

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

Healthy Corner By Patti Melsheimer

Have you visited a hospital emergency room recently???

Emergency rooms (ER) have changed a great deal. The reasons why ERs can no longer offer access to immediate care are complex. Emergency department visits have risen 27% in ten years, according to the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP). At the same time, some 2,000 ERs nationwide closed altogether, resulting in dramatic increases in patient volumes and waiting times at the remaining facilities. Add to that the increased numbers of elderly, chronically ill patients with AIDS or diabetes and skyrocketing numbers of patients without insurance or primary care doctors, and you have "an extremely difficult situation even without a major health crisis." The majority of the nation's 4,000 hospital emergency departments report they are operating "at" or "over" critical capacity, and an ambulance is diverted every minute in this country-sent to another, farther ERthanks to the overcrowding.

The (ACEP) advises anyone experiencing a medical emergency to take the following steps to ensure their best chances of survival and good care in the chaotic ER environment:

- Avoid the ER if at all possible. Take advantage of local urgent care clinics and your own doctor. At the same time, if you have any signs of a serious health issue, like trouble breathing, chest pain, severe abdominal pain or uncontrolled bleeding, absolutely seek out the ER."
- > Especially avoid trauma centers on Friday or Saturday nights. They are very busy and you will have to wait much longer than other times.
- > Bring all medications. Bring anything you are receiving for chronic medical problems, such as heart medications, blood thinners, insulin, even aspirin. It will help in your evaluation and treatment.
- > If you are on blood thinners, mention it to the triage nurse. It will accelerate your evaluation and might prevent serious complications.
- > Bring someone with you. Having someone who can serve as your voice, get information for you and help keep information straight is critical in the busy environment of the emergency department.
- ➤ If your medical condition worsens while waiting, let a nurse know. All emergency departments use a triage process, which means the most critically ill or injured patients are seen first. However, sometimes a patient will come in with mild symptoms, and while they are waiting, their medical condition worsens," says an ACEP statement. "It's very important for emergency patients in waiting rooms to notify the triage nurse if they are in pain or if they start to feel worse. If they are still concerned, they should ask to speak to an emergency physician or a patient advocate. People should not leave the emergency department without being seen.
- Insist on being seen by a physician if you are uncomfortable with the diagnosis. Many ERs get through their long lines of patients by having nurse practitioners or physician assistants help with the load. Do not be afraid to ask if the person treating you is a doctor, and if not, to insist you want a doctor's opinion.
- > If there is a delay, do not shout at the nursing or medical staff. People go into emergency medicine because they want to help people in crisis. They are not being rude -they are busy taking care of much sicker patients. Show some courtesy.
- Bring a book or magazine. For most non-crisis ER visits, you are in for a long wait.

What do I need to do to join the Sew 'n' Sews?

Show UP! All you need to do is come to the McMillen Room between 9 and 10 AM on Tuesdays. Bring your sewing kit if you have one with a thimble, needle, and scissors. We probably have what you don't have.

Can someone teach me to learn the quilting basics?

Where do the quilt tops that you quilt come from?

Many church members have requested our work and many come from the community when they are looking for our services.

Baby guilt tops have been donated in the past and we still have a number of them to be guilted.



Not usually. The quilts belong to individuals who want their tops finished and are willing to pay for the work. We do sell the baby quilts if we have enough quilters to keep the donated tops quilted. Watch For A Drawing!! We have a "Cat Quilt" that has just been completed. This is a first for our quilting group! We made the whole quilt from the get-go. This is a very colorful quilt and it will come with two pillow shams. Keep your eyes peeled for more information.

What happens to the money collected for the quilting?

We are a service group. All monies received are donated to the United Methodist Women Missions Project.

How long does it take to complete a quilt and how much thread is used?

Lots of variables enter into the equation. Usually a queen size takes 6 months or longer to complete, and two spools of thread are usually enough.

How long has there been a quilter's group in this church?

The quilting group has been here at the church for about 125 years.

Is this group all work and no play?

We are a "close knit" group who look forward to Tuesdays and there is plenty of socializing when we get together to quilt!

Come and give us (and quilting) a try! We need you!

selection of the new UMM president to take office before 2009;


- a questionnaire was distributed to determine programs for the coming year;

From sunset on Easter Eve until the day of Pentecost, white and gold are used. Other symbols are often flowers, butterflies, peacocks, and the phoenix. The day of Pentecost is symbolized with red along with the descending dove and rainbow. Red is the color of fire and love. You will see it used on the Day of Pentecost and any other time when the Holy Spirit is emphasized.

Season After Pentecost is from the first day after Pentecost through the day before Advent. The first Sunday After Pentecost is known as Trinity Sunday and is symbolized with white. All Saints' Day (November 1) or the first Sunday of November white is also used. The second Sunday through the next to last Sunday is green and the combinations of colors and colors other than the basic four are considered appropriate during this season.



Martin Luther who is considered the Father of the Protestant reformation wrote A Mighty Fortress Is Our God. Psalms 46 serves as the inspiration for this clas-A Mighty Fortress Is Our God sic Christian hymn. The hymn's strong and powerful verses echo the same spirit of faith that David wrote

with in the Psalm. The music and lyrics of the hymn were a battle cry to many martyrs during the Reformation. In fact, upon Luther's death, the first line from "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" is etched on the great reformer's tombstone.

Martin Luther (1483 – 1546) had strong convictions with regard to religion and music. In 1517, he nailed ninety-five theses to the door of the Cathedral of Wittenberg, Germany. Reformation Day is celebrated by Protestants on October 31.

This action was considered to be the "Declaration of Independence" to liberal thinkers of that day. A Mighty Fortress Is Our God was one of the major musical contributions of Martin Luther along with Away In A *Manger.* Luther was also known for his doctrine that salvation is not based on works but by faith alone.

Today we sing in church as a congregation as a result of Martin Luther. On the subject of lay A Mighty Fortress Is Our God

A mighty fortress is our God, a bulwark never failing; Our helper He amid the flood of mortal ills prevailing. For still our ancient foe doth seek to work us woe; His craft and pow'r are great, and, armed with cruel hate, On earth is not his equal.

Did we in our own strength confide, our striving would be losing; Were not the right Man on our side, the Man of God's own choosing. Dost ask who that may be? Christ Jesus, it is He; Lord Sabaoth is His name, from age to age the same, And He must win the battle.

And tho' this world, with devils filled, should threaten to undo us: We will not fear, for God hath willed His truth to triumph through us. The prince of darkness grim - we tremble not for him; His rage we can endure, for lo! his doom is sure, One little word shall fell him.

That word above all earthly powers, no thanks to them abideth; The Spirit and the gifts are ours through Him who with us sideth. Let goods and kindred go, this mortal life also: The body they may kill; God's truth abideth still, His kingdom is forever.

It is a gift that God gave to birds and to men. We need to remove hymn singing from the domain of monks and priests and set the laity to singing. Have you wondered what the colors on the altar mean? Or the significance of the color of banners in the sanctuary? Have you questioned the colors of the stole that pastors wear at worship services and what they represent?

Throughout Christian history, certain symbols and colors have become associated with major and minor festivals, special occasions, and seasons in the church year. In the western culture of the church, tradition associations are with the following colors and themes:

Blue—hope, love, truth, faithfulness, heaven

White—purity, holiness, innocence, faith and light

Purple—royalty, repentance, remorse

Black—sin, death, evil

Scarlet—royalty, loyalty

Red—fire, love

Green—growth, victory, hope, God's abundance, marriage

The Christian year contains two cycles: the Christmas Cycle (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany) and the Easter Cycle (Lent—Easter –Pentecost.) Within each cycle are a preparatory season symbolized by the color **purple** for royalty repentance and remorse; and a festival season symbolized by the color white—purity, holiness, innocence, faith and light. Between each cycles the color green is used symbolizing growth, victory, hope and God's abundance.

Purple is used during the preparatory season of Advent and Lent . Advent is the first season in the Christian year. This season always includes four Sundays and starts on the first Sunday after November 27th and ends at sunset on December 24th. Advent wreath with four *purple* candles is lighted successively on each of these Sundays and was first used by the Protestants in the German Lutheran church. The Circle of the wreath represents God's unending love; made of evergreens that symbolizing the hope of eternal life in which the four purple (or sometimes blue) represent the four weeks of Advent, with the white candle in the center lit on Christmas Eve or Day. One candle is lit on each Sunday until all candles are lit. As the fresh candle is lighted, the others are relighted to prepare our hearts and minds for the birth of our Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ.

Christmas is a season whose colors are represented by white and gold. White and gold are joyous and festive colors which set the tone of the Christmas season that begins at sundown on December 24th and continues until January 6th.

Season after epiphany is celebrated from January 7th until the day before Lent. The first Sunday after Epiphany (or the Baptism of our Lord) is symbolized by white and the second through next to last Sunday after Epiphany by the color green.

Lent begins on the seventh Wednesday (also known as Ash Wednesday) before Easter to sunset on the Eve of Easter is symbolized by purple, grey and dark earth colors. Burlap and other rough textures are often used during this time. **Red** is added during Palm Sunday and Holy Week to symbolize the blood of Christ. Often during service on Palm Sunday, we use palm fronds to remind us of the event. All crosses may be veiled during Lent, especially during Holy Week and absolutely on Good Friday. Any dark color or white is used on Maundy Thursday and often churches strip all visuals from the sanctuary and do not replace them until after the first service of Easter. No color is used on Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Continued, COLORS, page 15



The Protestant Reformation

Reformation Day is celebrated by most Protestant churches on October 31. Consider this important contribution of Martin Luther, one of the main leaders of the Reformation.

Luther was considered the Father of the Reformation. His life was threatened due to his protesting of certain activities he felt did not befit the Church. Luther went into hiding and found refuge as the guest of the ruler of Saxony in Wartburg Castle.

How was Luther to pass the time until it was safe for him to begin preaching and teaching openly again? He translated the Bible from the original languages into German. It was not an easy task. There were various versions of the German language spoken across that country. The different dialects made it difficult for those from any given section of the country to communicate easily with those from another.

Luther's Bible, therefore, was a great gift to the German people. The words he used — which, by the way, he checked with the castle's butcher to make sure the common person could understand — actually enabled the German people to have a unified language. In a real sense, Martin Luther was the father of the German language used today.

Protestants recall the Reformation to remember that day in 1517 when Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses on a church door in Wittenberg, Germany.

Ultimately, the following five statements of belief became central to Protestant Christians.

- Scripture alone is the final authority of Christian doctrine.
- **➣** Christ alone is Lord and Savior.
- ➢ God's freely given grace is central to salvation.
- Sinners are justified by faith in Christ alone.
- ➢ God alone is worthy of all the glory.



Trustees Report

Church Council 4 September 2008

This report covers both August and September meetings.

August Meeting

- > It was brought to the attention of the trustees that the nursery was not fit for babies. A few took one look and left. The Children's Center was asked to remove all animals and have the carpet cleaned. This was done immediately. A portable crib was donated and the room is now ready for Sunday services.
- > Mentioned also was the fact that the Children's Center is using the McMillen Room which was initially set as off limits. A letter was drafted by the Children's Center, to the Trustees asking for reconsideration.
- > David Beaman asked for clarification as to who is responsible for the posting of the sign on Halcyon Road. The Board agreed that the Communications Committee will hold this responsibility.
- New rain gutters have been installed and are paid for.
- Account 5600 is set up for the building fund. Monies have been donated for certain projects and deposited into the Building Fund. Where they get mingled with other monies. To prevent this, additional accounts have been set up to identify the designated funds. For example, 5601 is remodeling the Women's Bathroom account; 5603 Landscaping. If necessary, more will be created.
- > Tom Egan presented to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee a request and plan to purchase a Parsonage. The answer was NO and all plans to do so ceased.
- > The beauty of the women's bathroom is due to Mrs. Betty Lorenz and her hard work.
- > The Boy Scouts have asked permission to do another Eagle project. They want to design and install a sign just outside the main entrance to the Children's Center. Norm Henderson made a motion that the sign be attached to 4X4 posts not permanent to the wall. Motion was carried.

September Meeting

- > Tom Egan moved to have a short meeting as the US Tennis Open was on. Motion carried.
- The Boy Scout representative was present to formally present his outline for the Eagle Project. The board gave complete approval. The removal of two 8 foot sections of the hedge outside the Children's Center will be necessary.
- > Children's Center director, Maddy Quaglino, presented a letter to the board explaining that she was given permission to use McMillen Room but it was not approved by the Board. The Board was unanimous in approving her request to use the room when not in use.
- Landscaping is being continued. The two areas by the main driveway are done; two dead plants in the North Atrium have been replaced; the drip lines on Bennet Street have been looked at. There is more work to be done. The watering program will have to be changed to conform with the city of Arroyo Grande's new watering schedule.
- The interest from the Parsonage account amounted to \$7,429.25 and has been deposited to the Building Fund account 5600.
- > As part of the adult education program, the sanctuary is being used every Tuesday night for a community choir rehearsal.
- Pastor Burgeson is concerned about ANY people using his office. Hence forth, the door leading to the sanctuary, just outside the office will be left open during this time. Please give him and any person in conference with him privacy.
- > A motion was passed to install a basketball hoop for the youth. Pastor David asked who used Criswell Hall on a special night, but no one knew. It was unknown so we will make use of the Calendar and event book in the church office to know what is going on in the church.
- Mr. Weimers is again sealing the posts in the Porticos.
- > A motion was made and passed to install a ceiling fan in Pastor David's office. This will involve redoing the ceiling lights to accommodate the new fan.


