has promised. It's living with the assurance that God is bringing in the time of shalom, God's reign here on earth. As Easter people, we have a hope born of the Resurrection: God has already conquered sin and death, and the kingdom of love, righteousness, peace and justice is even now breaking in. To abide in hope is to watch and pray for God's future and to join in the ministries through which it will be realized.


Surrounded by the love and encouragement of the community of believers, we persevere on the journey of faith, ever trusting, believing, following and hoping.







WHAT WE DID THIS SUMMER

This summer three women, Mary Hawkins, Eva McClure and Patti Melsheimer from our local United Methodist Women were able to attend **Mission u** held at Biola University in La Mirada, California. What a wonderful, inspiring and invigorating experience! It was delightful to meet and share ideas with women from all over the California-Pacific Conference. The theme was "Learning Together for The Transformation of the World." The mission studies included *The Church and People With Disabilities, The Roma of Europe, and How Is It With Your Soul?* We will be sharing information regarding these subjects through out the 2014-15 year.

In addition to attending study sessions to discuss these topics, we participated in worship services, enjoyed the singing of the women from the Korean UMW (over 100 in attendance) and the dancing and singing from women who are of Tongan ancestry. We also became acquainted with what it is like to live on a college campus and sleep in dorms!

We also learned about our UMW mission work. Did you know that there are 97 United Methodist Women-supported national mission institutions-community centers, schools, colleges, health care facilities and women's residences? There is at least one national mission institution in each jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church. Visit the United Methodist Women website unitedmethodistwomen.org to see a complete listing of the 97 national mission institutions.

As well as supporting mission institutions, United Methodist Women take positions on social justice issues such as homelessness, hunger, poverty, racism, illiteracy, economic justice, war and peace, health care for children, international conflicts –the list of national and global issues seems endless. You are encouraged to read *response*, the magazine of women in mission to learn more about what UMW is doing. There are many back issues available in our church library.

(Please note the UMW program on "The Church and People with Disabilities" scheduled for October 4 has been postponed until the Spring.)





The purpose of the UMW Reading Program is to encourage United Methodist Women members to:

- Expand understanding of and participation in God's mission.
- Increase sensitivity to all human beings—their needs, interests and concerns.
- Encourage critical thinking about issues facing humanity today.
- Grow in understanding of Scripture as it relates to Christian faith in contemporary life.
- Enhance self-knowledge and act from that knowledge.
- Strengthen involvement in local and global Christian mission.

The Arroyo Grande UMW Book Club has been meeting since 2010! We have read over 30 different titles. Most of the books we choose are recommended by the United Methodist Women's Reading Program.

Dear Friends of Imagine No Malaria,

The World Health Organization has declared an international health emergency, with 2,615 people infected so far and 1,427 deaths in Sierra Leone, Liberia, Guinea and Nigeria.

As someone who is interested in the topic of global health, you might want to learn more about how we are addressing communications needs around the Ebola outbreak affecting our sisters and brothers in West Africa.

Bloomberg News reported that the Ebola outbreak is also affecting people infected with malaria. Many fail to seek medical attention for fear that they may have Ebola or that they may come in contact with the disease if they go to a hospital. The fact that it is the rainy season, when more malaria cases occur, compounds the problem.

Because Ebola and malaria have common early symptoms, such as fever, headache and vomiting, both those who are ill and healthcare providers may be confused about the cause of illness.

While malaria is curable, Ebola is not. But there is real concern that the mortality rate from malaria may rise because patients will not seek treatment; therefore, it is critical to get accurate, life-saving messages to people in these areas. The Religious Leaders Task Force on Ebola in Sierra Leone, chaired by United Methodist Bishop John K. Yambasu, listed a comprehensive communications strategy as its first priority. This means disseminating messages in an environment where no infrastructure exists, using means that are relevant to the consisting of trained healthcare workers and wellaudience.

Communication and education are two of the four pillars of Imagine No Malaria used in the fight against malaria.

United Methodist Communications has provided a \$10,000 crisis communications grant to the United Methodist Liberia Annual (regional) Conference to help share health-education messages through printed fliers, banners and radio. A second \$10,000 grant will go to Sierra Leone. United Methodist Communications also has reached out to church leaders in Nigeria and Côte d'Ivoire, and is exploring the possibility of using other channels to communicate more widely.

The Foundation for United Methodist Communications has established an emergency communications fund to provide communications support during situations such as this so funding will be readily available in the event of a crisis or disaster. Help is needed to ensure that we can meet these needs as they occur.

Your gifts to Imagine No Malaria are also helping in the fight against Ebola because together, we've improved access to healthcare. A strong health infrastructure, equipped facilities, is better able to handle other health threats as well.

But this situation also underlines the ongoing need to continue our malaria work. We have made great strides in reducing deaths from malaria, but we are still working toward the goal of elimination. To give to Imagine No Malaria, visit ImagineNoMalaria.org.



IMAGINE RIDE

The Imagine Ride is a vision of Rev. Andy Mattick (Simi Valley UMC) in response to the conference appeal for funds for Imagine No Malaria. As a young missionary, Andy was diagnosed with malaria in 1996 while in Kenya.

Now, along with Layman Mark Witman, Andy will ride more than 550 miles from Paso Robles to Malibu and up to Bishop from September 6-12th. Together they hope to raise \$25,000 to save 2,500 men, women, and particularly children from malaria.


Our Church has already supported them from our Mission Funds for \$100. They will be riding through here on September 6th and will stop at our church at approximately 1-1:30 on Saturday, September 6th. 
- We are still over budget but close, budget for 2015 is \$47,376.
