

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
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## CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF

## Pauline Castillo

Our True Example of a Caring Church Member By David Beaman

Pauline Castillo was born in Dallas, Texas in June of 1924. She is the first of eight children. Born to a boot maker and cobbler, her father also owned an ice house, wood yard and barber shop. All the children had specific tasks to contribute to survive the effects of the Great Depression. The family bartered or handed out many food items and dry goods to the hungry and the destitute who passed through their town trying to exist during one of our countries most difficult times.

Matthew 5:13

Pauline's father, who immigrated from Mexico and later became a naturalized American citizen, maintained a stern attitude to instill in the

family the idea of hard work having a reward for survival and success. He always proudly displayed the American flag and emphasized to them the benefits of their birth as American citizens in the land of opportunity that was not available to him in Mexico. Although life was hard, Pauline looks back with admiration to her father's example.

When Pauline was 18 she was hired by North American Aviation at Hensley Field in Grand Prairie, Texas to work in a plant building B-24 and B-25 bomber aircraft during the WW II mobilization. She was hired as a riveter but her small size and 118 pound weight was too small for the work so she cross trained to become an expert acetylene welder with a knack for running a strong and smooth "bead" as required in airplane assemblies. She was proud of her work and of the opportunity to help prove that women could do the factory jobs and master the skills to produce sophisticated and reliable aircraft.

During her daily commute from home to work she became acquainted with Raul Castillo, a security guard / soldier from California. Her strict and protective father cautioned about "not talking to strangers or service men" but the relationship flourished even though they postponed asking the father's permission after twice obtaining marriage licenses. With the third license, Raul and her father had a man-to-man discussion, still not accepted, but her mother did agree, so they married anyway. As it turned out, Raul and Pauline shared a wonderful and loving 53 year marriage that produced their daughter Gloria and son Raul. Her husband passed away in 1996 after suffering from long term health problems and several very serious surgeries.

There was a Methodist Church in Dallas only 2 blocks from her childhood home where the family worshipped so, she has been a member her entire life. Her family has ascribed to the concept of "always giving back" for the blessings one enjoys. The committees she has served in Arroyo Grande

UMC are Esther Circle, UMW Executive Board, Finance Committee, Staff-Parish, Missions, Stephen Ministries, Vine Club, Education and she has her special connection with Membership Care. Among her closest friends was Doris Awalt who regularly visited nursing homes with her to bring encouragement and a sense of belonging and care to those who become quite lonely under their circumstances. All members know it most frequently is Pauline who speaks up during the "Joys and Concerns" segment of worship service to make a comment of the condition of someone who is struggling with illness, impairment or would appreciate company or companionship.

Pauline has always been the true example for how one can be a committed, meaningful and effective church member.

Our Chancel Choir meets every Wednesday evening at 7 PM in the sanctuary. See you there! Kent Unsworth, *Choir Publicity* 



## **The Red Umbrella:**

## What Do They Do?

Most of you probably know that there are four Umbrella Groups in our church: Blue, Green, Red, and Yellow. The Red Umbrella

Committee is involved with worship. Many different people have roles in this committee. One person is responsible for setting up the sanctuary with Banners and Paraments for each of the Liturgical Seasons of the year. She also makes sure the Choir Robes are cleaned and repaired, if necessary. She also coordinates the decorating of the sanctuary for special occasions like Easter and Christmas. The job is currently held by Irene Kliesch.

Another important function of the committee is worship music. This includes the Chancel Choir, Handbells, and the Lords Crew. The Chancel Choir performs a weekly Introit, Anthem, and Benediction under the direction of Julie Walters. The Handbell Choir performs 2 pieces during worship each month under the direction of Leonard Lutz. The Lords Crew, under the direction of Susan Coho, performs for the first worship service each week.

Another aspect of the committee is the Puppets. They perform one Sunday a month during the Children's moment under the direction of Willy Ford-Raetz. The Puppets may also perform on other occasions such as on Christmas and on Youth Sunday.

A crucial part of the Red Umbrella is the Multi-Media person. This person coordinates all aspects of sound and other media such as power point during the worship service. This also includes recordings and video. Mike Herber is the person currently handling Multi-Media.

The Red Umbrella also includes other activities involved in worship including the Altar Guild, Greeters, and Ushers. The Altar Guild are the people responsible for setting up the altar for communion, and coordinating the acolytes for the worship service. Lorie Ford is the person currently in charge of this. The Greeter Coordinator is Del Hollinger. There are currently 3 Head Ushers: Morrie Gregory, Dick Melsheimer, and Ann Williamson.

This group of dedicated individuals meet each month under the capable leadership of Chairperson Sharon Roemer. Working together with Pastor David, this committee helps to plan and coordinate the worship services. In addition, as one of the 4 Umbrellas, the Red Umbrellas works with the other Umbrellas to help to carry out the vision of the church.

Do you know that prostate cancer is the second most common cause of death from cancer disease for men? But fewer men are dying of prostate cancer than ever before. Still, 28,000 men a year are dying of prostate cancer according to medical statistics.

I was diagnosed with aggressive prostate cancer in early September 2008. After the results of a prostate biopsy and much discussion with doctors, I made the decision to move ahead with 42 radiation treatments and hormone injection therapy? Thus began the idea of living with the associated stresses and side effects linked to the treatment of prostate cancer, and now, knowing how it touches every aspect of your life.

The term "Cancer" may be the most frightening word in medicine. For any person to be diagnosed with cancer is a testament that your life will change suddenly and profoundly as you face tremendous physical, emotional, and spiritual challenges in your plan to fight the cancer and whatever might be the future outcome. By the way, it's okay and perfectly normal to enter a personal shock phase after learning of your cancer disease.

On a personal note, my emotional experience with cancer so far has caused me to become keenly sensitive to everything around me especially those in my life that love me and I them. Possibly it's the self-realization that life and our health remains fragile at any age, and too often, we take too much for granted in our relationships with those we depend on.

Cancer patients are encouraged to keep life as normal as possible. Remember you're the same person you were before the cancer diagnosis. Staying positive is so very important. Exercise as much as you can, diet is important and participate in medical decisions. Keep good records of your treatment and the problems you encounter.

I want to thank everyone that continues to support and pray for my recovery. My faith/trust in God provides me the "spiritual strength" and the determination to go forward with a plan to live my life and fight the cancer disease together. God bless Pastor David Burgeson, the Intercessory Prayer Group and Dick Gainer for all the support they have provided me.

Had I not been under the care and guidance of an oncologist and urged to get that PSA test I would have never known that I had an aggressive cancerous tumor in my body. And possibly that would have become life threatening each day of my life if not treated in time. In the months to come I will learn more about where I stand with this dreaded disease. Your continued prayers are most welcome and God bless you all! And by the way I'm looking forward to my seventy fifth birthday on March 5, 2009 and beyond.

#### Why do we have a Library?

Our purpose is to provide inspirational materials for guidance and living and to access biblical reference books for our ministers, teachers and members. The room is also available for small Bible study groups and prayer groups.

#### Where is the Library?

When entering from the church parking lot into the narthex the library door is the first one on the left and is open Sunday mornings. There is also an entry door from Criswell Hall.

#### When is the Library open?

The library is open following the first service until noon. Self check out is available if there is no attendant in the library. Simply sign the check out card and place it in the basket provided.

#### What reference materials are available?



As we enter our New Year we want to congratulate Virginia Mothes and Betty David as the co-chairs of the United Methodist Women for 2009. These ladies, among others, will attend a Leadership Training Conference at the St. Andrews UMC in Santa Maria on January 24, 2009. This conference will help and inform them of their duties in the coming year. Eva McClure and Bee Frantz will be co-chairs of the Mary-Martha Circle, Rosemary MacKeen and Patti Melsheimer will chair JOY Circle with Peggy Gainer and Mary Kelleher as the co-chairs for Esther Circle.

For the study this year, Mary-Martha and Esther circles have chosen to study American Indians in the book, "Giving Our Hearts Away—Native American Survival." The ladies of JOY Circle will decide between the above book and one on different religions.

Carleen Minckler and Vel Lowry were such wonderful chair people this past year. We had such a successful year for 2008 and would like to thank them and all the other officers and women of the UMW for their dedication and hard work in making our UMW group such a great success.

Fun was had by all at the Harvest Tea. The event was so elegant, the food was wonderful and the music beautiful. Anticipation filled the air as we sat hoping and waiting to win the many prizes. We were able to raise \$821 toward missions during this spectacular event.

IN 2008, the local unit of the Arroyo Grande UMW gave \$3600 to the Santa Barbara District Conference to further our mission work throughout the world; \$1000 was also given to Grover Beach Elementary School to begin a clothing fund for needy children in their school. The fund will allow children in need to have new clothes and shoes of their choice. Statistics show that 70% of the children who attend this school live below poverty level. As a group the UMW hopes the fund will help alleviate some of that stress. \$600 was also given to the Five Cities Christian Women's Food Bank and \$250 to the SLO Women's Shelter.

Mary-Martha Circle gave money from their treasury to the Five Cities Christian Women. Joy Circle gave theirs to the EMANA, an organization in Chili, and Esther Circle donated their surplus funds to the Five Cities Christian Women's Food Bank for the toys in their annual Christmas Baskets. This year, 72 Christmas food baskets were given out to needy families in our area. And 94 wrapped toys were included in those baskets for the children of the families. We are grateful that we've been successful in our involvement in missions both locally and around the world.

I want to close this month's UMW page with some words from Harriet Jane Olsen, chief executive and deputy general secretary, she heads the administration of the UMW. Her words are taken from Response Magazine, issue dated June 2008.

"The base of all is that God is already at work in places where we can follow suit, joining forces with women and children around the world, creating a society that is more loving and just," she said. "We can do it. We've got the resources and talent, and I believe we will."

☑ A work team will be assembled to sand the nursery in preparation to be painted.

☑ We do have termites. One estimate was presented and the Board asked for 2 more. This will be done.

✓ New lights and a fan have
