It's officially fall and we saw it in our preschool room as we learned about the color orange this past month. You saw lots of orange leaves, pumpkins and even orange elephants. We even made our own orange paint by mixing red and yellow. Although orange was our color of the month, we looked forward to seeing some green in our classroom because we planted some pumpkin seeds

and were waiting for them to sprout! In the meantime, thanks to all the families for bringing in some full-grown pumpkins for us to weigh, measure, sort by size and use for other fun experiments and activities. We moved on from Aa, Bb, and Cc to the letters Dd, Ee, and Ff. We read about dinosaurs, elephants and feathers. To welcome fall we added a Farmer's Market to the dramatic play center along with some fun costumes including a bee, firefighter, and a big puffy pumpkin, just to name a few. Our moral teaching was kindness, so we played Kindness Bingo. Ms. Elizabeth and I watched with kindness binoculars and saw many wonderful examples of kindness in our classroom including children sharing toys with one another, helping their friends up when they fell, putting away toys that they didn't take out, just to help out a friend, and lots of friendly greetings and hugs. Once we filled up the Bingo board, we celebrated with a picnic lunch! To prepare for fall colds, we learned about germs and worked really hard to wash our hands, fronts, backs, and in-betweens, along with making sure to dry them completely so the "throw up germ" doesn't hide in our wet hands. We also covered our coughs with our sleeves and washed our hands after we blew our noses. For our SAFE program we learned about using the crosswalk and looking both ways before crossing the street and even practiced this skill by taking a walk across the street to go on a leaf hunt. We also had an earthguake drill and learned about fire safety. As we move into November, we want to remind everyone that the backyard is very shady and therefore a bit chilly in the morning, so we encourage you to send your children in layers so they are warm enough outside and can be comfortable inside. Ms. Shirley and Mrs. Swati's Toddlers Fall has been exploding in our classroom during the month of October. We discovered the colors of fall through leaves and pumpkins. Children are having fun picking leaves from the backyard/courtyard. They painted with leaves using a variety of fall colors. The children explored hay, pumpkins, corn and leaves in our sensory bin. with pumpkins in the dramatic area and helped in making some delicious pancakes. We made a pumpkin pie together, Yum!! We have been learning about different shapes, like the crescent, oval, rectangle, triangle, square, star, and circle. Children are enjoying learning about owls, spiders and bats, through books, as well. They have also been playing with farm animals and imitating the different sounds that animals make. The children had the opportunity to explored the inside and outside of pumpkins. They scooped out the seeds and tasted them after they had baked. They also be helped to carve a pumpkin into a Jack-o Lantern. So far, we are working on getting to know each other and reviewing the classroom rules. The have now become more comfortable and adjusted to our class routines. We are learning to be thankful for the things that God has given us. They showed interest in pretending to cook The Young Toddlers (Even the newer ones!) are becoming more and more familiar with our classroom routines and have also grown in their interest in social interactions. They are starting to show excitement when they see each other and will look for ways to join each other in play, such as handing each other a play object or joining another child in an activity they see them engaged in. It is exciting to see how much they are learning and how much fun they are having at school and with each other. In October, I repeated many of the Songs and Stories that the group expressed interest in. They all enjoyed, and were able to maintain attention to, songs or stories that included some type of hands on experience for them, such as holding on to the animal play figures as we sang "Old McDonald" or holding on to the pumpkins after I used them for our "Five Little Pumpkins" chant. We continued to enjoy the hidden object game, we've been playing, during our "Song & Story Time", too. The group watches as I hide three different objects under individual scarfs and take turns trying to remember where the "tiny pumpkin" is hidden. This game is helping them to develop the concept of object permanence, and they have so much fun discovering what is hidden, whether they remember correctly or not. The children also enjoyed helping to make pumpkin pie and were able to learn about the cause and effect of the baking process; how a hard pumpkin could become soft and mashable, after being baked, and how mixing ingredients and baking them in a pie could produce something so warm and tasty. We have so much to be thankful for! I am thankful for the blessings of working with such precious children and the privilege of getting to know you, their families.
