**ANCHORING YOUR WELL-BEING** by Howard Clinebell, Ph.D.




# Meet the Beard Family

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### Jim David's Story of Humble Beginnings, Perseverance, and Long Life

Jim was born in Pioneer, TX in 1923. His father was an account- expenses. While Jim attendant for an oil company, and the family lived in camps and housing provided by the owners. The oil industry was in the early stages of its development, and families had to frequently relocate when companies merged or failed so they had to move to Oklahoma City, OK, then to Independence, KS in 1928. The Stock Market crashed in 1929, and the depression caused job reductions, poverty and loss of \$37.50 per month), used bus family assets. His father got a break to move his family to Tulsa, OK for a secure job, but for less salary. The family with 4 children had food to eat but had to live with meager belongings and a sometimes bleak existence. When Jim was 14, he got a job delivering The Tulsa -World newspapers and was finally able to buy extra clothing and go to movies. His mother sold handmade costumes she made to have money for ballroom dance lessons for her children to have the opportunity to socialize and thereby learn to practice good manners and refinement.

When he was a junior in high school, Jim's older brother took him on his first airplane flight . Jim was determined to join the Air Corps after finishing college. He enrolled in the University of Tulsa and got a part time job in a petroleum laboratory analyzing oil well formation cores. By this time in 1942, WW II was a year old, and his parents gave permission for him to enlist in the Army Air Corps. A good friend gave him advice to not join Army, but to join the Navy Air Division Reservoir Engineer, Chief Reservoir Engineer, Assist. Mgr. Corps for better training. He was sent to the University of Texas in Austin for Navigation and Physical Conditioning then to Baylor University at Waco, TX, where Flight Training started with Piper Cub and TaylorCraft airplanes and civilian instructors. The next stage was several days by train for Pre Flight Training at Del Monte, CA. Here they lived a life of rigorous physical activity including calisthenics, obstacle courses, boxing, wrestling, swimming, soccer, football, basketball, track, marksmanship, celestial navigation, Morse Code, flight, aircraft and gunnery, all done by hand (no computers) and patterned after Naval Academy life. In 1944 his next assignment was Norman, OK where he finally got to fly REAL training aircraft in Stearman and TIMM planes and was sent to Corpus Christi for the final phases of pilot training. He received his Ensign Commission and Naval Aviator Wings after 2 years of training and preparation.

He flew PBY5 Seaplanes and PB4Y Patrol Bombers. In March, 1945 Jim met Betty Davies, a Student Nurse, in Hutchinson KS and they were married in May, 1945. Facing overseas assignment they moved to several areas for final training and chose Tulsa for Betty to live while Jim was deployed. As it happened, the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki brought the end of the war. Grateful for the end of wartime, Jim was sent to Hawaii on an aircraft carrier. He served in several areas of the South Pacific and eventually finished his military service in July, 1946. He is very proud of his gold "Navy

ed school, Betty worked jobs, with long hours, in doctors' offices to support them. They lived in a third floor apartment, with no elevator (at transportation to school and work, and were thrilled to have their own privacy because rental apartments



were very hard to find. They had dinner with Jim's parents every Sunday. The Univ. of Tulsa had grown much larger than when he had first enrolled mainly because of so many returning war veterans. Jim attended year round and took the maximum courses allowed to earn his degree in Petroleum Engineering in 1949. He had chosen the correct science to study because there was highly competitive, trained engineer demand in the oil business.

Jim's employment and professional career created opportunities to live in Dallas, Corpus Christi, Mc Allen, San Antonio, and Los Angeles. His portfolio of work history includes Engineering Trainee, Junior Engineer, Area Engineer, Regional Reservoir Engineer, Exploration and Production, Petroleum Consultant-Partner, Mgr. Economics and Evaluations, Vice President Economics and Evaluation, Vice President Production and Engineering. His climb "up the ladder" resulted from his education, self confidence from his military training, and abilities which are perpetuated by his dedication to doing a thorough and honest job.

As they moved into establishing their career life after college was finished, so did their family grow with the arrival of son James, son William and daughter Susan. Betty and Jim were married for over 70 years. Besides caring for the family, the centerpiece of Betty's life was volunteering. She taught Sunday School, served on church boards, and organizations, was a Girl Scout leader, worked with Red Cross, served as a counselor at the kid's high school, promoted higher education through P. E. O. scholarship programs, was a Stephen Minister, and a "minister to ministers". She is remembered for her humor, hospitality and compassionate heart. She was quick to make friends and equally enjoyed the company of aristocrats as well as immigrants new to this country. She loved her seven grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren.

Betty and Jim moved to Nipomo in 1988. They were active members of our church. VERY SADLY, Betty passed away on March 8, 2016.

Jim returned to the University of Tulsa in September, 1946, to study Petroleum Engineering. Being a military veteran, he had earned the GI Bill benefits of free government coverage of college I have definitely benefitted from learning to know Jim David better through his life story and his gracious hospitality.

On January 15<sup>th</sup>, we welcome to the pulpit the Reverend Sing Yue. Sing and his wife Jeannette worship among us regularly, and I invite you to get to know them better. Rev. Sing Yue has degrees in Graphic Design from Maryland Institute College of Art in Baltimore, a Master of Communication Arts from the University of Baltimore in Maryland and a Master of Divinity from New Orleans Baptist Theology Seminary in Louisiana.

Sing Yue brings the richness of his experience of over 13 years in chaplaincy work. As a hospital chaplain, Rev. Sing C. Yue is currently engaged in providing spiritual care and support for patients, families and staff as the Lead Chaplain at Dignity Health Memorial Hospital in Bakersfield, California. His ministry involves crisis intervention, spiritual counseling to help people deal with death and dying and ethical issues surrounding medical care. His current emphasis is in palliative care, Oncology, and ER-Trauma. Rev. Sing is involved in a multicultural and interfaith ministry. He is fluent in both Cantonese and Mandarin languages, and his holistic ministry engages the healing visual arts, music and literature.

From 1992 to 2003, Rev. Sing Yue served as a certified addiction counselor in drug treatment centers in Florida and Oregon, and has also worked as a clinical director in the Florida State Prison system. Rev. Sing Yue is an internationally certified Dual Diagnosis Counselor in psychiatric in-patient treatment and, in his journey, has offered empathetic listening, assessment, and in-depth process therapy services to felons and ex-convicts. He is certified as a drug and alcohol counselor.

We welcome Rev. Yue to the pulpit, and we welcome to worship his wife of 21 years, Jeanette who is an excellent elementary school teacher. Though Sing and Jeanette do not have children of their own, she is wonderful with children and excels in offering her giftedness in this way. Sing enjoys spending his time off traveling in and outside the country visiting relatives and friends from Canada to China.
