I don't know any UM congregation in our area re-opening before the end of the year, HOWEVER, let's be about re-opening small groups and ministries NOW. Criswell is safe with card tables a little more than six feet apart. Let's help you be face-to-face insofar as possible. It's time for the most unusual holiday season ever. Give thanks as hope, joy and love continue to rise among us!



Gratitude

"Gratitude changes everything. A grateful heart makes all things new. I give thanks in all things knowing my good comes from You. I am grateful for each new day of life. I am grateful that I can sing. I am grateful for friends and family, for every living thing. I am grateful for the kiss of the wind on my cheek, for the sunlight on my face. I am grateful to know how it feels to be loved and for God's amazing grace. I give thanks. I am changed. I give thanks." This is a favorite anthem our choir has sung several times!

But the question today is "What are we grateful for during COVID-19"?

In many places around the world, the COVID-19 pandemic means perpetually living under the gun. When we walk out of our doors, we can't let our guard down. Even grocery shopping can feel fraught with danger. Moreover, many people fear for their jobs and future. This has also been a period of intense political conflict in the United States and of fires up and down the West Coast. Seeing threats everywhere triggers stress and anxiety. Threatening or just mundane pandemic conditions do not make fertile ground for gratitude. But giving thanks is a tool we can use in both of these circumstances. When we give thanks for everyday things, we make them visible again. When we're able to do that, numerous studies suggest, we give our happiness a little boost and train our brains to see the good, amid so much bad.

It's easy to feel grateful when life is good, says Robert Emmons, a leading expert on gratitude. But when disaster strikes, gratitude is especially worth the effort. A decade's worth of research on gratitude has shown me that when life is going well, gratitude allows us to celebrate and magnify the goodness. But what about when life goes badly? My response is that not only will a grateful attitude help, it is *essential*. It is precisely under crisis conditions that we have the most to gain by a grateful perspective on life. In the face of demoralization, gratitude has power to re-energize. In the face of brokenness, gratitude has power to heal. In the face of despair, gratitude has power to bring hope. In other words, gratitude can help us cope with hard times.

It is vital to make a distinction between *feeling* grateful and *being* grateful. We don't have total control over emotions. We cannot easily will ourselves to feel grateful. Being grateful is a choice, a prevailing attitude that endures and is relatively immune to the gains and losses that flow in and out of our lives. When disaster strikes, gratitude provides perspective from which we can view life in its entirety and not be overwhelmed by temporary circumstances. Yes, perspective is hard to achieve—but my research says it is worth the effort. Crisis can make us more grateful, but research says gratitude also helps us cope with crisis. Consciously cultivating an attitude of gratitude builds up a of psychological immune system that can cushion us when we fall.



1. GOD'S STEADFAST LOVE...IN ACTION

On April 6, 2019 a fire partially destroyed United Methodist Hartzell High School. The school, located at Old Mutare Mission, not far from Africa University, has alumni in many different parts of the world. The Hartzell Old Student Association set their sights on restocking the library, which lost an estimated 40,000 books. The school librarian since 1984, said millions of dollars' worth of books went up in flames in a matter of minutes. The Association started a "Buy a Book" crowdfunding campaign to raise money for the purchase of fiction and nonfiction books, textbooks and computers.

Many objectives were to raise money to buy textbooks and ensure the that school has adequate books and learning materials and to also equip the library with six desktop computers to access the internet. The shortage of books was exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic protocols, which discouraged students from sharing books.


