




Advent

Then & Now

Advent comes from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming." The first season in the Christian Church calendar, the period of Advent is a time of expectant waiting in preparation to celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Christ. Carols and hymns have been written over the centuries, many of which we enjoy during this time of waiting even today.

Advent in Greek is *parousia*, which was often used to talk about Jesus' second coming. So Advent is a season of waiting and preparation not only for the celebration of Jesus' earthly birth but for his promised return.

Some Christians celebrate Advent by not putting the baby Jesus into their manger scenes until Christmas morning. This adds to the anticipation that's a special part of the season.





December 11 Meeting to Feature Walk to Emmaus

The Walk to Emmaus weekend scheduled for February 24-27 in Ventura will be explained by Pastor David at the monthly breakfast meeting of the United Methodist Men on Saturday, December 11. The Walk to Emmaus® is a spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church through the development of Christian disciples and leaders.

A business meeting will follow the program. A spring golf tournament, charitable funding and meeting plans are on the agenda.

Helping Soldiers and Children in Afghanistan

Following an inspiring talk at the October 16 UMM meeting, it was voted to donate \$300 to a program that provides care packages for soldiers and village children in the far reaches of Afghanistan. Former marine Si Tennenberg described how 5,500 packages have been sent to Iraq and Afghanistan in the last four years. Each military package is shared by several soldiers.

Thank-you emails he receives describe the extreme weather conditions, the loneliness and the lack of basic items that men and women are tolerating. It is easy to see how even their heavy backpacks can't provide many of their needs. Special military shirts, socks, gloves, eye drops, soap, toothpaste and phone cards are a few of the requested items. Special needs for women are panties, sports bras, tampons, facial cleaning wipes, hairbrushes, Mydol, lip gloss and more. Children's gifts include school supplies, clothing, shoes, stuffed animals and toys.

In addition to the UMM donation, members took addressed packages to the post office after the meeting and paid the \$12.50 postage to mail them. Each box contains about \$40 worth of supplies. But Tennenberg said that something as simple as letters, notes or crayon drawings can be contributed and he will put them in the boxes. His email address is sitenspot@aol.com.

What you do:


- 1. Decide which pot will be Joseph, Mary and baby Jesus. Turn each pot upside-down and paint a face on each one.



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Overcoming Discouragement Part—1

Psalm 39:7 (NLT)

When "Jim" left my office at church, I was elated. Our meeting had been a tough but productive one. As his boss, I worked hard to help Jim understand my expectations and where he had been falling short. I tried to be gracious as I spoke critically, and Jim received my counsel with a willing spirit. Months of supervisory effort seemed finally to be bearing fruit. An immensely talented young man, Jim had great potential to be an outstanding member of the church staff. Thus I was encouraged by his response to our meeting and looked forward with hope to our future together.

When I arrived at my office the next morning, a blank envelope sat ominously on my desk. It contained Jim's resignation letter. He was finished at the church. There was nothing I could do or say to change his mind.

At that moment I felt deeply discouraged. My hope for Jim's fruitful future at our church shrivelled on the vine. I felt like a dismal failure as a boss. Who was I to think I could manage a large church staff? Maybe I should just pack up my bags and find more suitable employment.

You may not have faced something just like my experience with Jim, but I expect you have felt the heavy weight of discouragement. Maybe it came at work, as a project for which you had high hopes fell apart. Perhaps it had to do

with a close relationship that splintered owing to a misunderstanding. Or your discouragement might have resulted from frustration with your inability to be the kind of person you know God wants you to be.

Discouragement ... such a common emotion ... how can we overcome it? How can we get beyond discouragement, and even learn from it?

Go Ahead and Feel Discouraged

First of all, if you want to overcome discouragement, allow yourself to feel discouraged. No, I don't recommend that you rev up negative feelings that aren't there. But if you are truly discouraged, don't pretend otherwise. Trust God enough to feel what you really feel.

Some Christians think that discouragement itself is something about which to be ashamed, almost as if it were a sin. One of my favorite hymns, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," urges: "Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged; take it to the Lord in prayer." Perhaps in an ideal world we should never be discouraged. But in reality, discouragement is a normal part of human life. The Psalmist asked for God's help with despair (see Psalms 42-43). The Apostle Paul admitted his own deep discouragement (2 Cor. 1:8-9). If we deny our discouragement and pretend we're "just fine," we won't be able to overcome it.

God is great and the proceeds from our sales will all go to our world, national, and local mission projects. Merry Christmas one and all!

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




Hello to all,



Feed My People

As the holidays fast approach, many turn to a ing may take place in

to friends and family, cash donations to the bell ringers outside of dept. stores, and cans of food in barrels outside grocery stores.

As having been a part of FUMC of AG for going on 3 years, I have seen the generous nature of the people here, not just during the holidays, but year round. One of the out-sources of this church's generosity is through the Peoples Kitchen.

The Peoples Kitchen is a non-profit organization that began in May of 1991. Our church is just one of 18 churches and 35 teams that collaboratively support the effort of feeding a hot meal to our south county hungry 365 days a year.* The Methodist church team is headed up by Chuck and Betty Ashton. I learned more when spent some time with the Ashtons on a recent Monday morning as they were sorting and organizing the food and clothes that are stored in cabinets within Criswell Hall. Once a month the team is scheduled to feed the homeless and needy people. On that morning, previously prepared and frozen casseroles are baked in Criswell Halls kitchen. These casseroles have been assembled by our church members, labeled by the type of casserole, who assembled it, and the date, then placed into the kitchen freezer at Criswell Hall. After the baking is done, the casseroles are packed up along with other food items and multiple boxes of clothes, then trucked down to the feeding site. Although this site has changed over the years, it is currently behind the Shouts of Grace Church in Grover Beach.

I had the opportunity to be a part of this dedicated team on Nov. 4. I met them on site at giving mentality. This giv- 11:40 am. After getting my name tag and a pair of food handling gloves I took my position bethe form of tangible gifts hind the stainless steel pans of fruit. The serving line was basically 4 or 5 of those 8' banquet tables that had dishes of food on them. On one side were the food servers. The other side became a stream of people that followed their plate as it was passed from one server to the next. I would be in charge of handing out the fruit that day, which consisted of apples, bananas and pears in varying degrees of ripeness. Later on I learned that most of this food comes from the San Luis Obispo Food Bank, which is essentially a warehouse that looks much like a back room of a grocery store. Here food is deposited and withdrawn by organizations and churches, such as our own, for feeding the hungry.

> Pastor David was on hand to offer a prayer of thanks. As the patrons of this makeshift mess hall made their way through the line my mind wandered to thoughts of how does this happen within a country of plenty? Who were these patrons? I even recognized a few of the people in line who I know to have jobs but come to find out, they do not make enough to both pay the bills and eat too. Upon more research of the five cities homeless coalition web site*, I learned that the patrons of the peoples kitchen consist of a diverse population that doesn't just consist of homeless, but also includes the working poor, those that battle addictions, retirees, single moms, mentally unstable or challenged, and physically handicapped. No matter their background or story, each person was gracious and thankful, never grabbing for more than they were offered.

After all were served once, anyone could come for seconds or thirds. The official plate count of the day was 84. Leftovers were sent with those who wanted them. I reflected on the story of the loaves and fishes and how there were baskets full of leftovers after blessing the meal. What a pleasant thought that God does provide. Two days later, I found myself accepting Betty's invitation to help them at the food bank. I arrived and found 6 familiar faces, one of them being one of our church youth. He will gain community service credits for his participation. We began sorting apples from a huge cardboard container to smaller, more manageable boxes. Then we sorted boxes full of canned goods and stocked the shelves with like products. Beans here, soups there, raisins, canned milk, etc. This is where those cans that you put in the barrels at the grocery store end up. Food also comes in from various other sources. The Peoples Kitchen gains food credits for every hour of our participation at the food pantry. Chuck and Betty can then return and use those credits to buy food items such as the fruit that I was serving just the other day, or the ingredients used in the casseroles.

I never realized that there was such a system and intermingling of organizations behind this whole feed the needy effort. It takes every one of them to keep it running efficiently and consistently. My eyes were opened to what a huge part our Methodist church team plays and how it is uniquely individual in providing to the needs. Any donations made to our peoples kitchen church team is used specifically by our team to meet those needs. In the process of feeding and talking with the people, the team becomes aware of other needs and steps up to meet them. This has most recently included a sock drive which has been extended through to the end of the year. Chuck is also beginning a drive for hygiene products which includes soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, disposable shavers, shampoo, etc.

To help the Methodist Church Peoples Kitchen team make a difference this Christmas season, approach their information table in Criswell Hall this Sunday.
