From the Pastor

...After 8 months...

A pastor steps into a church to get acquainted with the people, premises and programs. Who is here? Where have they been? Where are they now? Where do they want to go together as disciples of Jesus Christ? July 19th, I met a warm, welcoming worshipping community with high-level commitment to Christ, the church and each another. I met a congregation with a heart for outreach that engages and makes a difference in the lives of people in need and I met a dedicated staff offering their gifts in ministry as well.

While a pastor gets acquainted, *joys* are obvious and *concerns* begin to show themselves slowly but surely over time--needs for organization, structure, leadership, and training, needs for accountability, creativity in communication and updating for the sake of relevance. "Needs" are apparent before they can be met, because relationships take time and pastor/staff and people must be in a loving, trusting, mutual relationship with one another to effectively move forward in important ways. With the need for a relational foundation, things move slowly at first, and it isn't obvious that that snail's
pace is deliberate and methodical.

Finally! Eight months in, we have enough relationship to advance the cause! Some pastors move and shake. I choose a non-cataclysmic path and witness to my belief that abiding change happens with less fanfare and better results when we build those relationships first.

Think of it as a "love bank". When a new pastor makes brash, bold moves before making significant deposits in the "love bank", it doesn't go well. At the first sign of dis-ease, parishioners begin to withdraw *their* deposits from the love bank. If there isn't enough love, care and kindness in the bank, there isn't enough grace to weather seas of change. We have made our initial deposits in the Love's Bank. Relationships are growing. Two mugs sit on my counter. One says "It is what it is" and the other says "Make it happen!" Let's accept where we are and create the new together!

November's meetings with a brand new Nominating team were premature. I didn't know anyone well enough to help move things along. It's time to jump in again. And it's time for a candid, plain-speech stewardship campaign (April-May), a solid and decisive visioning meeting (May) in order to spell out clearly where we are and what we need to do, and the addition of new people to our both administrative and program teams.

Our Administrative groups are good---Church Council, Staff Parish, Finance and Trustees. They can be great. We need a Finance Chair and we need a Treasurer. We need a strong financial base. The budget cuts already made are not enough. We have yet to resolve our serious short-fall. That reality puts pressure on the way we do business together. When things are tight, it ups the ante on anxiety and tests our Christian character as we cooperate with limited resources. We need to educate people into the process and flow of decision-making in the UMC, shifting responsibility back to the Church Council and Trustees in order that we don't have little pockets of people wielding power here and there, but move together in unity as the Body of Christ. We need a clear, updated vision to guide staff and laity in our "churchwork" and in carrying out the "work of the church", i.e. mission, ministry and outreach. Nominating can put the right people in the right place at the right time to strengthen AGFUMC, but not without vision and direction.

Alongside these Administrative groups, our program committees, Music & Worship, Education, Missions, and Communications need bolstering and inspiration too.

"Not a Visioning Day!" "We just did that!" Though it hasn't been long since the church had a Visioning Day, it's time to do it again in this new chapter in tandem with new leadership and to set in place patterns of accountability and follow through once we reach consensus on what it is we value and want to do together. Just a few thoughts for your cogitation!

Men of the Church not active in UMM are also invited to attend.


JUNE IS BBQ MONTH

REPORT ON UMW WORKSHOP ON PEOPLE WITH DIABILITIES

What a fabulous day we had on Saturday, March 23th at our Disabilities Workshop. We had people from San Luis Obispo, Los Osos, and Atascadero as well as twentytwo members from our own church in attendance.

Our first speaker was Dr. James Weitkamp, an optometrist from Arroyo Grande. He gave an informative and entertaining program about eye functions and eye diseases and how we can reach out to help people who come to our church with visual challenges.

Karen Scott, a truly well-educated and skilled audiologist from San Luis Obispo, followed James. Karen discussed our human hearing system and the many new and inventive hearing aids. She also mentioned ways we can make our church more helpful to people with hearing challenges.

After a delightful lunch and fellowship time, our first afternoon speaker was Rebecca Wilber, a mother of a child with Autism. Her mother, Barbara Reineke, introduced her. Becky opened our minds and hearts to children with special needs. She told us of some of the challenges these children and families must face. When these children are uneasy in new situations they may often act up and may be judged as poorly disciplined while the parents get dirty looks from passers-by. It is sad to be judged by strangers who don't realize the true situation. This is where our church comes in. We can provide a place where parents can come to be renewed through Christ's love, and their children can feel God's love and how special they are in HIS eyes as they are welcomed and loved by the congregation.

Dr. Sarah Willet, our next speaker, has numerous degrees in Physical Therapy, including a master's degree and a doctorate degree. Sarah's topic was mobility. Her presentation was especially helpful to those of us from Arroyo Grande. She came to our church and brought a friend who uses a wheelchair. They went through our church facility and looked for ways we could make this church more accessible to people in wheelchairs. We received many compliments on what we have already implemented. (Great handicapped parking; easy access into our church and sanctuary; hand presses to open the door; wide aisles that will accommodate wheel chairs and walkers; rails leading up to the altar; hearing devices; large print bulletins; and our communion in the pews for those with mobility issues.)

Our final speaker for the day was our own Lucy Jacob who is an Occupational Therapist, CHT, who specializes in hand disabilities. Lucy made it apparent that when a person loses the use of a hand or both due to an accident or ailment like arthritis, life becomes very complicated and challenging. She taught us some exercises to keep our hands flexible. She showed us various aids to make reaching, gripping and other daily activities easier for those of us who have hand issues.

There was so much learned, so much love present, and so many ideas to bring to our churches. Thank you to all who planned in his event, prepared food, and participated to make this workshop a great success.





REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES President, Paul Holden

March 2016—The Latest from the Trustees






- Trustees President contacted six vendors and obtained three quotes for the installation of a Solar power system. The lowest bid came in at \$62,000, more than \$10,000 less than the nearest competitor. The proposed solution would meet 102% of the Church's current electrical needs. Therefore the investment would immediately begin paying itself back, saving the Church approximately \$900 monthly for next 20-30 years. Trustees were all in favor of this proposal and would look to fund it from the Parsonage fund account. If approval is given by the Bishop and Cabinet to use the Parsonage Fund for this expenditure, Paul will present this recommendation to Church Council for adoption. The vendor has been invited to come to the next Trustee's meeting for a meet and greet discussion. An agreement and installation plan should then be forthcoming.
- Trustees President has obtained signed Church Facility Use agreements with all parties using the Church on a reoccurring basis and they are now on file.

Did You Know?? Many visitors decide in the first 10 minutes after entering a church for the first time whether they will return or not. There are many ways that we can encourage first or second time visitors to return. Here are a few suggestions:

- 1. Greet visitors when they first arrive—in the parking lot or as they arrive at the door.
- 2. Escort newcomers to the nursery, classrooms, coffee hour, etc. Don't just point the way or give directions.
- 3. Adopt the "rule of three"—talk to visitors in the first three minutes following the service instead of greeting your friends.
- 4. Enact the "circle of ten" rule—greet anyone, member or guest, who comes within ten feet of you.
- 5. Try saying, "I don't think we've met before…" if you are not sure if the person next to you is a member or a visitor.
- 6. Introduce them to other members who may have common interests or live in the same area.
- 7. Invite them to an upcoming event and offer to pick them up.

Let's all reach out and encourage our visitors to become regular attendees. That way we will all be a part of a "Caring Congregation".
