We Have A Disaster Preparedness Team!

The Trustees were given the task by the District to fill out their standard disaster preparedness plan. We recently were able to complete it and get it into District. The process called for us to form a disaster preparedness team. Twelve members from our congregation agreed to be on the team and accepted their designated position(s).

Our first meeting was held on August 30th and 8 of the 12 members were present. We all agreed that inviting the Red Cross in for a dis-



aster preparedness lesson would be a great idea. On Sept. 9th ten of us attended their presentation. It was determined that we should purchase a hand cranked radio, good flashlight and some cases of water.

A list of the contacts of those involved with the disaster preparedness team is now on the wall of the office and the wall by the phone in the kitchen. A first aid kit, radio and flashlight will be stored in the kitchen in the drawer marked with the Red Cross symbol. Water will be stored in the closet next to the stage.

The plan also called for us to contact the Red Cross for disaster personnel who could assist us in the case of disaster. We invited them in to look at our Church facility.

They felt it would make a wonderful shelter in the event of disaster nearby. We contacted District on the matter and they strongly encouraged us to partner with them. So, we are now an official partner with the Red Cross as a shelter.



Anyone reading this is encouraged to consider becoming a Red Cross volunteer.

FOOD & CLOTHING OUTREACH MINISTRY by Chuck and Betty Ashton

We are in our 6th year of representing the First United Methodist Church in ministering to those in need within our community. It has come with many challenges. We have found a permanent location for our "People's Kitchen" meals at the Assembly of God Church in Grover Beach. We are

now serving hot meals again which include salad, rolls, fruit and

Our "Emergency Food Pantry" is also growing in community response. Each Monday we provide a week's food supply to families who are

food challenged. In our second quarter this year we gave food to 683 families consisting of 2,246 individuals. New faces are being seen each week.

Our "Parking Lot Giveaway" is a huge success to our community. We are currently planning for our Christmas Giveaway on

Saturday, December 5th. Hundreds of boxes of clothing, bedding, toiletries, and socks are given to nearly 600 family members. To date, we have given out 13,200 pairs of new socks.

All of this comes at a price. We are not on any church budget and are solely dependent upon the generosity of individuals. For example, our food pantry was recipient of \$700.00 from Bishop Carcaño. All monies go to those individuals in need as we operate with a team of volunteers.

each month is busy with of my lease brothers, you did it for mecooking, preparing, and transporting the meal to the site. The food is well-received by those in attendance. We have been feeding nearly 100 individuals at each meal. Year to date, we have fed 2,021 meals to 1,516 individuals.

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES



- September 2015 Chair, Paul Holden
- The Trustees received a Memorial Donation from Craig Ford in memory of his wife, Gerrie.
- Paul mentioned he had sent in both the District's requested disaster preparedness plan and the new 'shelter' contract with the Red Cross.
- The Church Disaster Preparedness team gathered together on Sept. 9th for a disaster preparedness presentation put on by the Red Cross. We will be purchasing a crank radio, flashlight and cases of water to have on hand. A contact list of all those involved on the Disaster Preparedness team is on the wall of the office and the kitchen by the phone.
- Mike Johnson will begin contacting potential vendors for contracting preventative maintenance for our heaters and appliances.
- Mike J. will also be looking closely at our current contract with Executive Janitorial and seeing if we could perhaps get more for less from another vendor in the future. Paul provided him with a potential cleaner.
- The board is still awaiting a response from the missions committee to assist the Church with paying for the People's Kitchen/Food Pantry utility month expense through utilizing part of the earnings from the Don McGuire Missions fund.
- Paul received some interest in the rental of the Church's vacant lot. So far no one has surfaced who would pay more than \$250 monthly. We may entertain having more than one renter on the property for storage of their goods to get significant income. Mike J. noted that the entrance to the property would have to be onto Bennett not through the parking lot plus the need for lighting would be extra costs.
- Paul agreed to post the extra heating table in the pantry on Craigslist.
- Buffy Prestemon brought up the thought that given our high electrical cost we should perhaps we investigate Solar solutions. She agreed to pursue.
- Mike J. made us aware of Cokesbury's booklet on being a Trustee. Some copies will be purchased and Mike when finished will share his with Paul.
- We received a request from Ride-On Transportation to house a 'key lock box' for them in exchange for an occasional use of their van. We approved the request and Paul will pursue negotiating a contract with them.

MISSION HIGHLIGHTS:

Four Mission Goals Related in Importance excerpts from Thomas Kemper, Gen. Sec. of The General Board of Global Ministries. Sept.-Oct. New issue of New World Outlook.

GOD'S STEADFAST LOVE ... IN ACTION

People often ask me, "Isn't the first goal of mission making disciples—the most important?" I respond that the four goals of Global Ministries are related in importance as expressions of the mission God has given to the church. The four form a holistic tapestry of mission intention. Disciple-making takes various forms. It may happen through witness by word—telling the good news of God's love in Jesus through sermon or song. Witness can also happen through deeds, acts of compassion, or even a caring presence in circumstances that do not permit overt Christian witness. There is truth in the admonition attributed to St. Francis of Assisi: "Preach the gospel always and, when necessary, use words.' Working to create and support vital congregations and caring communities, goal two, helps to forge and maintain discipleship. Alleviating human suffering—goal three, and seeking justice, freedom, and peace—goal four, are means of making disciples. At the same time, being a disciple necessarily means alleviating needs; promoting justice, freedom, and peace; and strengthening the church. The four collectively express the Wesleyan emphasis on personal and social holiness—mutual aspects of mission and discipleship that cannot be divided. Some of the United Methodist global mission initiatives that have emerged over the last quarter century began through sharing the Word; others through service ministries. Mission to alleviate suffering and to bring about peace and justice must be offered regardless of church participation. Disaster relief, community

development, health ministries, and the promotion of human rights make no distinctions as to religious affiliation, nationality, ethnicity, gender, or sexual orientation. The objectives are to give evidence to God's love for all, to indicate that the church, as the instrument of divine grace, cares about the entire human family. Alleviation of human suffering is more than humanitarian service. There is a spiritual motivation based in our faith that God offers healing whenever humanity is broken, stricken, and in pain. The four goals hold together in theology and practice. They adhere in importance, going together as surely as do the Beatitudes in the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5. You can no more separate sorrow, humility, righteousness, mercy, purity of heart, peacemaking, and selfsacrifice than you can the desire in mission to share the Gospel, renew congregations and communities, alleviate suffering, and seek justice, freedom, and peace.


