**The Reverend SonHye Kim** was born and raised in Seoul, Korea. Her family immigrated to the United States in 1985 and settled in Hawaii. She moved to California to attend Fuller Theological Seminary. She graduated with a Master of Divinity degree in 1998 and was commissioned as provisional member of this annual conference in 1999.

She was appointed at First UMC of Arroyo Grande as Associate Pastor in 1999 and was ordained as Elder member in 2002. Harris UMC in Honolulu was her second appointment as an Associate Pastor. In 2006 she became the pastor-in-charge at First UMC of Huntington Beach and served there for three years. Ojai UMC was her fourth appointment and she served there for 14 months.

She has met the challenge of joining together Koreanspeaking members and local citizens from the community so that they see themselves as one family.

Last year she was appointed at Echo Park UMC in Los Angeles as interim pastor.


She loves the Lord and His people. She believes in the power of God's love and prayer and wants to be a matchmaker for the Lord. She is a visionary who knows how to make the vision work.

# January 2015

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#### Church Friends and Family,

Here is something that I read from the Global Board of Discipleship website (GBOD.org) that I wanted to share with you for Epiphany. I hope it blesses you as it did me.



#### Epiphany

Many of us were introduced to Epiphany through the familiar silhouetted-image of Three Wise Men bearing gifts as they followed the Great Star by night. In some cultures, Epiphany is known as the Day of the Kings (Dia de los Reyes). It is also known as Twelfth Day or Twelfth Night, reflecting an old custom of giving a gift for each of the days from December 25 to January 6 for the 12 days of Christmas. The day has special meaning for a number of reasons. Several branches of Christianity celebrate the tively poor parents! Not exactly what they expected and birth of the Christ Child on January 6 or January 7

The word epiphany means appearance or manifestation. Popular usage likens epiphany to words such as eureka or aha! Use of this word by some English speakers conjures images of having a light bulb turned on, or of being able to see something that was once hidden from view. The texts for the Sundays after the Epiphany dramatize the many ways that we people came to understand who Jesus was, through his baptism, the miracle at the wedding, or through that bodacious declaration in his hometown synagogue! But, this ever-widening circle of revelation began 'outside the circle' of Judaism, so to speak, with the Magi.

#### Who were the Magi?

Many versions of the Bible refer to them as the Wise Men. We often forget that these Magi or Wise Men were non-Jews. Older sources suggest that they were priestly descendants of one of the tribes of the Medes known for their knowledge of the stars (astronomy) and their ability to interpret dreams.

#### What can we learn from the Wise Men?

#### First, the Wise Men began their journey because of their beliefs.

It was a common belief that when a world leader like a king was born that a special stellar phenomenon would appear in the sky. The Magi saw something that convinced them that they had seen the long-awaited sign. Historians tell us that the Jews, the Romans, and the Persians were all watching the skies about that time, looking for signs of the birth of an extraordinary king. A few years before, around 11 BC, Halley's Comet had been seen. There were other stellar phenomena, including a bright star, Sirius, which appeared brightly in the daytime instead of at night. The Wise Men saw the star and began their journey.

May God give us all inspiration for this year's journey.

#### Second, the Wise Men were willing to follow what they had seen into unknown territory.

Their journey took them outside their country and their comfort zone. The Wise Men risked the consequences of disobeying Herod, who was known to behave as a madman when provoked and returned to their country by another way.

The Christian journey is often an off-road excursion.

#### Third, the Wise Men were committed to the journey -wherever the star might lead.

The Wise Men set out to find a newborn King by following a star and ended up in finding a baby born to young, relanot exactly what befit their dignity as priests.

In this coming year, may we look to heaven for guidance and comfort and may we accept God's blessings in whatever forms we find them, just as the Wise Men accepted that their long, expensive journey led them to a baby born to young, inexperienced parents who lived on the poor side of town.

#### Finally, the Wise Men brought gifts.

They did the thing that people in the East or in Africa or in India would do when visiting royalty. They brought gifts.

- Gold was the kind of gift that you brought to a king.
- Frankincense was the kind of gift that you would bring to a priest.
- Myrrh was given to someone who was about to die.

On This Twelfth Day, or Three Kings Day, otherwise known as Epiphany, think of the gift that you will offer to God in the coming year. The gift of time? The gift of your talents? Your service in the community? Your witness and testimony? The gift of undying love and devotion?

Their greatest gift comes to us in the form of a realization. The Wise Men were the first Gentiles to recognize that Jesus belongs to everyone. Good news is for everyone, not just a select few.





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# Celebrate the New Year with Your Family

More often than not, New Year celebrations are geared toward adults and focus more on the party than on the milestone of a New Year. You can celebrate the New Year in your home either on New Year's Eve, on New Year's Day, or during the first week of January. Here are some suggestions:

**Sort through toys and clothes.** Set aside those items that are in good shape to give to a shelter, a homeless center, or a church.

Make New Year's resolutions. Although we often laugh at these and fail to keep them, the beginning of a New Year is a good time to ask the following question, "What do I want to accomplish in this New Year?" Ask each person to come up with three things he or she hopes to do in the New Year. Focus on a new skill to learn, a good habit to start, a bad habit to stop. Write these down. On the family calendar, circle a date four to six weeks from when you write these to look at the resolutions again and find out how each person is doing with his or her resolutions.

**Decide together on family activities for 2015.** Ask each family member to contribute ideas to the following top-ics:

- Places we would like to eat in 2015.
- o Places we would like to visit in 2015.
- Fun activities we would like to do as a family in 2015.
- o People we want to visit in 2015.
- Ways we would like to worship together in 2015.

**Celebrate the New Year with traditional food.** In many areas of the U.S, greens or black-eyed peas are served. Other areas have different traditions. If there is no tradition for your family, decide together on a good New Year's food that you would like to enjoy together at the beginning of this year.

- Participate together in a time of devotions as a family. If you have a hymnal in your home, check to see if there is a service for the New Year. Or use the following for a time of devotions:
- Sit together around a table. In front of each person place a small votive candle. Light each candle, saying to one another, "Thank you God for another year of life and love in our family."
- Sing together a hymn of your choice or one of the following: "Hymn of Promise"; "O God, Our Help In Ages Past"; "Joy to the World"; "Sanctuary."
- Prepare for prayer by asking each person in the family to list one thing he or she's hope for in the New Year. After each person says what he or she hopes for, respond together, "O God, we give you thanks." End by praying the Lord's Prayer together.

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#### A New Year's Resolution That Will Transform the United Methodist Church By Gil Hanke

What would transform each local church within our denomination? What activities have a proven track record that turn "pew sitters" into "disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world?" These are not new questions, and the core answer returns us to some basic premises of John Wesley as he understood the teachings and servant leadership of Jesus Christ. The delivery system of these basic tenants requires an update, but the answers are obvious.

#### Here are some assumptions:

- 1. Disciples are not made in worship services, but corporate worship is essential to being a disciple
- 2. Discipleship forms in small Christ centered groups that regularly meet, usually weekly
- 3. Discipleship focuses us on a growing relationship with Christ
- 4. Our Wesleyan roots require a balance in both personal and social holiness
- 5. Most discipleship groups are gender specific
- 6. Many discipleship groups are intergenerational
- 7. Some discipleship groups are formed for a particular study or from a particular event
- 8. Some discipleship groups form for a particular time frame
- 9. Many groups continue for years
- 10. Discipleship groups require some deliberate interaction with Scripture and with Prayer

# What are the challenges with getting men into small groups?

- 1. Time
- 2. If they grow out of a particular event, adding new persons to the group can be difficult
- 3. Time
- 4. The group can get off track and become something that is not Christ centered or Wesleyan
- 5. Time

There is no shortage of materials for small groups. Some use fairly expensive materials that combine video and small group discussion, while some have only a set series of questions that each participant answers during each meeting. Many do some combination of materials, but cost should not be a limiting factor. Wesley began many of his small groups with the single question, "How is it with your soul?"

#### Are we inviting men with the right question?

How do we deal with the time issue? This is really a combination of issues. There is the time of the meeting, the time to get to and from the meeting. In larger cities the transportation time is a bigger issue. Maybe we are ask-

ing the wrong question. When we set up a group are we asking, "We want you in this small group, and we are going to meet at X (particular time) on every Y (particular day), at Z (particular place)?" Would we get further if we asked, "when could you meet, night or day?" Take the "where" out of the deal; take the travel time out of the deal. Focus on a meeting time. Then use the technology that is available. It could be a conference call, but more likely it will be a "hangout" on Google or a Skype call.

Technology is the best way to manage the "time" issue. It is also the best way to have men under 40 in your group. Because you are doing this online, does not mean you open this group to strangers lurking on the internet. This is using technology to connect with people you already know. This same group could decide that there is a special event they want to attend, or a local mission project they want to help with, so they can all get some "3D" time as well. The technology can also be used with a face to face meeting, for people who can meet, but can't be at the meeting. Persons who travel a lot, or who move to another community can still stay connected.

#### If a pastor is asked, "What would you want the men [women] of this church to do on a daily basis?" their answer would probably be:

- 1. Read the Bible
- 2. Pray
- 3. Celebrate where you see God at work
- 4. Find a way to deal with issues that challenge you

Here is a very simple format for a small group. Ask each man to read the Upper Room Daily Devotions every day. They can subscribe to small booklet, or have it sent to their phone, tablet, or computer every day. Each devotional includes the scripture and the prayer. In the meeting, ask "Which reading made the most sense to you this week? Which reading didn't make sense to you this week? Where have you seen God at work this week? What is your plan to deal what is challenging you?" Groups typically meet for only one hour, and begin and end with prayer.

So as we start the new year, let us do what we can to start small groups of men who agree to read the Upper Room Daily Devotions each day and meet for up to one hour face to face in person or electronically. Let's agree to transform the men of our churches. Let's stop talking about the need for disciples and make some.
