
We ended our Fiscal Year June 30. Despite our inability to worship together as a congregation since mid March, our overall Stewardship ended up at 99.9% of plan. Easter offering was above plan though we were not able to worship together for Easter. Tithes and Offerings remained essentially at plan for the last 3 months of the year. Though some gave less, others increased their giving. We have a generous and loving congregation that is doing what it can to sustain us through this difficult time. Thank you.

Overall we ended the Fiscal Year with a modest surplus. This was helped by the Annual Conference temporarily reducing our Apportionments and Pension Contributions. It is not clear how much longer they will continue this benefit. The savings however were largely offset by an increase in our printing and mailing expenses for our weekly Pastor's Letter. There was a decrease in staffing costs due to the elimination of some positions that are not required when we are not meeting while other staff are voluntarily forgoing salary. Our Choir Director, Julie, has stepped up to the plate to help us as videographer and editor. You can find a link to our innovative weekly video worship services on our website worshipweekly.com and on YouTube. We are looking for contributions to help us purchase a new computer and video editing software. The system we are using is old and inadequate.

We are not doing an annual Pledge Drive until there is more certainty as to when and how we can again meet together safely. I am asking everyone to continue to give what they have been giving these past few months. This should be sufficient to sustain us as we go forward, until we can meet again in person.

### FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

As I looked at my calendar recently, I realized that Dick and I and several others from our church had planned to be in Germany right now! We were scheduled to go with the District Superintendent, Jim Powell and his wife Stephanie, and Methodists from all over the Southern California area on a trip to Oberammergau, Germany to see the Passion Play. This is a play that has been presented by the townspeople of this small village every ten years since 1634! The reason for such an endeavor – to commemorate "the plague" that struck this town and most of Europe in 1632.

As related in the book, "The Passion Play, Living the Story of Christ's Last Days", Europe had just endured the brutal Thirty Years War. One of the outcomes of the war was disease, especially one that was labeled "the plague", probably the bubonic plague. It was very contagious and spread quickly, carried as people traveled home after the war. The disease had flu-like symptoms.

The town of Oberammergau decided to close its borders to all to prevent the spread. Anyone entering the village without permission would be locked up and quarantined for a period of time. But one man, who had been away fighting the war, was missing his family so much that he snuck back into town even though he "had a nagging headache and fever" as the story goes. His wife and children unknowingly contracted the disease and as they interacted with the people in the village they spread the disease. Eventually all his family died and the town realized their safeguards had failed.

By the summer of 1633 eight-four villagers of Oberammergau had died of the plague. The people of the town turned to God and held a prayer gathering before a crucifix (that still stands in the sanctuary of the parish church today). They asked God to spare them and their prayers were answered. No more deaths attributed to the plague occurred in Oberammergau! As part of their prayers the people made a vow to God that they would perform a passion play every ten years and so a tradition was born that has continued until now.

I can't help but wonder what will be the result of the "plague" we are now enduring – Will people turn to God? Will we be more thoughtful of others?

The SLO County Food Bank newsletter recently had this statement:

"Think about the story you want to tell many years down the line when someone asks you, 'What did you do during the Great Pandemic of 2020?' then live that wonderful story today. These are defining times for us all. How people respond in this moment can be the story of a beautiful opportunity captured, a missed opportunity, or a stain. Continue to choose the beautiful opportunity!"

Stay well. Wear a mask. Wash your hands a ridiculous number of times every day, and then wash them again! Maintain your distance from those outside your household. If you feel ill or believe you've been exposed, get tested and self-isolate. Call a friend, read a book, play a game, go for a walk, say a prayer!



#### UMM IS NOT ALL FELLOWSHIP

The United Methodist Men have a long history in our church as a group that gathers together men in Christian fellowship. The emphasis on Christian beliefs and practices has been the keynote of the organization. The cabinet has always contained a chaplain to lead in prayer and read religious stories. This position has been filled well by Kent Unsworth over the past few years.

In addition to fellowship there is another side to the organization. For over 30 years the men have sponsored breakfast meetings and trips of general interest to the members. In the last few years, the group has sponsored trips to Vandenberg AFB, the Getty Museum, Hearst Castle, the sea lions at San Simeon, Camp San Luis, Hunter Leggett Army Base, Arroyo Grande Police Station, and the Melsheimer manufacturing plant.

Another side of the organization is raising money for other Church groups. Over the past 30 years the group has raised thousands of dollars for groups in our church that do not have an operating budget or are in need of special funds. Each year the UMM Cabinet disburses the balance of the UMM account to these needy organizations. The money comes from pancake breakfasts, BBQ's, taco buffets, and other fundraising events.

In the past few years, the group has opened up its activities to women of the Church and has had good participation in many events.

There are no membership fees for those participating in the UMM program. It is open to all men in the Church.

As in the total church program, the men's group has been severely curtailed by the current pandemic virus. But they are looking forward to a grand re-opening with a "Welcome Home BBQ", whenever the Church gets back in operation. Until that day – consider joining the UMM, an organization worthy of your participation.

A message from Maddy Quaglino, Director of AGUMCC.

Many of you have been wondering what has been happening since the school closed March 18, 2020. The staff was on the premises through April 10, 2020, and all teachers were laid off.

Since April, Mary Throndson and I have attended meetings to learn about the new regulations created by the COVID 19 outbreak in our communities.

Together, we have completed a Plan of Action Application to Re-Open the Children Center through the California-Pacific Annual Conference and the Business Readiness to Re-Open Self Certification through the County of San Luis Obispo. All information used to develop Re-Opening Plans came from the San Luis Obispo County Office of Emergency Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), and Community Care Licensing Department (CCLD) for the COVID 19 pandemic. With new guidelines and procedures in place, we have developed staff training and parent Orientation Information Packets. It is our goal that staff and families be well-informed, confident in our readiness to re-open and that we put everyone's safety first.

We have updated our school's technology, signing-up to use Childpilot which is an All-In-One cloud-based childcare management system. It will help us perform day-to-day administrative tasks more efficiently, enhance parent communication, provide online tuition payments and touch-free daily attendance tracking. Each classroom will have new ipads to use with the Childpilot software, to manage children's portfolios, and to offer hands on research and learning opportunities for the children.

We have spent many hours adding fresh paint to all classrooms, shelving, and benches. We have cleaned materials, tossed out old materials, and added black out curtains and valances where needed. The church Trustees have been busy building storage in the courtyard for use by the Children's Center.

I would like to give a special THANK YOU to Mary, Susan, and Bob Throndson, Bob Underwood, Joe Brown, Jim Alquist, Dave Bolterman, Dick Melsheimer, Stacy Inman, Pastor Mary, and Kassie Quaglino for the many hours of work they have offered the Children's Center. With everyone's help we have prepared and planned to create a safe environment for everyone when school is once again opened. We hope it will be very soon.


