

More than 1,700 laity and clergy from across Southern California, Hawaii, Guam, and Saipan gathered June 17 to 20 at the University of Redlands in California for the 2009 California-Pacific Annual Conference. This year's theme continued the Conference's vision. "To Be The Cup Overflowing" with this year reflecting the first of the denominational Four Areas of Focus on "Leadership."

During the service of ordination and sending, Bishop Mary Ann Swenson recalled Jesus' words that disciples are to be the "salt of the earth," and encouraged those to be ordained and commissioned to be sure their ministry includes doing work "that makes you sweaty"....and therefore truly salty. Take a shovel in your hands, pick up a hammer... and work up a sweat on a mission project overseas and in your own neighborhood...Be truly salty, and you will stay in touch with "those whom we are called to serve."

This was the 25th Annual Conference session of the California-Pacific Annual Conference, which was created out of the Pacific and Southwest Annual Conference. This session marks the 158th session since the organization of the Pacific Conference in 1851, the oldest of the merging Annual Conferences.

The Rev. Dr. Randy Maddox from the Divinity School at Duke University led Bible study focusing on leadership. He focused on leadership as it relates to his specialty of Wesleyan theology. He asked both clergy and laity, "When you're in leadership, toward what are we leading?" Maddox said the church is called to be a holistic salvation that draws wisdom from our Wesleyan traditions.

The Conference continued a pattern of welcoming a lay person to preach during the Annual Ses-

sion. Ruth Pitts-Littman, a lay member of Palm Springs United Methodist Church, was selected through an audition process. Pitts-Littman, who recently lost her husband, preached from Acts 1:8 titling her sermon. "Let the Spirit Find You." She challenged those gathered to study Christ's teaching and practice them.

Members adopted a 2010 apportionment budget of \$12,897,982 representing a .06 percent decrease from 2009. The budget reflected other action by conference to begin having retired clergy members share in the cost of their health benefits for the first time.



## Construction Underway at Camp AG

The bulldozers finally started major earth moving on Monday, July 13<sup>th</sup> 2009 at Arroyo Grande Methodist Camp (see photo). This is all in preparation for the building of one or two new cabins that has been planned since 2006. The site for the new buildings is on the north east corner of the camp on the road going up to the campfire pit. Steve Tallant, camp manager has been overseeing the preparations of the site which included all new water, electrical, sewer and drain lines. The moving of a huge amount of earth will

clear the pads for the new cabin construction.

The \$180,000 project began collecting funds in 2006 and received a \$50,000 grant from the California Methodist Conference to help get the project started. Under the leadership of Val McClure, the camp's Site Committee ran a three year campaign to raise funds for the project.

Bill Weitkamp, Tina Moore and Tom Egan from the AGFUMC also serve on the Site Committee and have been active in helping to raise project funds. The retired Pastor of the Arroyo Grande Church, Bob Underwood, has been working shoulder to shoulder with the camp manager to help prepare the site. The Arroyo Grande Methodist Church has donated \$15,000 to the project. Five other Methodist Churches have also participated in the project as well as many clubs and businesses in the Five Cities area.

The project is the first step in a 15-20 year project to renovate the 29 acre facility into a first class camp and conference center. Current facilities include six cabins, three lodges, a live-in caretakers home, dining hall and kitchen, and the famous Tabernacle. Other amenities include a solar heated swimming pool, child play area, chapel, campfire pit and picnic tables. There are also eight hook-ups for RV's on the site. Reservations can be made for non-profit groups or family use by calling Steve or Debbie Tallant at 489-4139 who will direct you through the registration process. Over 100 groups and families use the facility yearly.



## 2009 Conference Summary continued

More than 250 youth participated in the annual Youth Day.

During the Service of Commissioning, Ordination, and Sending Forth, Bishop Mary Ann Swenson welcomed Rabbi Mark Diamond. Rabbi Diamond is the Executive Vice President of the Board of Rabbis of Southern California. In that position, he directs a multi-denominational organization of 290 rabbis, and serves on the management team of the Jewish Federation Of Greater Los Angeles. He told those gathered for ordination that leaders dreams and interpret duties.

During the 16th Annual Conference Missionary Luncheon, the Conference was presented a plaque from The Advance for the highest designated giving and highest total amount of missionary support in 2008 in the Western Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church.

In other business, conference members:

- Collected offerings; Grace Children's Hospital in \$4,630; Central Conference Pension \$3,200; Visiting Doctors' Hospital Program \$4,335; and \$1,900 for youth programs;
- Raised \$2,000 for 36 UMCOR buckets; and,
- Accepted health and sewing kits for the UMCOR West Depot.

During the conference session:

- Bishop Mary Ann Swenson ordained 10 elders in full connection; commissioned 9 as probationary elders, ordained one deacon in full connection, and commissioned one as a probationary deacon.
- Celebrated the retirement of 15 active clergy; and,
- Members rejoiced when Bishop Swenson baptized two infants.

Membership stands at 82,405, down 2,411 from the previous year. Worship attendance stands 48,881, down 2,275. Church school stands at 12,726, down 68.

Each year the Women's Division of the Board of Global Ministries develops topics of study with accompanying resource information to be made available for use in all local church United Methodist Women groups. These studies, if used by Circle groups, connect all UMW groups together in one common theme of study for the year. The topics which are chosen, even though years in advance, are about very current conditions which are occurring in the world today. The study materials help UMW members explore their role as Christians in the larger community through study of spiritual, geographical and social topics. Schools of Christian Mission (theme for this year is: "Together at the Table") are conducted in more than 90 sites around the country each summer in order to share and instruct in these studies to as many as 20,000 participants. Attendees at these schools are expected to return to their home churches and share this new information with fellow members. Recommended studies for 2009-2010 are:

Giving our Hearts Away: Native American Survival which is a continuation of the 2008-09 study. This is a straightforward narrative of the history of what is now the United States, told from a Native American perspective. This is the story of events that unfolded out of the clash of Native and immigrant cultures with their competing ideologies, religious practices and spiritual lifestyles.

The Beauty and Courage of Sudan: Why a Dream of Peace is Possible which will be another two-year study. This study guide offers a portrait of Sudan's spirit of courage, promise and hope despite years of war and destruction. The country has been plagued with drought and a shortage of food for years in addition to ongoing war for most of its history but yet at Sudan's core is beauty.

Food and Faith A focus on comfort food, health food, soul food, home cooking, haute cuisine—how we talk about food shows that it is more than a simple matter of "fuel" or nutrition. Food is emotional. Food is cultural. Food and the traditions related to it are important to our families yet multitudes go without adequate food as food aid systems around the world are stressed. What does it mean to pray, "Give us this day our daily bread"? How are we to be faithful in a world of hunger and abundance?

# The Truth About Cataracts

Did you know that 20.5 million Americans age 40 and older have cataracts, one of the most curable causes of vision loss?

A cataract is the clouding of the eye's normally clear lens, blocking the passage of light needed for vision. The lens lies behind the iris and the pupil. It works much like a camera lens. It focuses light onto the retina at the back of the eye, where an image is recorded. The lens also adjusts the eye's focus, letting us see things clearly both up close and far away. The lens is made of mostly water and protein. The protein is arranged in a precise way that keeps the lens clear and let's light pass through it.

As we age, some of the protein may clump together and start to cloud a small area of the lens. This is a cataract. Over time, the cataract may grow larger and cloud more of the lens, making it harder to see. A cataract can occur in either or both eyes. But it does not spread from one eye to the other. Researchers suspect that there are several causes of cataract, such as smoking and diabetes. Or, it may be that the protein in the lens just changes from the wear and tear it takes over the years.

A cataract needs to be removed only when vision loss interferes with your everyday activities, such as driving, reading, or watching TV. You and your eye care professional can make this decision together. Once you understand the benefits and risks of surgery, you can make an informed decision about whether cataract surgery is right for you. In most cases, delaying cataract surgery will not cause long-term damage to your eye or make the surgery more difficult. You do not have to rush into surgery.

Contrary to popular belief, cataracts are not removed using lasers. Lasers are used in follow-up procedures, if needed. Cataract surgery is most often done as an outpatient procedure under local anesthesia. The cloudy natural lens can be replaced with an artificial lens to give the eye proper focusing power. In most cases, the improvement in the patient's vision is profound.

After cataract surgery, itching and mild discomfort are normal. Some fluid discharge is also common. Your eye may be sensitive to light and touch. If you have discomfort, your doctor can suggest treatment. After one or two days, moderate discomfort should disappear.

For a few days after surgery, your doctor may ask you to use eye drops to help healing and decrease the risk of infection. You will need to wear an eye shield or eyeglasses to help protect your eye. Avoid rubbing or pressing on your eye. When you are home, try not to bend from the waist to pick up objects on the floor. Do not lift any heavy objects. You can walk, climb stairs, and do light household chores.

In most cases, healing will be complete within eight weeks. Your doctor will schedule exams to check on your progress.

The survey stated for the overall quality of the program families were 80 % very satisfied and 20% were satisfied. A written comment indicated, "We are very happy with the program. We like the flexibility of early bird and extended care." Another written comment stated, "It is a great program. We especially like how all the teachers step in and help each other out. Everybody soon knows all the kids. Very professional and very kid centered."

The main reason why families choose our program is for socialization and the second reason is for the age appropriate curriculum. Another comment written added, "It's wonderful for our child's learning and development of skills."

The survey found that the families were 81% very satisfied and 11% were satisfied with the background and experience of the staff. Also, the survey indicated that 72% were very satisfied with the communication, interaction with the children, meeting the individual needs of the child, and with the equipment and materials provided for the children and 27% were satisfied.

All the parents who turned in a survey participated in their child's conference. The survey participants found that the conferences were informative and that their child reached the goals that were set. A comment written said, "This program has really helped bring out our child and prepare him for kindergarten." Another comment was, "We love the school and are very satisfied and happy with the program."

Regarding Parent Participation topic 30% of the parents were very satisfied, 60 percent were satisfied, and 20% were unsatisfied. A more in depth explanation regarding parent participation, 60% of the families would like to help with activities in or outside the classroom and 40% would like to help with fundraising. One written comment said, "Try to get more parents involved. Start a PTA." Another comment received said, "A roster for my child's class would be nice to arrange play dates and develop friendships. Because of these comments and active parents in our program, we have formed a Parent Action Committee or "PAC". If you are interested in finding out more information about "PAC" contact Gen Yamada at 431-4521. The program is also interested in starting a PTA or Parent-Teacher Association. This is a non-profit organization that provides a variety of benefits that would be great for the school.

The Board of the Arroyo Grande United Methodist Children's Center would like to thank you for your time and comments in completing the survey. The findings are beneficial and very important in providing us with the information we need to improve the program. The goals that we have set from this survey are to improve communication and increase our parent participation. A final comment from a parent said, "We are very happy with the program and recommend it to others. "Word of mouth is the best advertisement. When I ask families where they heard about our program, they say, "We have friends that go here." Also I hear, "Moms that I met at the park told me about your program." Because of the wonderful families supporting our program we only have a few openings left in the preschool program. Both the young and older toddler programs and the Pre-K program are full for the next session. We look forward to a fun and exciting new year that nurtures the development of children and fosters new friendships for children, families, and staff.
