I close with some bulletin bloopers for fun! Thank God, we are all going on to perfection!



How many steps did you take today?? Ask Pastor David or Pastor Harold and they will be able to tell you. They are each now wearing a pedometer as part of the United Methodist program to encourage healthy life styles among the UMC clergy. This program was launched 3 years ago after a study done by Duke Divinity School showed that Methodist pastors were declining in health. "Our vision is to develop a resilient, well-informed cadre of United Methodist pastors as skilled in the care of themselves and their families as they are in the care of their congregations" said Robin Swift, director of the program. And now many congregations, inspired by their pastors, are also sponsoring programs to motivate people to "walk in the steps of Jesus, Abraham and Sarah toward simple lifestyle changes that lead to better health and a focus on faith".

Of all forms of exercise, walking is the most natural and accessible, says Allan Abbott, M.D., professor of clinical medicine at the Keck School of Medicine of USC. "For people who qualify as 'couch potatoes' and get no daily exercise, I recommend resolving to walk one mile every day. If a day goes by and you don't manage to get in your walk, don't give up," he says. "Just resolve not to miss more than one day in a row of walking." Abbott adds that wearing a pedometer on your belt every day may be the most cost-effective way to jump start an exercise program. "Set a target goal of 10,000 steps per day, and use the pedometer to monitor your progress toward that goal," he says.

There is no great trick to walking. It does not require any special skills or advanced conditioning. Walking doesn't require any special equipment or clothing. All you need is a good pair of walking shoes, some comfortable clothing and you're set! "Exercise should be in the same category as eating and sleeping – an essential part of your daily routine," says a USC fitness expert. "The biggest excuse in our society is that we don't have time to exercise," he notes. "We place it as an 'extra,' as something we take time off to do. It should be like going to the bathroom, eating and sleeping. If you put exercise in that same category, it takes on a different importance in your life. It's not a chore; it's a part of being a physical being."

- Cookies


What you do:

KAY WALKER A Busy Life Story of 90 Years

Unlike some of us, Kay has kept very detailed and organized records of her family history and when I recently visited, she was converting boxes of photographs into organized albums. Judging by the large accumulation, it will be a full task to finish.



After her father was discharged following W.W.I her parents married

and left Wisconsin for Rouse, Colorado, a coal mining camp, to start his new job as director of the local YMCA. Kay became their first child in September 1920. In her first four years the family moved with YMCA to Nebraska, Wyoming, back to Wisconsin, then again to Aguilar, CO, where they purchased a new home and a dry cleaning business. After 2nd grade, she returned to Wisconsin to live with her grandparents. This involved a 1 1/4 mile walk (each way) to school with her 2 friends. During snowy winters, her granddad drove them in a "one horse open sleigh" because the conditions were frigid. She also recalls "delicious, warm weather" and after church luncheons on the green lawn.

In 1933 the whole family moved to Meeker, Colorado. They owned a Model A Ford and gas cost just 15 to 25 cents per gallon. Kay finished grade school and later graduated from high school with 38 classmates. She held jobs including working at Meeker Dry Cleaners - the family business, ticket seller at the movie theater, waitress at Meeker Cafe. Hobbies she enjoyed board games, cards, barn dances and trips to local lakes. At the Methodist church, she sang in the choir and taught Sunday school.

In 1938, Buford "Boots" Walker from Marlow, OK joined the Civilian Conservation Corps at Ft. Sill. The unit was assigned duty at Meeker, CO and one of his jobs was to deliver uniforms to the dry cleaners. He met Kay and they married in July, 1940. They worked in the business two years then moved to Paso Robles, California in October 1941.

Everyone was involved with the patriotic war effort and Boots enlisted and served in US Navy until 1945 on USS Chincoteague, a Seaplane Tender that was destroyed by enemy attacks in South Pacific but limped home to Mare Island, was reconditioned and returned for more active duty. Kay worked at PX #2 plus the Officer's PX at Camp Roberts while Boots was deployed at sea.

Once the war duty was over, millions of servicemen needed jobs and Boots worked in construction and at Sunray Oil plant. He also did night time correspondence classes in plumbing and heating and passed the Contractor License exams. With these qualifications, he founded and worked 43 years as B. E. Walker Plumbing and Heating Co. Kay managed the office functions of scheduling, billing and bookkeeping from their home as well as keeping the household for the family, including children Michelle, Patricia and Nancy.

They moved to their current Arroyo Grande home in 1954 and were invited by Wilma Dixon, a beloved church matriarch, to join the church. Boots donated labor to maintain the plumbing and heating systems. He installed the first ever disposal and automatic dishwasher and every church woman signed a "Thank You" card to him.

Sadly, Boots passed away in 1997. The current family includes 5 grandchildren, 9 great, and 2 great-great grandchildren all of whom Kay is very proud.

Kay has taught elementary age Sunday School and continues with newsletter and bulletin preparation for our church. She often serves as a Sunday morning Door Greeter and could write the book on how to make one feel welcome and comfortable.



According to Kerren Brown, she has been a Methodist for a "very long time." In Riverside, California, she made her first contact by joining MYF (Methodist Youth Fellowship) and met long-standing friends, and her future husband. They raised their children in that church. I asked Joe about his hobbies, travel and entertainment and he was quick to respond with (playing the piano self-taught), reading, working on the computer, gardening, neighborhood walking group, making ice cream, movies, and on occasion visiting the casinos with a group of friends.

While working, Joe traveled extensively around the states and once to Europe and with Colleen they scheduled many personal points of interest in the U.S and outside our borders to various ports of call.

Unfortunately, health in the family would later become a serious issue for Colleen and eventually she would end up in a wheel chair with Joe as the caregiver for several years. Close to their 53rd year of marriage, in March 2010, she sadly passed away peacefully at Arroyo Grande Hospital. She dearly loved their children, their only grandchild Jake and son-in-law Doug.
