Pentecost is one of the principal days of the Christian year, celebrated on the fiftieth day after Easter. The Greek word *pentecoste* means "fiftieth day." Pentecost is the day on which the Christian church commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and others assembled in Jerusalem. It



marks the beginning of the Christian church and the proclamation of its message throughout the world and is often referred to as the birthday of the church.

The liturgical color for Pentecost is red. Traditionally, Pentecost has been a day for baptisms. Because it was the custom in the early church for persons being baptized to wear white robes or clothing, the day also became known as Whitsunday, a contraction of white Sunday.

On May 6th, the sixth Sunday after Easter, we welcome to the pulpit former pastor Ehrhardt Lang along with his wife Cheryl. Ehrhardt will be the preacher of the morning at both the 8:30 and 10:30 services and will serve Communion at both services as well.

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Latest from the Trustees—April 10, 2018 Paul Holden, President

Trustees spoke with Food Pantry Manager about a freezer installed in the shed by the parking lot without consulting the Trustees. There was discussion about how we can better accommodate them and their storage needs in the future with a long term goal of designating space for them to use. We will continue this discussion at the next Church Council meeting.

WHAT IS A DEACONESS?

A deaconess is a lay person "called by God to a lifetime relationship in the United Methodist Church for engagement with a full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice and service." They are social workers, counselors, teachers, firefighters, nurses, artists, administrators and many other diverse forms of service. Their work is directed toward the world to make Jesus Christ known in the fullness of his ministry and mission.

According to the Book of Discipline, their aim is to "alleviate suffering; eradicate causes of injustice and all that robs life of dignity and worth; facilitate the development of full human potential; and share in building global community through the church universal." The term deaconess comes from Paul's letter to the Romans when he introduced Phoebe, a deaconess of the Church at Cenchreae. He described her role as someone holding a leadership role, serving her church and community unselfishly.

At one point, female (deaconess) and male (home missioner) were under the same category of the General Board of Global Ministries. In 2012 the Office of Deaconess and Home Missioners became an independent agency and remains part of United Methodist Women today. Today there are 650 active deaconess/home missioners worldwide and

FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

As I begin to prepare to attend the California Pacific Annual Conference in June, I have been reviewing some of last year's information. I was very impressed when I heard the new Bishop, Grant Hagiya, speak and thought maybe everyone might be interested in knowing more about him.

Grant Hagiya is the Resident bishop of the California-Pacific Annual Conference, which geographically extends to all of Southern California, Hawaii, and Guam.

He graduated with an Educational Doctorate in Organizational Leadership from Pepperdine University in 2012. Abingdon published his book, Leadership Kaizen, based on his dissertation on the Traits, Qualities and Characteristics of Highly Effective UMC Clergy in 2013. He is a graduate of the Claremont School of Theology, where he received M.A., M.Div., and D.Min. Degrees.

Prior to his election to the episcopacy, he served as the Sr. Pastor at churches in Berkeley, Gardena, and Los Angeles, California as well as the Los Angeles District Superintendent and Dean of the Appointed Cabinet of the California Pacific Annual Conference. Elected to the Episcopacy in 2008, he served for 8 years in the Greater Northwest Annual Conference, which includes 3 annual conferences: Alaska, Oregon-Idaho, and the Pacific Northwest. He is a member of the newly formed Commission on the Way Forward, tasked with forging a strategy on human sexuality for the United Methodist Church. He chairs the Leadership Focus Area of the 4 Areas of Focus for the United Methodist Church, and is a member of the Council of Bishop's Executive Committee. He is the current chair of the Council of Bishop's Task Force that plans the new Learning Retreats for all active Bishops. He is currently serving as President of the College of Bishops for the Western Jurisdiction. Grant is married to Janet, a high school librarian, and has three children, Lexie, Jamie, and Trent.

At last year's conference he shared some of his thinking. He stated that we (the church) must change. "The Society has changed so much around us, but the church has remained the same." A Pew Research statistic states that 1 in 4 Americans has no religious affiliation whatsoever (56 million Americans).... We are declining so fast that there is a deep sense of urgency that we must move on it now. We must instill a sense of vital growth and transformation in all of our local churches, and hold our clergy and laity accountable. The Annual Conference will resource the local churches, laity and clergy to fulfill these main priorities. The Annual Conference exists for the sake of local churches. Local churches do not exist for the sake of the Annual Conference. Local churches exist to make disciples – to transform the world. Local Churches need to emphasize the spiritual quest that people are going through and provide a safe space for people to ask their deepest questions of meaning, purpose and God; and they need to provide relevant platforms for spiritual quests. In order to create vital congregations we must have a Mission field engagement system. Every one of our local churches must have a Mission Field Engagement system and understand why it is important. He concludes.. "It is easier to act your way into a new way of thinking than to think your way into a new way of acting... A focus on practice rather than knowledge has proven to be the key element in bringing about lasting behavior change..."

History of the Prayer Shawl Ministry

In 1998 two women, Janet Bistow and Victoria Galo, who graduated from the Women's Leadership Institute at the Hartford Seminary in Hartford, CT began this ministry after completing a program in the Women's Leadership Institute. Since then it has spread to many places around the globe, bringing solace to many.



A prayer for the recipient is said as the knitter begins a shawl. The knitting process is meditative and the pattern is in multiples of three stitches that repre-

sent the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. After the shawl is completed, a blessing prayer is said before being given away. A card that has a prayer printed on it is attached to each shawl.

The possibilities for the gifting of a shawl are endless; bereavement, illness, celebration of a marriage, achievement, arrival of a baby, etc. A group of teenagers in one church knits small white baptismal shawls.
