## FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH OF ARROYO GRANDE The Kingdom of God is like a net that was cast into the sea. ~Matthew 13:47



On Sunday, February 19th, Pastor David shared with us these words:

"The church is still God's hope for the world. Through Christ's Church the manifold wisdom of God will be made known. It is God's intention for that to happen, therefore it will. If we want to be a generation that experiences the joy of God and see God's promises come to life, then we must begin today to boldly put our faith in God's ability to use us for decisive acting. When we do, we will one day awaken to the reality of a renewed church. Not an irrelevant church struggling to get by, but a church that cannot be contained; a church that is so effectively used by God that the gates of hell will no longer stand against it." (Deepening Your Effectiveness, Glover & Levy, pg. 224)

What a powerful statement! In Matthew 16:18, Jesus says to Peter, "I say to you that you are Peter (which means 'rock'), and upon this rock I will build my church, and all the powers of hell will not con-

quer it." God wants everyone to have a personal relationship with Him through His Son, Jesus Christ. It is our hope that utilizing this pathway will help new believers in Christ as they become part of the Body of Christ and begin their faith journey.

The Discipleship Pathway for the United Methodist Church of Arroyo Grande is scripture based and Christ centered. With a guick glance, the world can see who we are as a church and part of the Body of Christ.

FIRST, we want to **Know Christ**. We, as a community of believers, identify unchurched persons, who are new to the idea of Christ or are ready to rededicate their life to Christ. Our goal is to give opportunities for everyone to watch and grow in Christ with the United Methodist Church (UMC). We learn about the church 'body' governed by Christ, the Core Beliefs that unite all Christians, and the Core Values that make the UMC unique in God's family.

**SECONDLY, we nurture and <b>Grow In Christ.** We realize the importance of walking with Christ. We understand that it is important to study the Bible and connect with one another in small groups. This creates opportunities for new or re-dedicated believers to learn and actively participate in life with Jesus. In these groups, we learn to deepen the ways we apply the Word of God to our lives, making the things we learn in church part of our daily lives. It is through this that we begin to discover our God given Spiritual Gifts for His call and use on our life.

LASTLY, we will Go, Share Christ. Here we become dedicated followers of Christ, having entered into fellowship with other mature committed believers and the leading of the Holy Spirit. Our Heart's desire is to fulfill the Great Commission of Christ—that is to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20).

It is through this pathway of knowing Christ, growing in Christ, and sharing Christ as led by the Holy Spirit, we—the First United Methodist Church of Arroyo Grande—will make disciples of Jesus Christ.

- 7. I am so confident that God will meet my needs that I give to God sacrificially and consistently.
- \_\_\_\_\_ 8. I find joy in being a help to someone who can utilize my help and concern.
- 9. My home is always open to people passing through who need a place to stay.
- \_\_\_\_ 10. When I am asked to pray for others, I feel that my prayers will have tangible results.

- 11. Oftentimes, I am able to perceive what is the heart or mind of another person without them telling me.
- \_\_\_\_ 12. I am able to motivate people into getting things done.
- 13. I enjoy doing things to comfort people during sickness or times of problems or anxiety.







Has your life seemed a little flat lately? Have you longed for an activity to stimulate your mind and give life new purpose? - Here is an idea as easy as 1,2,3 and you can sign up today. Consider applying for service to your community on the San Luis Grand Jury. The one year commitment will take you into a whole new

world of friendship and interest. The 19 person Jury is picked from about 50 applicants a year and serves twice a week. This amounts to about 20 hours a week. A juror receives \$15 a month and is reimbursed for mileage. You would be interviewed for the position by a former Jury member and will have a full working knowledge of the job if you are chosen to serve. 


## **UMW Bridal Tea and Fashion Show**

## Malaria Killed 1.2 million People Worldwide in 2010

This was a 32 percent decrease from the number of malaria deaths in 2004. In a recent article in The Lancet researchers commented that although most malaria deaths occur in very young children, 42 percent of deaths occurred in children over age 5 and adults. According to the analysis of data collected from 1980 to 2010, global malaria deaths rose from 1 million in 1980 to a peak of 1.8 million in 2004. Since then, increased malaria intervention efforts have helped to reduce malaria death rates, in journal news release.

The risk of malaria death in 2010 was highest in western, eastern and especially central sub-Saharan Africa. In 2010, there were about 700,000 malaria deaths among African children under age 5, or about 56 percent of all global malaria deaths.

About 1,500 cases of malaria are diagnosed in the United States each year. The vast majority of cases in the United States are in travelers and immigrants returning from parts of the world where malaria transmission occurs, including sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia.

Malaria is not spread from person to person like a cold or the flu, and it cannot be sexually transmitted. You cannot get malaria from casual contact with malaria-infected people, such as sitting next to someone who has malaria. Symptoms of malaria include fever and flu-like illness, including shaking chills, headache, muscle aches, and tiredness. Nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea may also occur. For most people, symptoms begin 10 days to 4 weeks after infection, although a person may feel ill as early as 7 days or as late as 1 year later.

Many effective antimalarial drugs are available. Your health-care provider and you will decide on the <u>best drug for you</u>, if any, based on your travel plans, medical history, age, drug allergies, pregnancy status, and other factors.

Since the global peak in 2004, there has been a substantial decrease in malaria deaths. This is attributable to the rapid, although variable, scale-up of control activities in sub-Saharan Africa. This scale-up has been driven in part by an expansion in health aid targeted towards malaria.


The Nothing But Nets campaign, which is supported by the United Methodist Church, works with UN partners like UNICEF, the UN Refugee Agency, and the World Health Organization to purchase nets, transport them to Africa, and distribute them to families. Net distributions are typically part of a wider public health effort within a country coordinated by the Ministry of Health, the UN and other local and international organizations. Every \$10 contribution to Nothing But Nets will cover the cost of purchasing a long-lasting, insecticide-treated bed net, distributing it, and educating communities on its use. The UN goal is to end malaria deaths by 2015.

## The Endowment Board Reports ~Wayne Huggins

As reported to the Charge Conference in January, the stock market returns were not good in 2011. Endowment funds were invested in several mutual funds in different sectors by our advisor/broker in order to provide adequate asset diversification. Most of these funds pay dividends, and usually increase in value when the stock market goes up. Conversely, if the market is flat or down, the value of our investments is likewise diminished. Accordingly, no money was distributed for missionary support or various other projects.

In looking back over the past few years, the main reason the Endowment Fund has increased in value is not due to the stock market performance, but to generous donations or bequests from people who wanted to provide a <u>perpetual</u> gift to the church in order to financially support ongoing programs (missionary) or specific projects (youth, facilities, AG Camp, children center, feeding the hungry, etc.) not covered in the operating budget.

This month I want to celebrate God's Steadfast Love and the <u>One Great Hour of Sharing</u> special offering which we will take on <u>March 18</u>. We are also starting to track special giving in 2012 to see where we are being in mission with those in need.

### **GOD'S STEADFAST LOVE**

So much of what UMCOR does is about revealing God's steadfast love for humankind. For more than 70 years, UMCOR has brought hope and solidarity to communities both at home and abroad in the wake of disaster, and support and expertise to those on a path to development. 





When delegates to General Conference meet in Tampa in April, you and other United Methodists around the world will be able to join them in an unprecedented concert of prayer, seeking God's will for their decisions. Consider praying with us whether you are in Tampa or outside the area.

The Upper Room, a division of GBOD, has produced a prayer guide called 50 Days of Prayer, which is available as an ebook, a PDF download, a book and a daily email.

Traditionally, The Upper Room's General Conference prayer guide has covered the 40 days prior to the conference. The new guide includes the additional 10 days General Conference will be in session.

Through translation crowdsourcing, the guide is now available in all of the official languages of the conference — English, French and Portuguese — and it will be included in the official program book for GC2012. The text will be made available to the bishops for translation into other languages as well.

"This is an intentional step forward in being a global Christian community and calling on every church, in every country all around the world to pray together for 40 days before we gather

in Tampa at the convention center on April 24." Albin said. " Then for the entire time the conference is in session, we'll be praying onsite with the delegates and the community as they use these meditations.

"I'm convinced the one thing every United Methodist can do to influence the outcome of the General Conference is lift it to the Lord in prayer," he said in a recent <u>presentation</u> to the Pre-General Conference gathering. "When we pray, we can be confident God will hear and answer our prayer."

Rev. Tom Albin who is a member of the Oklahoma Conference, is dean of The Upper Room and director of ecumenical relations. The Kansas native is co-chair of the Prayer Support Team for General Conference 2012.

This resource, 50 Days of Prayer Before & During General Conference 2012, serves as an invitation to provide spiritual support to the 2012 General Conference.
