#### A DIFFERENT LOOK AT HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Mr. Singha Naubon and his wife Thamonwan struggled to grow rice on their small farm. They were natives of Isan in the dry northeast of Thailand, the country's poorest region. His dream was to travel to a place where hard work would enable him to send money home.

Representatives of Global Horizons told him to come up with \$20,000 and they would send him to places to earn the money he needed for a better life. Mr. Naubon mortgaged his home and borrowed money to come up with the sum. The first place Global predecessor of the United Methodist Women. Horizons sent him was to Michigan, harvesting pumpkins. He was housed in a small unit with dozens of other Thai workers. After a month, they sent him to Colorado to work on a pig farm. When work shortly ran out, he requested a transfer to Hawaii because he heard the pay was better. Global Horizons resisted, but Mr. Naubon insisted, so in Hawaii, he harvested eggplant, tomatoes, cabbage and bananas.

Global Horizons was often weeks late in depositing his earnings, and after nine months, they told him there was no more work due to a problem

with his H-2A visa, a temporary work permit for agricultural workers.

Global Horizons abandoned Mr. Naubon, and his future took a turn for the better when he met an outreach worker from the Susannah Wesley Community Center who helped him file with the U.S. Government for certification as a victim of human trafficking.

This center came to be in 1899, also known as the Women's Home Missionary Society, which was a

Besides helping women exploited by sex traffickers, they listened to Mr. Naubon and other Thai men tackle illegal labor trafficking.

Mr. Singha Naubon worked two jobs to pay down his debt and saved enough to bring his wife and 7 year old daughter to Hawaii. UMW helped daughter Thanisorn enroll in first grade, and his wife to work part-time in a restaurant and enroll in an English-as-a-Second Language (ESL) program. They are working hard to build a new life for their family.








#### **October UMW Book Club**
