


Campfire, Carols and Candlelight!



KEEPING HEALTHY FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Did you know that the week of December 4 - 10 is "National Hand Washing Awareness Week?" This doesn't seem like a very appropriate health article for December does it? And yet, we all want to make sure to keep healthy so that we can enjoy the holidays with family and friends. According to the Centers for Disease Control, "the most important thing you can do to keep from getting sick is to wash your hands." Judicious hand washing can prevent not only common diseases like colds, but also more serious diseases like hepatitis A, meningitis, and infectious diarrhea.

Here are six main rules of hand washing:

- Always wash your hands after using the bathroom, changing diapers, cleaning up after your pets, or handling money.
- Wash your hands when they're dirty.
- Always wash your hands before eating.
- Don't cough or sneeze into your hands.
- Refrain from putting your fingers in your eyes, nose, or mouth.
 Avoid touching people and surfaces with unclean hands.

In order to correctly wash your hands, make sure you:

- 1. Wet hands with warm water (not hot) and use soap.
- 2. Rub youf hands together, making sure to scrub all areas.
- 3. Rub for a minimum of 15 seconds or sing "Happy Birth day." (All the way through!)
- 4. Rinse thoroughly, then dry hands on a clean towel.
- 5. Turn faucet off with the towel, not hands, to keep away from recontamination.

By frequently washing your hands, you wash away germs that you have picked up from other people, or from contaminated surfaces, or from animals and animal waste. The simple act of consistently performing this basic task properly will make a big difference in your own household as well as in work, school and public settings.



Please take the colorfully decorated original tag for you to put on the UNWRAPPED gift. Second, write your name on the duplicate tag and leave it on the Christmas tree. We do this to ensure that any misplaced tags are recovered and no child is left wanting. Lastly, bring your Unwrapped toy to the church office for Jan Treat to pick up and deliver to the DPSS.

Please remember to turn in your manufacturers grocery coupons, a lot are in each Sunday newspapers. I send them weekly to our covenant missionary, Judy Atwood, in Manhattan, Kansas.

Labels and Box Tops for Education labels and UPC bar codes are mailed to the Red Bird Mission, Henderson Settlement, in the Appalachians to purchase many needed items, including: transportation vehicles to take people to and from medical appointments, to build clinics and schools along with various other community projects to help those in need. There is a NEW (as of November 2008), complete list of what to save available in the church library. If you are interested in participating, pick-up a copy.

The Five Cities Christian Women's Food Bank is ALWAYS in need of perishable food items to help fill up the reserve in the "bank" for our local citizens. See what you would be able to spend - \$5, \$7, each week and try to bring any items into the Narthex on Sunday. There is a food basket there to collect these items.

Don't forget about the greeting cards. These are sent to at least 3-4 locations. They are used by women who make "books" for children in the hospital and by adults in care facilities so that the residents make their own things for themselves or give to family members.

Aluminum pull tops are saved and turned into Ronald McDonald House in Pasadena, CA. This is in close proximity to Huntington Memorial Hospital and provides housing for families when their child has a medical problem and needs treatment.

Please remember that the few moments that it takes to collect any of these items will benefit a great many people. We appreciate any effort that you can make to help in these small ways.

You may turn in any of the above items to the library at any time for pick up to send them on their way to do their "work".




United Methodist Men

The Yellow Umbrella is responsible for programs and leadership in the area of Missions, Church and Society and local Outreach. It makes decisions regarding mission. i.e., The People's Kitchen, Five Cities Christian Women's Food Bank, Harvest

Bag, and other crisis and transient response.

We have a "Covenant Relationship for a Better World" and currently sponsor Judy Atwood our covenant missionary. In the past, we have supported up to 6 missionaries in covenant. This pays the missionaries salary.

The Yellow Umbrella also raises money, has a budget and receive funds from the Sanborn Fund to disperse to Mission; John Elmore, Andean Youth Project in Chile; Grace Hospice in Mongolia; Rev. Kayij in Tunisia; Rev. Henderson in Mexico-Give Ye Them to Eat; Five Cities Christian Food Bank; People's Kitchen and our youth Camp Colby. We raised funds for Smile Train, Doctors Without Borders and Habitat for Humanity though Alternative Christmas. In fact, on Mother's Day of this year we raised money for the Alaska Mission church where former member Sue McClure now attends.

People's Kitchen—our church members prepare and serve a hot lunch for the first Thursday of each month to women, children and men in need. Sign-up to prepare and help.

Five Cities Christian Women's Food Bank- Men and women help with collecting boxes of food from local Farmers' Markets on Wednesday and Saturday. Several grocery stores, donate to the Food bank in Grover Beach every week. They can use help going through the produce and cleaning or discarding some of it. They need volunteers to collect and distribute the food to qualifying families in South County. Part time help is always needed and will be a blessing to these dedicated workers.

TRUSTEES REPORT NOVEMBER 2008



- Morrie Gregory was invited to discuss Staff-Parish Committee' opposition to purchasing a parsonage. After consideration, the Board will pursue this task. With the losses in the money market, we too were hit and now have to re-evaluate our financial status and reconsider an acceptable price for our parsonage. Thank you for your time, Morrie!
- * The heater in nursery and all Children's Center rooms died. Af-From Tom Egan, *Trustee Chair* ter rejecting the quote of \$500 cost for parts and labor, we installed it ourselves—Cost: \$250. There is still more work to do-but it works.

An estimate for a roof mounted system was submitted at \$38,000. The Board decided to fix existing heater, as we do not have the money at this time for the purchase of a new one.

- * Lights are still being left on and doors either unlocked or locked but not latched. This means money is going down the drain and security is still an issue.
- * The Sanctuary roof does indeed have spots of mildew, but a good rain will help wash that off. No plans to do anything at this time.
- * The Trustees are still being frugal and are within budget. Due to our financial status in the Church, our 2009 budget will look a lot like 2008's budget.
- * Termites have been spotted and a company will be called out.
- * Our last little bit of rain left puddles at both entrances to the Narthex. The gutters have been cleaned. If this is not the single cause we have other ideas and will investigate.
- * Rich Walters asked the Board to consider buying a pneumatic lift (cost near \$7,000) that can be used to change lights in the Sanctuary and on the grounds. Last time lights were changed, OSHA would have walked out...major safety issues. No money at this time.
- * Mr. Walters also stated that it will be easy to add small lights to the new church sign out front to light up the end pieces with flame and the cross and "open hearts, open minds, and open doors". The Board approved and this will be done.
- * A shopping list has been created for the purpose of changing the lighting in Pastor David's office and in Sarah's office. This will commence on November 20 & 21.









The exceedingly popular and equally Holiday The exceedingly as lovely Christmas hymn, "It Came

Upon a Midnight Clear" was written in 1849 by Edmund Hamilton Sears, a Unitarian parish minister and author, to be used in a Sunday School Christmas Play.

Understood to be a conservative in his day, Sears wrote many theological works that were influential among liberal Protestants and both inside and outside the Unitarian church.

An American poem by right, Sears based his writing on the Gospel of Luke's account of Jesus' birth and the announcement to the field of shepherds that clear night when the angels declared 'peace on earth, good will toward men.'

Growing up, the youngest of three sons, Edmund Sears loved to roam the hilltops of his family farm and took a fancy to the rise up near heaven, where, "bright-robed messengers alighted and rested, as they came and went on their errands of love." Perhaps this is part of the inspiration and vision of leading to this beautiful piece.

The piece has been criticized in some circles, for its unscriptural references to 'prophet-bards' and 'age of gold' and for having no mention of the Christ-child. A British hymn scholar named Erik Routley was quoted over a century after the hymn was written to have said about the hymn that "in its original form, the hymn is little more than an ethical song, extolling the worth and splendor of peace among men."

However, Sears believed fully in the human Christ as a divine Christ. That Jesus was the incarnation of the "Divine World" and the mediator who alone would bridge "the awful gulf between God and man." Sears was heard by his congregation stating, "the word God may be uttered without emotion, while the word Jesus opens the heart, and touches the place of tears."

Whatever the heart of the author, this hymn song has become one of the most popular Christmas carols sung today and is now very popular among churches and is used extensively in Christmas pageants around the world. Sing these words with your whole heart and see what you think.



JESUS' BIRTH FROM A-Z

What you need:

- Paper
- Pencils or pens
- Bibles (optional)

What you do:

Instruct players to think of as many Christmas-related words as they can that start with each letter of the alphabet. Start with A and give everyone a minute to brainstorm words for each letter. For example, M words include manger, Mary and miracle. If you get stuck, look at the Nativity accounts in Matthew 1 and 2, and also Luke 2. Players get a point for each word not repeated by others.

PIN THE STAR ON THE MANGER

What you need:

- Butcher paper, poster board or plain wrapping paper
- Markers, paint or crayons
- Construction paper stars
- Tape
- Blindfold



On large paper, draw a picture of a stable. Give each player a star cutout. Put a small + above the manger where the star led the shepherds and wise men to baby Jesus. Like in Pin the Tail on the Donkey, the blindfolded person who puts his or her star closest to the + wins.
