

Dear Church Family -

I found this interesting and true about us "United Methodists" and it speaks to where our mission is – here is part one (part two next month). Take a look.

Why does the church exist?

According to Matthew's Gospel, the risen Christ made it clear: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you" (28:19-20).

Based on this "Great Commission," our United Methodist Church has stated its purpose: "The mission of the Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Local churches provide the most significant arena through which disciplemaking occurs." (Excerpt from The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church—2008, p. 87. Copyright © 2008 by The United Methodist Publishing House. Used by permission).

We reach out to people and welcome them into the church

We have a direct responsibility for people of the "world" around our church, the community in which we and others study, work, shop, play, and so forth. In this world are people with many hurts, doubts, and questions. There are some who are new in the community and feel a little lost, some who are proudly self-sufficient, and others who are in desperate circumstances. Our mission is to reach out to them, listen to them, accept them, share the gospel in word and deed, invite them into the family of faith, and joyfully receive all who will respond.

We relate people to God and help them deepen their relationship with God

The second task in making disciples is to offer people opportunities for growing closer to God. Whether they are visitors or old-time members, just beginning the journey of faith or well along the road—all are in need of God's love in Christ. Through worship, prayer, study, and honest sharing, we help one another discover that the Holy Spirit is not far off but present with us, wanting an open and loving friendship with each of us—not only friendship but commitment as well.

Through our congregation's various ministries we encourage one another to give ourselves to Christ, to ground our lives in the living God.

We nurture people in Christian living

Third, our congregation's mission is to nurture people of all ages in the Christian faith and to help them practice the disciplines of discipleship. The church exists not to serve itself but to serve the world. We come to church not only for our own personal enrichment but also to prepare ourselves to do the work of love and to get ready to be Christ's disciples in the community. Through worship, baptism, Communion, Bible study, prayer, and other means of grace, we're strengthened for ministry.

We support people in their ministry

As members of the congregation, we're sent into the community to serve those in need and to make our community more loving and just. We believe that the Holy Spirit empowers and guides us in these ministries and that wherever there's need and suffering, we meet Christ, already at work. But still, we cannot be effective in ministry on our own. So the congregation exists, in part, to surround and support each member in his or her ministry. We do not always succeed in our efforts to be faithful disciples in the world. But with the loving support of the community of faith, we can continue to grow. Methodists in Mission

The United Methodist faith is deeply rooted in the Scripture and in the basic beliefs of all Christians. Out of that theology and faith have grown some specific actions that mark United Methodists as Christians engaged in ministry to the world. The early members of the groups that eventually became The United Methodist Church, took strong stands on issues such as slavery, smuggling, and humane treatment of prisoners; established institutions for higher learning; started hospitals and shelters for children and the elderly; founded Goodwill Industries in 1902; became actively involved in efforts for world peace; adopted a Social Creed and Social Principles to guide them as they relate to God's world and God's people; participated with other religious groups in ecumenical efforts to be in mission. 

METHODIST MEN INVITE SWEETHEARTS TO BREAKFAST



How are you doing on your New Year's Resolutions??

Hopefully, one of those resolutions was to lose weight and be more active. Numerous studies have found that weight loss of as little as 5-10 percent of initial body weight can result in significant improvements in blood pressure and cholesterol levels, as well as other improved health outcomes. Here are some reminders to keep you going.

- Try eating more fruit and less meat. Registered dietician Jaimie Davis, Ph.D., research associate with the Institute for Prevention Research at the Keck School of Medicine of USC, says that fiber from the fruit fills you up and the natural sweetness of fruit may satisfy a sweet tooth that would ordinarily be craving a doughnut. Try to add 3 more servings of fruits and vegetables to your diet each day.
- Keep track of your portions by using a food diary. Keeping track of when, what, how much, where, and why you eat can help you be aware of the amount of food you are eating and the times you tend to eat too much. A food diary can be kept in a notebook, on your cell phone, or online.
- Eat breakfast every day. Breakfast might be the most important meal of the day. According to WebMD, studies have shown that eating a healthy breakfast can be very beneficial. If you have a limited amount of time in the morning for breakfast, prepare the night before by leaving out utensils and plates. Make sure that there are lots of healthy breakfast options in your pantry and refrigerator including quick breakfast options such as fruit or yogurt for when you are short on time.
- <u>Try cooking at home more</u>. Cook at least 3 meals more per week than you are now, even if that means cooking breakfast or lunch. You can also prepare a large portion once and freeze some for later.
- Cook fish or seafood for dinner 2 times a week. The American Heart Association recommends eating fish (particularly fatty fish) like salmon, mackerel, herring, lake trout, sardines and albacore tuna are high in omega-3 fatty acids.
- Eat your Vegetables! Expand the number of all-vegetable dishes that you eat by making 1 dinner or main-meal-of-the-day vegetarian. Add herbs and spices to make vegetables even tastier. Start with a small quantity (1/8 to 1/2 teaspoon to a package of frozen vegetables), then let your own and your family's taste be your guide. Chopped parsley and chives, sprinkled on just before serving, also enhance the flavor of many vegetables.
- Get active! Anne Peters, M.D., director of the USC Clinical Diabetes Program, says, "Our bodies just aren't meant to be sedentary." Peters advises people who get no activity to take a 5-minute walk one day and keep increasing it until they get to at least a half-hour. "It's so much better than nothing, incomparably better than nothing," she says. As you progress, try to develop a well-rounded fitness training program which includes these five elements: aerobic fitness, strength training and core exercises, balance training, and stretching and flexibility. It isn't necessary to fit each of these elements into every fitness session, but factoring them into your regular routine can help you promote fitness for life.



The family had lived in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Florida and when he was 9 years old his mother moved all the children to Los Angeles so he could undergo a series of experimental hearing restoration operations available only at UCLA. Those operations were successful and the next step was to introduce essential speech therapy at John Tracy Clinic. He credits his mother's very hard work supporting the family and her perseverance in obtaining successful treatments for his recovery. He graduated from Belmont High School in 1966 and went on to LA Community College then to Glendale College and Trade Tech College where he studied electronics and engineering for his career pursuits.

Bernie has a professional background in maintenance of large office buildings and holds licenses in electrical and plumbing maintenance. He generously shares his knowledge and expertise with our church and has become one of "Tom Egan's right hand men" as repairs and upgrades are needed to maintain the church campus and facilities. There are recent improvements we can all enjoy that Bernie has played a share in providing, such as; new storage shed near back corner with electrical service included; new motion detector lights at storage sheds near Preschool yard; additional electrical receptacles in Preschool classrooms; locally placed, supplement hot water heaters for the restrooms that provide instant hot water. He brings experience to evaluating a situation and installing or improving the outcome for maximum efficiency.



TRUSTEES REPORT for January 2011

- The Parsonage account fell \$4,000 and is now \$157,447.
- Budget is not yet finalized. We are starting 2012 with a positive number, where December ended in the hole.
- We are working on a grant from the District for some major face lifting that will run around \$60,000-70,000. The grant can be a partial grant or partial loan. There are a few things to work out, so please keep us in your prayers. This house of the Lord needs work.
- We talked about creating a "must do list"...then look at a "like to do list..." then maybe work with the congregation on a "wish list." More on that later.
- During January, I need to finish getting bids for re-keying the church, as well as, for the termite work.
- The tool closet across from the McMillen Room has been cleaned out...sorta. All paint cans have been moved to the metal shed and now it needs to be rearranged. Harry Egan was a big help in cleaning out the metal shed and putting in the paint cans. After the closet is finished, the small closet where the re-cycled cans and plastic are stored will be cleaned out. This will help with our storage problem.
- January will see Criswell Hall's walls are cleaned!
- As of January, we are no longer contracting landscapers. We are doing our own yard work thanks to volunteers. Mike Herber has volunteered to do the grass, and I am toying with the idea of a weekly work day. Maybe from 8:30 AM—11:30 AM (a break at 10:00 AM). We would do some yard work, small projects, change out dead bulbs, oil hinges, et cetera. Just general maintenance needs. Sound good?
- I think I have found a place that will work on our organ. Need to get some pegs inline first. More on this later.
- Do you know what?? During 2011, you have had the finest group of people on the Board taking care of you and this House of the Lord. They have come up with some fine ideas, some "what ifs", "why can't wes" and some "how abouts". They are truly God's hands. Give thanks to Norm Henderson, Mike Herber, Mary Hawkins, Betty Lorenz, Phil McKibben, Don McGuire. And Virginia Mothes our steadfast secretary and Pastor David show up to make sure we stay serious. Give these folks a hug. God bless!!

I asked God to spare me pain. God said, "No. Suffering draws you apart from worldly cares and brings you closer to me."


<u>I asked God to</u> make my spirit grow God said, "No. You must grow on your own, but I will prune you to make you fruitful."


The first Sunday of the month, we head to the MMR for What We Know Sunday then return to the sanctuary to join in the sacrament of Holy Communion.

Meet weekly in the Library and will soon begin a new study – a perfect time to join!









What is The Walk To Emmaus?

The Walk to Emmaus is a spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church through the development of Christian disciples and leaders. The program's approach seriously considers the model of Christ's servanthood and encourages Christ's disciples to act in ways appropriate to being "a servant of all."



The Walk to Emmaus experience is a 72-hour short course in Christianity, comprised of fifteen talks by lay and clergy on the themes of God's grace, disciplines of Christian discipleship, and what it means to be the church. The course is wrapped in prayer and meditation, special times of worship and daily celebration of Holy Communion. The "Emmaus community," is made up of those who have attended an Emmaus weekend. The community supports the 72-hour experience with a prayer vigil, by preparing and serving meals, and other acts of love and self-giving. The Emmaus Walk typically begins Thursday evening and concludes Sunday evening. Men and women attend separate weekends.

During and after the three days, Emmaus leaders encourage participants to meet regularly in small groups. The members of the small groups challenge and support one another in faithful living. Participants seek to Christianize their environments of family, job, and community through the ministry of their congregations. The three-day Emmaus experience and follow-up groups strengthen and renew Christian people as disciples of Jesus Christ and as active members of the body of Christ in mission to the world.

The Upper Room, a ministry unit of the General Board of Discipleship of The United Methodist Church, sponsors the Walk to Emmaus and offers it through local Emmaus groups around the world. Although connected through The Upper Room to The United Methodist Church, The Walk to Emmaus is ecumenical in nature. The intent is not to teach church doctrine, but rather to work within the common theology of the Christian faith and promote unity within the different Christian churches.


