while in Missouri. Through this relationship I have participated in three International Federation of Diakonia meetings. It has been my privilege to serve as part of the General Conference Delegation in 2000, '04, and '08 as well as part of the Jurisdiction Conference in 1992, 1996 with others from the Kansas East Conference.

I have served on a variety of committees in the conference and currently complete a time as Conference Secretary of Global Ministries, District Committee on Ministry, and Board of Managers for the School of Christian Mission. I have also taught in the conference school.

I enjoy travel and as a result of these various opportunities, have been fortunate enough to minister in places around the world, as well as in our own country.

I plan to return to my California roots and live on the Central Coast. This way I will be close to my 90 year old father and closer to my sister as well. So I will enjoy walking the beach, reading, and designing my own schedule. I will miss all those who have been friends and colleagues here in the Midwest and invite you to visit should you be in that area. (Or you could plan to be in the area.)

What would please me most is to learn that many more of our congregations reached out in mission and ministry and developed a Covenant Relationship with a United Methodist Missionary.

Camp Arroyo Grande Has A New Cabin Dedication—November 14th

Close to 100 people attended the gala BBQ for the cabin dedication on November 14th at Camp AG. Camp managers, Steve and Debbie Tallant, hosted the event with special guest, Paul Cogger (Director of Camping for the Methodist Conference), Rev. Bob Underwood led the dedication ceremonies which were held under a canvas pop-up tent, just south of the newly finished cabin.



“You are sitting over the site of the next cabin,” said Steve Tallant in his opening remarks. Tallant noted that about \$25,000 had been spent in leveling out the cabin sites, bringing in a large drain system and all of the electrical and plumbing. That is all in now for development of cabin number 2 which is hoped to be in place by summer of 2011. The two cabins are part of a six cabin complex. The plan calls for replacing the six older cabins that were brought in from an army base over 30 years ago. The entire camp is planned to be refurbished over the next 15-20 years. The new cabin totaled close to \$70,000 including the site improvements. With funds in short supply, the camp is gladly accepting donations.



Those in attendance were impressed with the new unit. It sleeps 14 in a fully carpeted room and has two tiled showers with full bathroom facilities. The soft tan walls trimmed in white enhance the beauty of the building that will house families and campers for years to come. Ceremonies were concluded with cake and refreshments.

Women are the Fastest Growing Segment of Substance Abusers In the United States!

Alcohol and drug addiction are chronic, debilitating diseases, and recovery is not finite in itself. It requires management over the course of a person’s lifetime. For women, especially chronic abusers, recovery can be an uphill battle. Women are the fastest growing segment of drug abusers in the U.S. and make up a fourth of all abusers, according to the U.S. Center for Substance Abuse Prevention.

Clinicians and program administrators are increasingly aware of the important differences between men and women with regard to the physical effects of substance use and the specific issues related to substance use disorders. They are also recognizing that these differences have an impact on treatment—that gender does make a difference. When women’s specific needs are addressed from the outset, improved treatment engagement, retention, and outcomes are the result.

Recovery programs are now increasingly taking women’s unique needs into consideration and developing gender-specific recovery support services specifically designed for addicted women and their families. Strengthening family systems is critical to a woman’s long-term recovery. Addiction is a family disease, passed from generation to generation and nearly two-thirds of Americans have friends or family members who have struggled with addiction. “Everybody suffers from this disease and everybody needs healing” said Sis Wenger,

president and chief officer of National Association for Children of Alcoholics.

Speaking up about addiction and recovery can be a powerful way to break the silence of family alcoholism and other drug addictions and motivate individuals struggling with substance abuse to seek treatment. Ms. Wegner says that families dealing with addictions need to hear messages of hope and possibility of recover for their whole family. They also need help finding recovery resources.

Meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous, Al-Anon and Alateen meet at our church on a regular basis. Contact our church office to learn about specific meeting times. The United Methodist Special Program on Substance Abuse and Related Violence (SPSARV) coordinates our denomination’s global response to alcohol, chemical use and dependency and related violence, and is administered by the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church.

"Why We Worry" - part one

If you've ever thought of yourself as a worrywart, then you're no stranger to worry. And if you consider yourself a worrier, you're also no stranger to the phrase "what if". "What if I need a root canal?" or "What if she asks where I've been?" and "What if I get caught?" maybe it's, "What if I don't do well?"

The question of "what if" is a worry wart first line of defense against things going awry. The fears of a worrier are often getting sick, making a mistake, messing up, being caught off guard, and feeling humiliated or embarrassed to name a few.

What's Wrong With Worrying?

What's wrong with a little 'innocent' worry once in awhile? For most people, nothing. But, for a worrywart, worry is anything but innocent...or occasional. Worry, especially chronic worry, exacts a psychological price that is often exorbitant. Physically, our body may translate the stress and tension of worrying into headaches, stomach distress, hives, insomnia, lower immune system response, or even heart attacks--in some cases, in extreme cases anxiety and depression. Whether it's warding off a common cold or being susceptible to cancer, there's no doubt our bodies abhor worry.

What Does the Bible Say About Worry?

The Bible clearly teaches Christians not to worry. Philipians 4:6 says, "Do not be anxious [do not worry] about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." In this verse we are not just told or asked nicely, but commanded, NOT to worry. This Scripture teaches us to bring all of our needs and concerns to God in prayer rather than worry about them. Worry wastes our time and also takes our focus off of trusting God. **Worry replaced by prayer equals TRUST.**

Jesus encourages us constantly in the Word to avoid worrying about our physical needs like clothing and food. He assures us that our heavenly Father will take care of all our needs in Matthew 6:25-34. So then, if we are directly commanded and lovingly encouraged not to worry, then why do we continue the damaging behavior?

Since worrying should not be a part of a believer's life, how does one overcome worry? The Bible tells in

Emotionally, worrying is no bargain either. It leaves us feeling off balance, insecure, and often quite frantic. We become glass-half-empty pessimists, wringing our hands as we try to anticipate what might go wrong and how we're going to handle it. Worrywarts worry because their world has become riddled with doubt and distrust. If you can't believe in life, you're doomed to fear it. If nothing else, worry gives you a sense that at least you're doing something to brace against life's curve balls. Guess you could say spitting in the wind is doing something.

Why We Worry

Unfortunately, worry-warts feel there's little or no choice. Worry for them is the only way to survive things going wrong. Heaven help them if they get a bit complacent, lazy, or too relaxed--WHAM! Life will deliver them a blow from which they might not recover. If you're a worrier, you're probably convinced that if you worry enough, you might be able to figure out (control) all those what-ifs and then stop worrying. In a sense, you worry so you won't have to keep worrying. (continued in Part 2 next month)

1 Peter 5:7, that we are instructed to "cast all your anxiety on him because He cares for you." God does not want us to carry around the weight that worrying about our problems brings. In this verse, God is telling us to give Him all of our worries and concerns. Why does God want to take on our problems, you may ask? *The answer here is simple—because He cares for us.* God is concerned about everything that happens to us—large or small—God wants to give it His FULL attention. When we give God our problems, He promises to give us the peace which is beyond all understanding (Philippians 4:7). Try it...what do you have to lose. Of course, for those who do not know the Savior, worry and anxiety will be part of life. But to those who have given their lives to Him, Jesus promised, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden light" (Matthew 11:28-30).



- It has been asked that a light be placed at the bottom of the beautiful stained glass window behind the choir. We will look into it and see if it can be done.

Thanks for you help, *The Cleaning Crew*

Bill & Gladys Paulsen—Two Strong Pillars In Our Church

On a recent and very damp afternoon, I visited the Bell Street home of Bill and Gladys Paulsen. It was raining so hard I got wet even though it was only a few steps from car to porch. I have known my hosts a long time, so we got right to work discussing their life stories.



Bill and Gladys were high school sweethearts from Gibsonburg and Helena, Ohio during the early years of WW II. Upon graduation, Bill responded to the patriotic call to enlist in the U.S. Navy and served as an onboard gun crew member assigned to protect the merchant ships as they carried supplies to the active war areas in Europe. It was a dangerous assignment, especially because the convoys of merchant ships crossing the Atlantic Ocean were prime targets for German submarine torpedoes. The convoys suffered enormous losses of human life and cargo. During his European duty, his ship sailed the Suez Canal, Mediterranean Sea, Indian Ocean. Bill spent one Christmas in Calcutta, India. In the last years of the conflict, when the war efforts expanded, his ship was assigned to carry cargo to the South Pacific. While his ship was transporting bombs and ammunition to Okinawa, the convoy was attacked by Japanese fighter planes and a ship positioned very near his was totally destroyed while his was spared. He also witnessed a *Kamikaze* attack that sank an American Destroyer. Thankfully, Bill remained unharmed during his wartime service and returned to civilian life in 1946.

Bill came home to Ohio and he and Gladys married in 1947. Bill came from a family of brick and stone masons and took up the trade to support his growing family by building homes as the nation mobilized to fill employment needs for the former soldiers and sailors who had served to win the war. The family had grown to include six daughters. In 1958 they moved to Tucson, Arizona then later to

Phoenix. In 1965 Bill accepted an offer that brought the family to Arroyo Grande, where he was hired to be the Methodist Camp Manager for an original term of 3 months, which, because of his valuable skills, turned out to be a much longer term of 9 years. While Manager, he also built the Manager's House at the camp and was

hired as a major builder on our current church Sanctuary that was finished in 1968. If you look around you will also see his work at the old barbecue pit, the planter beds and the outdoor atriums visible through the windows from inside the sanctuary.

Gladys, and their daughters, were very active in the camp operations when family campers came for visits and fellowship. They handled all the details of feeding the visitors. Gladys planned and cooked all the meals. The daughters were also much involved with camp programs that kept the visitors entertained and occupied with the mission of camp experience. The involvement and devotion of the whole Paulsen family helped make the Arroyo Grande United Methodist Camp a memorable experience for countless visitors from churches in California, Arizona, Nevada and Hawaii.

Our congregation has always recognized Bill and Gladys as the "go to" type of members who step up and help make things happen. They have served on the Board of Trustees, as Financial Secretary, organized barbecues, folded bulletins, served on the Staff-Parish Relations Committee, Esther Circle, Chancel Choir, Yellow Umbrella, Memorials and what ever service that needs to be done. They can always be found faithfully attending, and actively participating, in the regular business and planning meetings where members of the congregation work to sustain the operations and mission of our church.
