Love & Lent

On this, my first day back in the office after two weeks away, I am not yet waxing poetic, so I defer to the Apostle Paul with the beautiful words of I Corinthians 13 to set the scene for Valentine's Day and a Lenten Season filled with love.

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

An Ash Wednesday Service is not in the cards for 2021, so on the heels of Valentine's Day we will launch the Lenten Season on the First Sunday of Lent, February 21st. All season long we lift up love and focus on the sacrificial love of God demonstrated in Christ Jesus. Thanks be to God for the victory that is ours in Christ. It's good to be back! May Blessings of Love & Kindness come to You!

From the editor: The January 24th message to her students from Carolyn Russell, our Sunday School Teacher, is about Jesus meeting with Nicodemus and his teaching about God's interest in people's good hearts.

This is a message for all of us.

Hello,

Our story today continues about Jesus. Jesus' ministry had begun. His early miracles included turning water into wine, casting out demons, and healing people. John 2:23 says that "many believed in his name when they saw the signs he was doing." Jesus likely spent a large part of His day teaching. When the day was done, He spent time alone or with His disciples. One night, a man named Nicodemus approached Jesus.

The story brings us into their conversation. Pharisees, or the religious leaders of the time, were big-time rule followers. Many Pharisees did not understand the words of Jesus. They felt challenged by what Jesus had to say. This story is about one religious leader, Nicodemus, who decided to talk more with Jesus so he could understand what God wanted him to do. Nicodemus held to the belief that if a person was a lawabiding Jew, he would be accepted by God. Jesus gave Nicodemus a lesson that would turn his belief system on its head. He met with Jesus at night, because the other leaders did not like Jesus.

Jesus was a carpenter (Mark 6:3), so the religious teachers likely assumed He didn't know theology. But

they had seen Jesus' miraculous signs in Jerusalem. Nicodemus had to conclude, "You are a teacher who has come from God" (John 3:2).

Nicodemus finds out from Jesus' conversation that God looks at people's hearts. Jesus uses the opportunity to teach Nicodemus about who really comes from God. To come from God means to be born of God. What does this mean? Jesus is more interested in Nicodemus's heart. Knowing God isn't about having all the right answers. It is about a real and growing relationship with God.

By learning about God and Jesus, we can find out how God wants us to live. Caring for one another helps us to have good hearts full of love for one another. God looks at our hearts. He looks at our actions which are guided by our hearts. When we follow the ways God wants us to be, God can see our good hearts. What are some ways to have a good heart?

Remember, God gave his only son Jesus to us! When we follow his word and believe, we can be born of the Spirit. We can enjoy the rewards of eternal life.

Keep safe! God is watching over us and helping us. Help one another by wearing your masks, washing your hands and keeping your distance from one another. God is with us daily. He sees our good hearts.


One year ago we celebrated **UMW Sunday** in person in our beautiful church sanctuary. Advance forward in time one year, and you see a very


A Message from Maddy



Gandhi lived. It was a very simple room with his sleeping mat and as I recall a book or two and maybe another item or two.

His life modeled simplicity, nonviolence and compassionately helping people. (If you are looking for a way to spend three hours while you are spending time at home, check out the film "Ghandi".)

On this trip we saw the living spaces of people in different countries. We learned how they live in ways that are different from the ways we live, certainly with a lot less consumption of the world's resources.

As we were eating breakfast in Hong Kong, our speaker was helping us understand the lives of those living there. I remember a statement that he made which remains with me today. "What you eat for breakfast in the United States has an effect on the rest of the world."

This may be on my thinking about the second part of the quote: What changes do I need to make so that I can see the changes in the world that I would like to see?

These changes are not easy. We don't live in isolation, even though right now it seems like we do. I hope that I can spend some time right now finding ways to affect the world positively. How do we teach ourselves to want less and to buy less? How do we determine how many things we need, as opposed to how much we want? How can we include others in ways that our lives become more equal in income, health needs, education? The list grows.


Sharing some of our abundance with UMCOR is one way to be in mission and ministry with others around the world.
