The Latest from the Trustees—March 13, 2018 Paul Holden, President

Children's Center director requested temporary room usage of 213/215 (formerly youth room) along with UMW boutique storage. Materials and books will be stored, a computer will be set up and staff meetings will be held in the space. Trustees voted to approve.

The President and a church member installed a new hose-sprayer for the commercial sink in the kitchen, and performed a dishwasher/sink repair. As we go forward, the business that furnishes chemicals for the dishwasher will be consulted first as they will do simple repairs for the cost of parts.



How did this happen?

Easter always falls on the first Sunday following the first full moon of the spring equinox, so while the day of the week, Sunday, stays the same, the date can vary by almost six weeks. This year Easter falls on April 1. Yes, April Fool's Day, a combination that hasn't happened since 1956.

Within the United Methodist Church, the focus is always to be on the Christian observance rather than the secular holiday when the two coincide. But that doesn't mean there can't be some humor. Just look at the irony.



The origin of April Fool's Day is unclear. One theory is that it came into being when the Julian calendar, which placed the new year around the March equinox, was replaced with the Gregorian calendar, which placed the new year January 1. People who didn't know about the change or refused to accept it and continued to celebrate the new year in the spring were called April fools.

The Rev. Taylor Burton-Edwards, a specialist in United Methodist worship, said the resurrection really was a joke on those in power at the time of the crucifixion. "They thought once Jesus was dead, he would be out of their way, things would go back to normal and they would continue to reign forever. The joke was on them. They may have been used as the instrument of death for Jesus, but they couldn't make him stay dead!"

"Jews ask for signs, and Greeks look for wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, which is a scandal to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles. But to those who are called—both Jews and Greeks—Christ is God's power and God's wisdom. This is because the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength." (1 Corinthians 1:22-25, CEB).



What does the Bible say?

*Many nations shall come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that God may teach us God's ways and that we may walk in God's paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem, God shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks. (Micah 4:2-3)

What does The United Methodist Church say?

*Whether it happens in the towns of northeastern
Nigeria, a suburb in the United States, the streets
of Australia, or an office in France, gun violence has
become an all-too-frightening phenomenon. We need
the reality of Micah's vision more than ever. (2016 Book
of Resolutions, #3428, "Our Call to End Gun Violence")

What do the facts say?

*Violence against women and girls worldwide is indisputably linked to small arms, which include revolvers and assault rifles. The best strategies related to reducing intimate-partner violence include stronger gun ownership regulations, policies that raise awareness about the

danger of firearms in homes, and interventions to change cultural attitudes towards guns in relation to concepts of masculinity.

*Firearms are the most frequent form of suicides in countries where guns are common in private households.

What do you say?

*Identify the health issues that people talk about privately and create spaces that remove stigma and shame to facilitate public education and advocacy. *Look for opportunities to participate in projects which go beyond simple health care measures like inoculation or clinics and address underlying causes of ill-health.
