Two brief worship opportunities begin the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday, March 6<sup>th</sup>



# GC2019 BISHOP'S REFLECTION: TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 2019

I greet you in the name of Jesus Christ!

By now you have probably all heard that the General Conference Special Called Session is now over, and **the Traditional Plan** prevailed (53% - 438 votes to 47% - 384 votes). Although it does have repressive ramifications to our LGBTQI community, the Judicial Council has ruled much of it unconstitutional. At the same time, this decision is also symbolic in its implications because it signals a turn of the United Methodist Church to a more judgmental and political entity that is against inclusion and for exclusion.

With this conservative turn, I have been deeply conflicted. The question is, "can I stay in a repressive and oppressive church with integrity?" After a sleepless night, I came to a new resolve. I believe I must stay in the UMC and lead our people within the geographical context we find ourselves in the West. We have been living the One Church Plan for decades, and I don't see why we should change that about us. We live and let live and it is totally consistent with the theology of John Wesley.

We cannot turn back at this point. We have come too far to make this conservative stance. In fact, I don't think that it is possible for us. I believe that even our more traditional churches have a deep tolerance based on our geography. I believe they know that we accept their theology and hopefully, we treat them the same as everyone else: with respect and dignity.

Now that the General Conference Special Called Session is over, it is time that we focus on what God is calling us to: Our mission and ministry in the very name of Jesus Christ! Nothing is more important than this. Nothing must distract us from this central purpose. Nothing must stand in the way of our ministries of compassion and care!

What I am calling us to do is to learn what God is trying to teach us through this Special Called Session and get to the business of being the church. We need to focus on making disciples of Jesus Christ. We need to engage our local neighborhoods and surrounding communities. We need to feed the hungry, house the immigrant, heal the sick, and preach the Good News.

It is important for us to confess our sins and shortcomings: Too many have been hurt and harmed in our theological wars. Too many have been hurt and harmed by being objectified by the church. Too many have left the church because they have not been welcomed or cared for. If there has been anything I have done personally that has offended or harmed, intentionally or unintentionally, I ask for your forgiveness. I pray that we will all seek such confession and forgiveness.

Most of all, we must turn to each other for healing and care. It is time to put our arms around each other and heal from harming each other. It is time for us to have hearts of peace and not hearts of war. It is time for us to support each other and care for each other.

Being away so long in St. Louis has drained and exhausted me. I long to come home and be back in ministry with all of you. I long for home where I belong.

Our year started with UMW Sunday and our new officers were introduced. We met soon after to plan activities for 2019.



# FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

While struggling to find something to write about for this month's Castanet article I stumbled across a little book by John Gooch entitled "Being A Christian in the Wesleyan Tradition". His chapter on "Spiritual Disciplines" caught my attention.

Gooch asks, **"What are we willing to do in order to grow in faith and in love for God and neighbor?"** What a great question at the time of the 2019 General Conference recently held in St. Louis to discuss the future of our denomination!

Gooch goes on to say, **"If we want to be the best we can be in anything, we have to work at it!"** Great musicians practice the piano or whatever instrument they play for hours at a time. Their practice needs to be as perfect as possible, so that their performance will also be as perfect as possible. Athletes also practice for hours on end. The spiritual life is no different. It requires diligent practice.

If we follow the example of John Wesley there are certain routines we practice as part of our spiritual growth. Wesley called these **"acts of piety"** and **"acts of mercy"**. Acts of piety are those disciplines that help us grow in faith and love of God. Acts of mercy are those that help us grow in love of neighbor, lived out in our daily lives.

Wesley suggests that Acts of Piety include: public worship, the Lord's Supper, family and private prayer, studying the Scriptures. Examples of Acts of Mercy include feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and prisoners, caring for the sick and educating the illiterate.

As we move through the weeks leading up to Easter, let's try to increase our practices of acts of piety and acts of mercy.

#### 1. HISTORY OF METHODIST MISSION

This article is continued from the February newsletter where we reviewed earlier history. To continue where We hear little about the crisis of our sisters and we left off last month:

These new models for Methodist mission and education abroad suggested new models for Methodist education in the United States. Education, especially higher education, became a training ground and eventual requirement for American Methodists going out as missionaries.

Colleges like Albion and Ohio Wesleyan were prime recruiting hubs for missionaries, while women's schools, like Chicago Training School for City, Home, and Foreign Missions, were founded specifically to produce mission I workers. Even though American Methodist education did I not lose its earlier concern with the upwardly mobile domestic poor, it added another function as a means of ( training those Methodists dedicated to replicating this model, in its colonial form, around the world.

In the mid-20<sup>th</sup> century, there was a strong movement toward independence in colonial nations and autonomy in their churches. These trends resulted in a critical rethinking of Methodist mission, first among indigenous leaders, and then in the British and American "home bases." Methodists, along with other Christians, sought

to decolonize missions, even up to the point of declaring, "Missionary, go home!"

Everett Lee Taylor Scholarship applications are now available online (www.worshipweekly.com) and in the church office . The purpose of this scholarship is to help deserving United Methodist students enrolled in accredited universities, college, and technical schools defray the cost of their education.
