PALM SUNDAY—April 9th, 2017 IN THE CROSSFIRE: You and Me Matthew 21:1-11

The Celebration of the Triumphal Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem marks the beginning of Holy Week as we gather in worship. Some congregations celebrate this as Palm/Passion Sunday. Others celebrate this as Palm Sunday with additional worship opportunities during Holy Week.

There will be two worship services as usual at 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. and a special Egg Hunt for children and Scavenger Hunt for older children in the course of the morning's activities. So, come celebrate worship and celebrate with us.

Remembering the last days in the earth journey of our Lord, we gather in worship on Maundy Thursday for a simple celebration of the Last Supper punctuated by a reading of the Passion Narrative from the gospel with the Ritual of Tenebrae. One by one candles will be extinguished as we listen to the story of Jesus entering the darkness of betrayal, violence and crucifixion as his life is taken away. We are combining these remembrances in lieu of offering two services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, leaving you free to participate in the Ecumenical Good Friday Service at 3:00 p.m. at St. Patrick's Catholic Church listed here separately.

From the Pastor

As members of a caring congregation we walk the tightrope attempting to find balance in our giving that truly makes a difference. It takes experience, expertise and discernment to know who to help, when and where. We want to help everyone in an up close and personal way, and the truth remains we cannot. We simply do the best we can with the resources we acquire to make a difference.

In the 20 months I've been on board with this ministry we have had many, many people in the church in serious need of assistance and many more who come to receive food and have no shelter on these rainy nights or at any other time. The needs pull at our heartstrings because we long to help. We remain a worshipping congregation of some 225 members who support and undergird the entire ministry with our gifts. As you give to the church and seek to help others, what you give where is indeed your own personal business. At the same time there are cautions I would raise to one and all.

It is never appropriate for members or staff to solicit financial gifts from members of the church for business or personal use, so it is important that you know how to direct people to appropriate resources rather than offer your own resources directly. In fact it is detrimental to the health of the Body of Christ when the church roster is used by those in need in this way, whether in an attempt to meet their own cash or housing needs. When this is going on, it often gets back to the pastor when it's too late to take more helpful steps with people in need. So, it is important for all of us to know resources in our community and to help direct people to resources as we can.

Our Church Discretionary account is used on occasion to assist members in need during some personal difficulty. Most people pay it back or pay it forward by making a gift back into the fund. Concerned parishioners make occasional gifts into the account so that there is at least a little something available to help our own members along the way. This is a "discretionary" account so needs are balanced and we help "as we can".





ALICE ADDISON AND HER LIFE OF ACTIVE OPTIMISM

Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and praise your father in heaven. Matt. 5.16



Alice was born in Washington, DC and her family lived in Alexandria, Va. Her father, John B. Adams, at the time was the White House correspondent for CBS radio. She has photographs of herself, in her baby dress and bonnet, being greeted and held by President Harry S. Truman during a visit to the White House. Her mother was also a journalist covering Latin America events, and her parents met in Rio de Janeiro Brazil. Her mother later became a Washington journalist and covered the Kennedy administration. Alice attended elementary and high school in Alexandria and received honors in French and Spanish. Later at UC Santa Barbara, she majored in history, Spanish, humanities, and French, and was editor of the UCSB award-winning yearbook. She set goals to pursue teaching classes involving world cultures. After college she taught in Santa Barbara County high schools. She proceeded to obtain a masters degree in bilingual education from Pepperdine University and Ph.D. in linguistics from Georgetown University in Washington, DC. She is proud to have walked in the "Martin Luther King, Jr. Washington, DC March" and to have heard, in person, his "I Have A Dream" speech from the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. Her mother shared with her many times a slogan" "AMERICAN" ends in "I CAN". Alice still follows that active optimism.

Alice married Tony Addison in 1973 in Arroyo Grande, Ca. Tony was a British sports car master mechanic; Alice still drives his well-preserved 1968 MGC-CT frequently around town. Tony's two children from a prior marriage have given Alice four grandchildren; one marries in SLO in March. Alice continued teaching and teacher training at UCSB; then in Santa Maria taught Spanish, French and English as a second language and was the district bi-lingual migrant education director. In 1986-87 she served as president of CATESOL and was awarded, and received, recognition as California Teacher of the Year nominee in 1979. In 1990-92 she was a CA Dept. of Education consultant in Sacramento for all public high school accreditations. She is past president of Altrusa of Cinco Ciudades and AAUW-5 Cities-Pismo Beach. Tony died in 2009, and Alice retired from teaching in 2011, and was honored for her foreign language work by national and California bilingual organizations, and by France. Alice joined our church in 2009 and has given of her time and talents to events and committees. She enjoys the church and congregation as a refuge and source of strength in pursuit of her goals to be a faithful and practicing believer in the Word of God. She sings alto in our church choir and has led Bible study and prayer groups in two churches.

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Alice sees the focus of her life now involving faith, travel, family, volunteering and friends. With her many educational pursuits and successes she will, no doubt, meet her goals.

<u>FAITH</u> shines in Alice. She is currently doing comprehensive religious studies to absorb the full meaning and history of FAITH. She benefits from the choir music, daily devotionals, the Bible lessons, loves GOD, and she thoroughly enjoys our church family. She assists with the Global Leadership Summit at New Life Church. Her "Walk to Emmaus" set her on the path of faith.

<u>TRAVEL</u> involves her bucket list of visiting all seven continents, and this is the year for Antarctica. She "feels the calling" to go back to the Holy Lands. Being a learner of many languages she finds traveling abroad makes people "more open and accepting" when she speaks their language. Alice has visited 49 of 50 states and one day will get to Alaska.

<u>FAMILY</u> continues with Tony's children, with Tony's brother and wife and with their families, keeping in touch and visiting. Alice visits Tony's mother regularly at a local senior residence. She is active with her sister's family who moved to Arroyo Grande in 2012. Two Siamese cats compete for her attention at home.

<u>VOLUNTEERING</u> includes as a docent; at Paulding House and South County Historical Society. Alice also serves on the boards of numerous civic clubs and supports local music events. She has taken up ukulele, percussion egg and spoons for local groups. Upon retiring from teaching, she shifted her energy to our Arroyo Grande community and served on three centennial committees. Now she still helps with local events, car club activities, and retired teacher groups.

<u>FRIENDS</u> share her attendance and enjoyment of music at the Clark Center, county band concerts, our church choir, First Friday country gospel, Basin Street Regulars, Jubilee by the Sea jazz, SLO PAC, Hancock PAC, Arroyo Grande Summer Concerts, Series and Songwriters at play venues. Being a long time resident, she has many neighbors she counts as friends. Active, optimistic Alice loves her Arroyo Grande community and Central Coast life.

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES March 2017



President, Paul Holden

The Board of Trustees met with scout, Trevor Melsheimer, to hear his proposal for an Eagle Scout project to benefit the AGUMC Children's Center. Approval was given to proceed with construction of a pergola shade structure outside the entrance to the Children's Center. Dick Melsheimer, Trustee, will act as the Church's representative for the project to make sure the proper building permit is acquired and to assure that the project is completed in a timely fashion. The Children's Center Director has been informed that the Children's Center will be responsible for future upkeep of the structure.

A sub-group of the Trustees discussed research and analysis of the current Church Key status and securing of the buildings. An immediate need is to obtain a key lock box for keys currently stored on the premises. As Trustees move forward, a key policy will be in place. Members/staff needing the use of keys will be required to register their compliance with the church policy before being issued keys.

The Church has acquired a new local phone and Internet service provider, Norcast. Norcast offers higher speed internet and phone service at a cost of \$120/month less than AT & T. Thus far, Norcast has been very responsive to our needs.

The Wednesday work crew is getting smaller and older. Trustees are in need of helpers, especially with landscaping (e.g. weeding and trimming). Please let Mike Johnson know if you are willing to help on Wednesday mornings, or simply show up on Wednesday at about 8:30 a.m. Without significant volunteer help, Trustees and/or SPRC will need to hire outside assistance.

Trustees have declared Saturday April 22nd (Earth Day) to be a CHURCH WORK DAY. The focus will be weeding. The fun will begin at 8:30 a.m. Please come help if able.

Finally, there is a new Church use policy and fee structure that has been adopted by the Trustees and Church Council. Events exempt from this fee structure need to be classified as all Church activities and be recognized as such by the Board of Trustees and Church Council.

NEW POLICY APPROVED BY FINANCE & CHURCH COUNCIL

FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH **OF ARROYO GRANDE SPECIAL PROJECT FUNDING**

The annual budget covers ongoing expenses, but does not leave room for special projects, capital expenses such as a piano or other large, one-time expenses. These can be covered from funds by fundraising events, such as a dinnertheater, a fundraising appeal or a grant from the Endowment Board.

Fundraising Event: Prior to putting on a one-time Fundraising Event, such as a fundraising dinner or charity auction, the organizers should put together a proposal, a description of the **Endowment:** The Church has been blessed with an Endowevent, purpose of the funds being raised, expected revenue, expenses and profit and expected cost to attend the event. The proposal should be presented to the Finance Chair and the Church Council for approval. The organizers are to check with the Church Office to make sure there are no date conflicts or other potentially competing fundraisers.

Regularly scheduled fundraising events, such as those sponsored by the United Methodist Women or United Methodist Men, need not submit a proposal for approval, however, will need to clear the date with the Church Office and inform the Church Council of the event in advance.

Fundraising Appeal: Groups may request a special one-time fundraiser for a one-time purchase (such as a new piano) or purpose (such as a mission trip). Fundraising appeals may be publicized in the Cast-a-Net, weekly bulletin, and announced at Sunday Service. Prior to putting on a Fundraising Appeal, the organizers should put together a proposal outlining what the funds are to be used for, why they are needed and how much is needed. The proposal should be submitted to the Finance Committee and Church Council for approval. If the proposal is for the purchase of equipment or a project which affects the Church's buildings, grounds or equipment it should include an estimate of any on-going costs and should be approved by the Trustees before going to Church Council.

Each year that money is available, the Endowment Board will distribute funds to projects or equipment that benefits the Church. Requests for Endowment funds can be submitted by letter or email, along with purpose and justification to the Chair of the Endowment Board.

THE FIVE CITIES CHRISTIAN WOMEN — THEIR HISTORY, PURPOSE, AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Five Cities Christian Women was officially organized in October 1973 at the Shell Beach Methodist Church.

The group is now in its **44th year**.

Prior to this, women of various churches were involved in Christian Women United, an international organization, and assisting pastors and priests of the 5 Cities community with preparation for an annual meeting "World Community Day".



In 1973 about ten ladies, inspired by Marie Robertson, discussed the possibility of forming a local ecumenical group independent of Christian Women United. A meeting was held in her home in Shell Beach where Christian Women of the Five Cities was formed.

The purpose of the organization was to unite women in all churches in a fellowship to help each other grow in personal devotion to our savior, Jesus Christ, through worshipping, working, and witnessing in all areas of life, the home, the community, the nation, and the world.

The group has tried to accomplish this by having potluck luncheon meetings for fellowship, followed by presentations of various speakers telling of needs of people in our local area, the nation, and the world. The main emphasis right now is the pantry located at 192 B South 9th Street, Grover Beach, across the street from the Central Coast Baptist Church.

When this group first began providing food for families (to prepare at home), one or two families a month were served. By 1982 they served 20 to 25 families a month. Last year they served 6,306 families consisting of 14,133 adults and 7,968 children— a total of 22,101 people. Families may come two times a month, and approximately 1/2 of them do.

Current needs are peanut butter, tuna, and cereal. Pet food is helpful, too.

There will be more history in future Cast-a-Nets.

HURRICANE MATTHEW DISASTER RESPONSE

(Information from Gary Locklear, response coordinator with Lumbee people in North Carolina). Yesterday marked five months since Hurricane Matthew dumped 18 inches of rain on Eastern North Carolina, a day we'll remember forever. Since then I have worked long hours coordinating the disaster response efforts for United Methodist Committee On Relief (UMCOR). The outpouring of love has been tremendous for Eastern NC and especially Robeson County. Special thanks to all who have participated in this recovery. Matthew was a huge disaster and it will take a long time to recover. After cleaning out more than a thousand houses we are beginning to build and to give displaced families hope.

SUPPORT CHILDREN'S MISSION PROJECT FOR 2017

Project Transformation is a United Methodist-affiliated non-profit organization that is committed to intergenerational education in low income communities. Project Transformation aims to revitalize low-income communities by providing at-risk children with educational summer programming. For low-income communities summertime is especially challenging. 


