

From the Pastor

Greetings!

January is upon us. Though our fiscal year is July to June and the liturgical year began November 29<sup>th</sup> with the First Sunday in Advent, for most of us the culture trumps the rest and we "begin again" at some important level on January 1<sup>st</sup>.

My neighbors' Christmas decorations disappeared promptly on December 26<sup>th</sup>. I like to linger longer through Epiphany, January 6<sup>th</sup>. #### A CHRISTMAS SEASON VISIT WITH DON AND HELEN GUGELER

#### with David Beaman on December 15, 2015

Don was born on the way to the Des Moines, Iowa hospital in a Model A Ford. His father was a Methodist Minister and after his early death, his mother took over as his replacement to serve the congregation. She was declared qualified to hold the position by the conference and served over 4 years. Don entered USAF in the waning years of WWII and trained as a B-24 bombardier. The war ended before he was assigned to



overseas duty. He qualified for GI Bill benefits and after the war studied Physics and Mathematics at Iowa State University.

Helen was born in Laurens, Iowa and grew up on a dairy farm with purebred, high production, and registered Holstein cows. She helped milk the cows, lifted heavy pails of milk and did other chores in the mornings before attending her high school classes. She showed heifer calves at the fair and won many 4-H prizes.

Don and Helen met in 1947 while attending Iowa State University and while singing in the Methodist Church choir in Ames, Iowa. Helen's major was Home Economics. They became engaged in 1948. 1949 was a BIG YEAR; they both graduated college AND they became married. They both then taught high school for 3 years; Don taught Science, Chemistry and Physics and Helen taught Home Economics and English. Additionally, they enjoyed new faculty assignments, like Helen's favorite of directing school theater plays, and Don's accomplishments were playing clarinet in and directing the PEP Band. The total high school population was only 80 students; however, they put together a 50 student member marching band and won a statewide competition.

The family made a very significant vacation trip to California to visit a sister and brother-in-law and Don made contacts for new employment with Hughes Aircraft, Rockwell Industries, and Douglas Aircraft. Don accepted a position offer with Douglas, and the family moved to Santa Monica in 1956. He was hired as a Design Engineer for Guidance and Control Systems. While working there, he acquired a Masters Degree from UCLA. His descriptions of the work he did included "designing components of a desired theoretical nature and then creating the actual and workable device that contributes to ICBM interceptor performance".

The family had grown with the arrival, in Iowa, of daughter Margaret in 1954 and son Bill in 1955. Daughters Diane in 1959 and Pam in 1963 were born in Santa Monica, California. Next generation members include seven grand-children and three great grandchildren.

After retirement, Don and Helen came to Arroyo Grande and built their new home. It was specially designed to include Solar Heating features to save use of carbon related fuel by using sunlight very efficiently and at minimal cost. An example was a 30' by 10' all glass solarium on the south side exposure. This is an example of what a welleducated scientist and engineer does on a regular basis.

We AGUMC members fondly remember when all the children attended the service on Don's 90th birthday and sang and played guitars before the congregation as a birthday tribute to their father.

Don and Helen are 30 year members, and very regular attenders to all our church activities. They are full time members of the Chancel Choir. They have served on many committees and boards.

Helen enjoys all activities that involve sewing. She has been an active member of the Quilting Guild. Don regularly plays his clarinet during church services and with the SLO County Band and with groups who entertain shut ins at the many care facilities. They have enjoyed travels to London, Scotland, Austria, and Japan, and cruises to Australia and Alaska.

It is members like Don and Helen who help hold our church together and show the way of how to be effective and caring members.

#### Dear Parishioners,

Over the past several months your Trustees have been reviewing many aspects of the church facilities in regards to environmental conditions, utility and general usage of church facilities. In doing so we are in the process of drafting policies that we feel will help clarify many issues regarding these situations to the satisfaction of the whole congregation. The following are areas we will be addressing initially: Kitchen, Pantry, Criswell Hall and Narthex.

#### **TRUSTEE POLICY: FACILITY USAGE**

#### <u>Kitchen</u>

The kitchen will be used primarily by the Pre-School M-F 10am – 2PM. This does not mean other church groups may not use the kitchen during those times, but it does mean that groups/events that need this area during those times must coordinate with the pre-school director to allow for a suitable solution for all parties involved.

Groups/Events that use the Kitchen and its facilities are responsible for all set-up, clean-up, breakage, etc., during the time of their scheduled event. If the area is not as clean as it was before the event, the group responsible for the event will be charged a fee. This fee is currently \$50.00 for non-church groups in accordance to our standard Usage Agreement.

#### <u>Pantry</u>

The pantry attached to the kitchen is used as a cleaning area, hence the existence of the water, sink and drain built into the floor. Thus we have kept cleaning chemicals, mop buckets, mops, brooms and other cleaning supplies in there for several years.

Over time, a variety of food items have come to be stored in this pantry. The Trustees are initiating a policy to remedy this situation. See exhibit A. [page 11]

#### Criswell Hall

This hall is designated as a meeting place for a variety of groups and while many events involve the serving of food, the storage of same is not its primary purpose; therefore, any non-perishable food stuffs allowed to be stored in this area must be located in cabinets or closets, behind closed doors. No perishable foodstuffs or opened containers, packages or bottles of food may be stored in this area at any time. See Exhibit B. [page 11]

Once again, it is the responsibility of the group using this area for meetings, events or whatever, to leave the area in a clean condition, including the floors – if this is not done the group will be charged a cleaning fee.

#### <u>Narthex</u>

It should be remembered that the narthex is not an eating area; therefore do not eat or drink liquids, other than water, in it.

These policies were adopted by **The Trustees** and the **Church Council** on Nov. 18, 2015 to become effective on Jan. 10, 2016
