


THE JAPANESE COMMUNITY OF THE ARROYO GRANDE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Kaz was born in King City, CA in 1918 when his father worked at Speckles' Sugar. At a very young age he, along with his mother and some of his siblings, traveled to Japan to attend school to learn the traditional Japanese customs and lan-

Alfred Henry Ackley was born in Pennsylvania in 1887. He showed great promise as a child, and his musician-father personally tutored him before sending him to New York City to study music.

From there, it was on to the Royal Academy of Music in Lon-

don. Alfred then returned to the States to attend Westminster Seminary in Maryland, and he was ordained into the Presbyterian ministry in 1914. After pastoring a church in his home state of Pennsylvania, Alfred was called to a congregation in California.

It was there in 1932, that Alfred met a Jewish man to whom he began witnessing. But the man resisted the Christian faith, saying, "Why should I worship a dead Jew?"

That statement played on Alfred's mind as he prepared his Easter Sunday message. Rising early to prepare for the day, Alfred flipped on the radio as he shaved and was astonished to hear a famous liberal preacher in New York say: "Good morning -- it's Easter! You know, folks, it really doesn't make any difference to me if Christ be risen or not. As far as I am concerned, His body could be as dust in some Palestinian tomb. The main thing is, His truth goes marching on!"

Alfred wanted to fling the radio across the room. "It's a lie!" he exclaimed. His wife rushed into the bathroom, asking, "Why are you shouting so early in the morning?"

"Didn't you hear what that good-for-nothing preacher said?" Alfred replied.

That morning, Ackley preached with great vigor on the reality of Christ's Resurrection, and he did the same at the evening service. But later that night, he was still exercised over his friend's question and the morning's radio sermon. "Listen here, Alfred Ackley," his wife said at last. "It's time you did that which you can do best. Why don't you write a song about it and then maybe you'll feel better?"

Alfred went to his study, opened the Bible, and re-read the Resurrection account from Mark's Gospel. A thrill went through him, and he began writing the words to "He Lives." A few minutes later, he was at the piano putting it to music, not dreaming it would become one of the church's most triumphant Easter hymns. Source: fbccrescent.org







OUR LIVING HOPE

- 8. Write "Happy Easter!" or a Bible verse on the front of the card. Then give it to someone.

Advance Directives

What in the world is an Advance Health Care Directive you may ask! An Advance Health Care Directive is the best way to make sure that your health care wishes are known and considered if for any reason you are unable to speak for yourself. The California Medical Association (CMA) strongly recommends that everyone complete an Advance Health Care Directive so that there will be someone you trust to actively participate in the decisions surrounding your health care.

By completing this form, California law allows you to: first, appoint another person to be your health care "agent" who will have legal authority to make decisions about your medical care if you become unable to make these decisions for yourself. And second, it allows you to write down your health care wishes—for example, a desire not to receive treatment that only prolongs the dying process if you are terminally ill. Your doctor and your agent must follow your lawful instructions.

The Advance Health Care Directive is now the legally recognized format for a living will in California and has replaced the Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care (or "DPAHC") as the legally recognized document for appointing a health care agent in California. It allows you to state your wishes about refusing or accepting life-sustaining treatment in any situation. It can be used to state your desires about your health care in any situation in which you are unable to make your own decisions, not just when you are in a coma or are terminally ill. In addition, it allows you to appoint someone you trust to speak for you when you are incapacitated. Any California resident who is at least eighteen (18) years old (or is an emancipated minor), of sound mind, and acting of his or her own free will can complete a valid Advance Health Care Directive. You do not need a lawyer to assist you in completing an Advance Health Care Directive form. You can appoint almost any adult to be your agent. It is important that you talk to the people you plan to appoint to make sure they understand your wishes and agree to accept this responsibility. An Advance Health Care Directive is valid forever, unless you revoke it or state in the form a specific date on which you want it to expire.

When you complete the form, make sure that it has been properly signed, dated, and either notarized or witnessed by two qualified individuals (the form includes instructions about who can and cannot be a witness). Keep the original in a safe place where your loved ones can find it guickly. Give copies of the completed form to the people you have appointed as your agent and alternate agent(s), to your doctor(s) and health plan, and to family members or anyone else who is likely to be called if there is a medical emergency. Take a copy of the form with you if you are going to be admitted to a hospital, nursing home or other health care facility. You can revoke or change an Advance Health Care Directive at any time. If you revoke or change your directive, you should notify every person or facility that has a copy of your prior directive and provide them with a new one. You may obtain an Advance Health Care Directive form from your doctor, your hospital, your attorney, or on line at http://www.slocounty.ca.gov.


Two Great Celebrations 135 Years of Music & 125 Years of Service!

First Come – First Served!

A few Sunday's ago I strolled into the UMCAG sanctuary early service when I noticed a stranger sitting in my "favorite" aisle seat, in the center pew. However, without any hesitation, I sat in another seat. After all, I respect and follow the first come-first served principle when it comes to seating or waiting in line. The rule of thumb for this principle, you get

there first, the vacant seat is yours to sit in provided there are no "reserved section signs" posted for special seating arrangements, etc.

Does anyone have a right to claim an occupied seat? We know names are not assigned on a pew seat nor should we expect a reserved seat sign except at special events. Regular church members out of respect will normally avoid sitting in seats where known older members and members with disabilities like to gather and sit together. But that doesn't mean a particular seat will always be available and reserved for you to occupy if you arrive late. And for first-time visitors they deserve our extra attention in feeling welcome.

Would you ask anyone to move because they're sitting in your regular seat? I would anticipate a person occupying your preferred seat would be offended and any rudeness considered improper in a church setting. If it were a first time visitor good chances are that he or she will be looking for another church to attend the following Sunday.

Is it really worth the risk of looking foolish and selfish all at the same time? It just makes good Christian sense and shows thoughtfulness and concern for saving the church from any form of embarrassment and in my opinion "rude behavior" could challenge our universal UMC creed: "Open Hearts, Open Minds and Open Doors."

A church forum in 2008 speaks out - You're sitting in my pew/seat!

"I was at church one Sunday when I overheard some people complaining about people sitting in "their" pew. Personally, I think that it's immature to think that a particular church pew or chair belongs to you, just because you prefer to sit there. If someone is sitting in your favorite spot, just sit somewhere else."

"This happened to a couple at my church. They were new and didn't know that certain people had "claimed" their seats, so they just sat down. The lady put up a huge fuss, and held it against them for the rest of their time at the church. Even if your church is into claiming seats, don't get mad at new people who don't know."

"There is one spot in my church that I absolutely love, but I'm not going to get mad if someone is in the seat, I'm just going to make sure I get there early enough to get it!"

"I know an older couple that had that happen to them on their FIRST visit to a church...TWICE before church even started!!! It also turned out to be their LAST visit!"

"Happened to us once. We were told to sit in the front of the church for our baby's dedication, so we could get to the stage quickly. But the seats there tend to be claimed by "prominent" people, mostly a clique of older ladies. One of them was so annoyed at us for taking "her" place and gave us the eyeball all through the service. We explained why we were there, and that we'd need to get up and get out of that row of seats, but she still insisted on sitting on the end seat, blocking our way out, and then making a huge fuss and nasty faces when we had to get out to go up on stage."

PLEASE NOTE: Nothing in this article is met to imply that our UMC of AG has a problem in the seating of its congregation nor have I ever witnessed or heard about any such event. My comments/opinions are based on my own experience and research of other churches available on the Internet. <u>I can think of no better way</u> for the prevention of rude behavior than to learn from the unfortunate mistakes of others in a church setting.
