The violence of shooters and shooting became personal this week as I read the internet news and saw listed among the victims of the Kalamazoo shooting the name of someone I knew 38 years ago when she was a student at Western Michigan University. Bright, energetic, and kind way back then. And now? ---a seasoned, compassionate Christian woman whose life was taken from her by an uber driver on a shooting spree. Tragic, senseless, and violent. Gone, but not to be forgotten. What a waste---her death I mean, but not her life! Her impress will continue to inspire and to ignite a desire for goodness and truth because she lived and lived well.

She is in bib overalls stomping down leaves in a dumpster so we could keep the Wesley Foundation premises clean and clear as fall colors turned to brown and trees let go of leaves for the winter. I have pictures of her sitting on a wall acting goofy and having fun with quirky friends putting a Frisbee over her head as if it were a halo! Ordinary memories of an extraordinary girl long ago.

What I celebrate as I remember Mary Jo is the loving community of the Wesley Foundation where the spiritual lives of students were nourished and nurtured, where friendships were formed that made a wonderful difference and where young people made the transition into adulthood becoming creative, compassionate, caring servants of the Lord Jesus Christ. Goodness was born in that student community in Kalamazoo.

And that same kind of community is what we celebrate here. What we do as a congregation that gathers to worship, to pray and to praise God is transformative. We, too, are in transition and are always becoming more creative, more compassionate and more caring servants of the Lord Jesus Christ. So, celebrate who we are together as we love and serve Jesus the Christ! This journey makes a difference. There are eternal consequences to the love we share and the service we live out.

PAT AND LARRY WIEMERS—FAITHFUL FUMCAG **CHURCH MEMBERS FOR 53 YEARS**

Driving to their "back country home" was an interesting excursion, and taking in the expansive and high level view to the south was breathtaking. One can see the ocean, beach and mist stretching for many miles. It is the perfect spot to watch missile launches from Vandenberg AFB, para-gliders aloft, and unceasing waves rolling ashore. A perfect view of God's creation at work!

Larry was born in Lincoln, Nebraska. His father began his career in education in a one room school but was soon recruited to work for the Nebraska State Dept. of Education. A few years later the family moved to Houston, TX. His dad decided to pursue a Master's degree and a Ph.D. so the family moved to California, and with degrees in hand he began his life as a school administrator. Consequently, Larry attended a number of schools along the way.

It was in Oxnard where Larry first met Pat, his future wife, when they were 5th grade Sunday School classmates. They attended the same junior high school in Oxnard until Pat moved to Ridgecrest, CA, the town outside the military base of China Lake Naval Weapons Center. Four years later Larry's family moved to Trona, near Death Valley (a mere 26 miles from Ridgecrest).

Larry excelled in high school sports. Although he was offered an athletic scholarship at UCR, he chose to attend Cal Poly, SLO. He became a student of Industrial Technology and a Resident Supervisor, and gave the young residents advice about proper behavior and deportment. He is forever grateful to his father who sent him DAILY letters of encouragement and support during his college years.

After graduation Larry became a teacher at Crown Hill school and taught 9th grade shop classes. Not long after he started his pursuit into administration roles by obtaining the required credentials. He became a counselor moved to Grover City in 1963, and joined the church in at Arroyo Grande High School and then moved to the District Level and was responsible for the Regional Occupational Program, vocational education, Agriculture programs, and "other duties as assigned" which translated into administrator of expulsions districtwide and also the district music program. He was a coach for basketball and tennis and taught driver training, too. He wore many hats during his career which he traded in for a farm hat. Most folks at church know him as "THE PIG FARMER".



contracted tuberculosis and was sent to a veteran's hospital in California, the family followed. After her father was released from the hospital, the family moved several times. Luckily they went to Oxnard and met the Wiemers family at church. Ridgecrest was next because her father needed the dry climate. Her father's work on the base was classified TOP SECRET and it was only after it was declassified many years later that the family learned of the "projects" he worked on. So Pat, as well as Larry, lived many places and attended a lot of schools. Pat was very active in high school and was awarded an academic scholarship to UC. Santa Barbara, where she studied Speech Pathology. She was also a Resident Assistant. When the "dorm Mother" left, Pat became Head Resident. With Pat and Larry serving responsible positions, Larry organized bus trips to bring full loads of male students from Cal Poly to UCSB for Dance Get Together Outings. The program was a huge success. (Coed dorms did not exist back then.)

After graduation, Pat filled the need for Speech Pathology in the schools through the SLO County Office of Education. She worked as an itinerant speech and language therapist, a special education administrator, a psychometrist, and a special day class teacher for communicatively handicapped children. After retiring from a 36 year career, she volunteered her services for friends and others needing speech/language therapy. Now she volunteers in several organizations in South County.

Larry and Pat dated in college, were married in 1962, 1964 when Criswell Hall was the sanctuary. They have always considered themselves a "team", so they went back to school together for Master's degrees and more credentials, purchased their beautiful 10 acre home site in 1970, built their house together, and started "farming" together. They have many stories to tell.

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES Chair, Paul Holden February 2016—The Latest from the Trustees



- Trustees were pleased to have an opportunity to communicate in person at the Trustees meeting with Mary Throndson, Chair of the Board for the Children's Center, and for both Trustees and Preschool Board to communicate concerns and coordinate in ways that strengthen the church and Children's Center programs. With regular turnover in Trustees membership and changes in pastoral leadership over time it remains important to update current players on the relationship and agreements originally set in place at the creation of the Children's Center regarding facility use, utilities, repairs, etc., in order that we may work well together. Mary Throndson is to provide Trustees with a copy of the Center's current by-laws and to contact Rev. Underwood who was the founding pastor who can provide useful information helpful to us.
- Mike Johnson has been working on securing bids for the replacement of the Children Center's central heating unit. The bids are coming in high at \$22,000+. Paul Holden will look to secure one more bid before we decide whom we shall use.
- Paul Holden has begun working on obtaining quotes for installing a solar electric power solution for the Church in hopes of reducing or eliminating the current \$800+ electric bill.
- Buffy Prestemon is working on quotes for replacing the entry way mats.
- Buffy also obtained 'No Smoking' signs and Paul will install them soon.
- Paul is working on obtaining signed Church Facility Use agreements with all parties using the Church on a recurring basis. It looks promising that a little income will be generated from this effort as well as current contact information.
- Paul reviewed for the Trustees the current liability insurance coverage that the Church has through the District's plan. We have found out that we have very adequate coverage, and we had to laugh when we found we have \$25,000,000 in coverage for water sprinkler systems.
