Here They Come Again

It is that time of year again. Get ready to have a full church. Be prepared to set up chairs in the aisle. It is an exciting time of year, having a great celebration and filling the sanctuary with people. But some members will look down upon those who are CE (Christmas/Easter) attendees. The CE people are not faithful. They don't attend; they don't give; they aren't involved; they don't help with the work that needs to be done to keep the church going.

Now, look at Easter celebrations and CE people through a new lens. The church is the one place that exists, not for itself, but for others. While we often "blame" those who are inactive for their lack of commitment, it could be that the system in our church for welcoming, belonging, and discipling is designed for those results. What if we had a passion that the people who have not been part of the church meet God through Jesus Christ and experience the meaning of Easter? The celebration of Easter is the word of new life and hope. It is the Word that each of us, through the living Christ, can experience salvation, healing, and wholeness. That is a word for all, both inside and outside the church.

How can we make the Easter celebration inviting and welcoming to people who have been inactive or who have rarely been to church? Is everything written out in your bulletin for that day? Do you have the hymns, the Lord's Prayer, Doxology, and other parts of your service written out so it is easy to follow for people who are not familiar with your service? Visitors do not want is to make a "spectacle" of themselves and be noticed for doing the wrong things. What are the ways that you can help them diminish that fear? Are there sufficient people from the congregation to welcome them and to help them find nursery care and a seat in the sanctuary? Have these hospitality people been trained? Do you have a follow-up plan in place to make contact with first-time visitors from the community?

Let us give thanks and rejoice for all who come to our Easter services. Many will come because they are visiting relatives in your community. Some who have been marginally active will come because they may have a church memory that draws them to this service of Resurrection and Hope. Some will come because they are on a spiritual journey, and we have the privilege of inviting them to be on a spiritual journey, centered in Jesus Christ.

Dear Church Family and Friends,


March 31st we will celebrate not only Easter, but the completion of our *Bible in 90 Days*. I must confess it has been a challenge at



NEWS From UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Each year, members of the United Methodist Women prepare for faithful living and action by studying up to three mission studies focusing on 1) a spiritual growth topic, 2) a geographic area, and 3) a current issue. The 2012 Mission Studies have been Haiti; Poverty; and Immigration and the Bible. Some of our Arroyo Grande UMW circles and several individuals have been reading the study book "Immigration and the Bible" the past few months.

On February 1, 2013, the United Methodist Women, Inc. put out a national press release entitled, "United Methodist Women launches principles to Immigration Reform." The following is a summary of that release.

United Methodist Women offers core principles on immigration reform to guide us in the intense national debate and negotiations ahead by Carol Barton.

United Methodist Women welcome the momentum for national immigration reform this year. This is the moment we have been waiting for, and as women of faith committed to justice, particularly for women, youth and children, we must seize this moment! As a contribution, United Methodist Women offer core principles to guide us in the intense national debate and negotiations ahead.

United Methodist Women have been engaged in an Immigrant and Civil Rights Initiative since 2006, building on our long tradition of welcoming immigrants that dates back to the 19th century. In 2012 we engaged in a spiritual growth study, Immigration and the Bible, by Joan Maruskin. With it we explored how the entire biblical story is one of migration—due to famine, war, family conflict, women's oppression, religious commitment and more. And we learned of the deep biblical mandate to welcome the migrant and to love one another as God has loved us.

We begin the national immigration reform debate with a set of values and principles on what just immigration reform would really look like if we could attain it. The complexity of the coming debate will be in the details and in the political trade-offs that will be made to get a bill passed. We will join with the faith community and with allies in women's rights, immigrant rights, civil rights and labor organizations to fight hard for the best immigration reform deal. We do not have illusions that our vision is around the corner—it's a long way off.

The broad principles include:

- Human rights and security of individuals and communities must come first.
- Families must remain united and not be torn apart.
- Equality and due process before the law must be respected for all.
- The specific realities of immigrant women, in all their diversity, must be explicitly addressed.
- Racial justice must be explicitly addressed, particularly regarding enforcement policies that have contributed to racial profiling, access to jobs, public services and due process.
- Carol Barton is executive for community action at United Methodist Women.

The Arroyo Grande UMW will conclude their study on Immigration and the Bible with a program and meal on Saturday, May 4^{th.} Everyone is invited. <u>Be sure to save that date!</u> Check our future publications for further information as the date draws closer.

WHERE DOES THE TERM "GOOD FRIDAY" COME FROM?

The source of our term for the Friday before Easter, "Good Friday," is not clear. It may be a corruption of the English phrase "God's Friday," according to Professor Laurence Hull Stookey in <u>Calendar: Christ's Time for the Church</u> (p. 96). It is the common name for the day among English and Dutch speaking people. It is a day that proclaims God's purpose of loving and redeeming the world through the cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ. It is a day that is good because God was drawing the world to God's self in Christ. As seen in John's gospel, particularly, God was in control. God was not making the best of a bad situation, but was working out God's intention for the world — winning salvation for all people. We call it "good" because we look backward at the crucifixion through the lens of Easter!

"Good Friday" is not a universal name for the day. The liturgical title for the day in the Western church was "Friday of Preparation," since the time Jews used the word *paraskeue* (getting ready) for Friday, meaning the "day of preparation." Popular names for the day are "Holy Friday" among the Latin nations, "Great Friday" among the Slavic peoples, "Friday of Mourning" in Germany, "Long Friday" in Norway, and "Holy Friday" (Viernes Santo) among Hispanic peoples.

The United Methodist Book of Worship has rich and useful resources for Good Friday and all the days of Holy Week and the Great Three Days (Holy Thursday evening through Easter), 338-376.

<u>Final Words From the Cross</u>, by Adam Hamilton, is a must read for Lent.

This addition to our Library is one that you won't want to miss. The author suggests that Jesus' utterances from the cross have meaning for us today. Here is a brief overview:

In life and in death, Jesus' words were powerful and meaningful. Despite the serious effort and increased pain required for Jesus to speak as he hung on the cross, Jesus spoke seven "final words"—statements that have much to teach us about Jesus, his Father, and ourselves: "Father Forgive Them"; "Behold Your Son... Behold Your Mother;" "My God, Why Have You Forsaken Me?"; "Today You Will Be with Me in Paradise;" "I Thirst;" "It Is Finished;" "Into Your Hands I Commit My Spirit." In <u>24 Hours That Changed the World</u>, Adam Hamilton took us on a Lenten journey through the last day of Jesus' life. Now in this inspiring follow-up book, Hamilton explores these final words as seen and heard through the eyes and ears of those who stood near the cross.

Each chapter begins with the biblical account followed by a first-person story as might have been told from the viewpoint of one of the characters at the cross. Then the chapter explores the meaning of Jesus' dying words for our lives today. Following the last statement, a postscript recounts the words Jesus spoke following his resurrection, including what truly were the final words Jesus spoke while walking this earth.

UMCOR Short-term Mission Experience

Our local Mission Areas has planned a "Shortterm Mission Experience" for members of our four churches (Arroyo Grande, Lompoc, Santa Maria First and Santa Maria – St. Andrews). You are invited to participate! The group, spearheaded by Lois and Don Cook of the Lompoc UMC, has planned a short-term work experience at the UMCOR West Depot located in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The volunteers will work 2 – 3 days at the depot and then 1 -2 days outside the depot in the community. There will also be time for sightseeing and recreation. On day one of the trip, volunteers will gather at the Depot for orientation, safety training, and prayers for the week. Work will generally begin the afternoon of the first day. Schedules during the week are flexible, but volunteers may work assembling kits in the depot, cleaning the volunteer space, or outside the depot doing work in the community with projects like the Crossroads Food-Coop or local food banks and shelters. On the final workday, volunteers will gather again for a time of reflection, worship, and planning for taking their experience to their home congregations.

Currently there are 10 people signed up to go on this Mission experience which is scheduled for April 21 – 26. There are no lodging facilities on sight. Most either take their motor homes or stay in motels within easy drive of UMCOR West. There is also no food service provided onsite. There are several local restaurants and fast food chains nearby. Or volunteers may pack their own lunches and/or snacks. Volunteers are also asked to pay a \$20 "processing fee".

If you would like to learn more or want to sign up, please contact Lois at 805-736-1713 or 951-378-8509 (cell). If you do not feel you can go on the trip but would like to support the volunteers' efforts you can create some of the relief–supply kits for them to take with them. Many of our members have participated in making the kits including the school kits, layette kits, bucket kits, and health kits. If you or your group would like to contribute to this effort, information is available in the church office or by going on line to <u>www.umcor.org</u>. Click on the tab at the top entitled "relief supplies". There are even patterns to be used to make the school kit bag and a layette nightgown.
