MUSINGS...

Have you ever read THE SCREWTAPE LETTERS by C.S. Lewis? It's that Christian apologetic novel he wrote in 1942 that he dedicated to J.R.R.Tokien. It's satirical and takes the form of a series of letters from a senior demon Screwtape to his nephew Wormwood, who is a Junior Tempter. The uncle mentors his nephew as his nephew seeks to secure the damnation of a British man known as "the Patient." Entertaining to say the least!

I submit some brief quotes that captured my imagination. We might place this first quote in the context of our crazy political arena and consequently stop short of all hasty judgments:

"Suspicion often creates what it suspects."

It might also give us pause when placed into our United Methodist context, post Special Conference 2019. Often what we fear and suspect in others is nothing more than a mirror to our own soul. Let's pray for others and for ourselves lest we judge what is God's alone to judge. How about this one?

"Pilate was merciful till it became risky."

The church is often guilty of such. We are merciful until it becomes risky. Sometimes the way we "get along" is to avoid important conversations and their consequences. Let's pray for the boldness to tackle the honest conversations that need to happen in our day in order to move forward in the Grace of God.

I was *ever so grateful* to the man who walked out the door on Sunday March 10th when I preached inclusion more clearly and boldly than ever before just after the Special General Conference. He said in essence, *"Pastor, I don't agree with you at all, but I love you."* This man is willing to enter the conversation! Thanks be to God. Amidst all the joys and blessings of pastoral ministry, one disappointment remains within me since childhood. As a child, youth and young adult I so hoped that "church" would be the one place where we could talk about anything and it just isn't so. Let's pray for the openness and willingness to have conversations that can make a difference for us all.

The Senior Demon in THE SCREWTAPE LETTERS says to his apprentice:

"A moderated religion is as good for us as no religion at all —and more amusing."

Let's pray for bold faith and "on fire" religion that goes forth like John Wesley and other heroic forebears to make a difference in the world around us.

"For the Present is the point at which time touches eternity."

We remember with love, Virginia Mothes. August 9, 1940 — March 23, 2019

Virginia Mothes submitted this article for the April Cast~a~Net on March 20 for her contribution as Publicity Chair for our UMW.

It's morning in Kenya, Africa. Wandering sleepily 12-yearold Kamali contemplates the long trek to collect the day's water supply for her small village. As with most victims of tragedy, Kamali has been tossed into the chaos of survival. Instead of carting school books to class, Kamali now carts a 40-pound jug across miles of rough, isolated land to fetch uncontaminated water.

Kamali gets ready to make the harsh daily journey alone and unprotected. She stoops down to lift the heavy 20 litre jug and places it wearily on the top of her tiny head. Without any sign of defiance or fear, she steps forward.

Returning at dusk, she hides the hurt of tired feet and aching shoulders. Her eyes tell a different story. Tiredness and hunger aren't the only problems she faced. Before she gets to the river, she passes several busy roads with rushing vehicles and motorbikes. Rape on routes to rivers is very common in this HIV-infected region. water-filled jug, she looks exhausted. Her voice is barely a whisper, and her face is depleted of expression. And that's what life is like for Kamali and hundreds like her. More than 70% of females in Sub-Saharan Africa alone spend each day bringing clean water to keep their communities going. Together, their daily journeys total 200 million hours. Many people in Kamali's community and its surroundings are infected with and have died from Typhoid, Dysentery, Cholera, Bilharzia and other waterborne diseases.

They depend on the rivers for irrigation, drinking water, washing clothes, bathing plus letting their animals drink from it. Water contamination, lack of sanitation and poor hygiene are a few of the biggest causes of death. We desperately need to educate afflicted communities on how to disinfect polluted water used for cooking, bathing and agriculture. They also need to know how to conserve water.

Please look into organizations that are involved in education and enabling communities to learn how to protect themselves from the water scarcity that they will face in the all too near future.

When Kamali arrives home several hours later with her


UMW COMING EVENTS

Gifts that keep on Giving

The Tree of Life in the Narthex is a symbol of longevity. It has many gold-colored leaves and larger plaques around the perimeter. Each one is a memorial in memory and honor of the life and service of a family member or friend. Donations to have a leaf or plaque added to the Tree of Life can be made to the Endowment Board. Please refer to the brochure adjacent to the Tree, or contact the Church office.

Donations can be designated for a specific program or project, or undesignated. Undesignated donations will be invested or used by the Endowment Board.

Most of the money used to start the early Endowment Fund came from the wills or trusts of former members who wanted to establish a 'Perpetual Fund", and have the principle invested in the stock market. For many years, a portion of the investment gains in the Endowment Funds has been used to augment money from pledges and regular giving to support the programs and projects of the church. Even though the stock market was down in 2018, the Endowment Board distributed to Mission/Education programs (\$6,466), People's Kitchen (\$4,200), Children's Center (\$10,000), and Classroom flooring (\$2,770).

Romans 12:6-8

GOD'S STEADFAST LOVE...IN ACTION

1. HISTORY OF METHODIST MISSION

This month we continue the story of Methodist education and decolonizing mission. In the mid-20th century, there was a strong movement toward independence in colonial nations and toward autonomy in their churches. These trends resulted in a rethinking of Methodist mission, first among indigenous leaders, and then in the British and American "home bases." Methodists, along with other Christians, sought to decolonize missions, up to the point of declaring, "Missionary, go home!"

These developments in mission, church, and secular politics affected how Methodist schools interpreted and carried out their mission tasks. In most cases, Methodist schools, colleges, and universities formerly run by Western missionaries were taken over by local leaders. (In other cases, such as China, mission-run schools were taken over by secular governments.) This pattern of national control of Methodist education occurred as former mission churches became autonomous churches. It also occurred when national bodies remained affiliated with The United Methodist Church as in the Philippines. This shift to local leadership did not always imply the complete absence of Western missionaries, but it did allow local leaders to design educational programs to be most relevant to reforming their particular nation, while retaining the holistic focus on religious and socio-economic transformation.

These developments did not put an end to missionary involvement in Methodist education around the world. Africa University stands as testimony of a recentlyfounded school born through international, cooperative mission with a pan-African focus. (To be continued next month).
